# **ACC CHAMPIONS**

Of Virginia's nine competitors at the NCAA Championships, four won titles in their respective events at the ACC Chapionships this season. That list includes:

# Ethan Dabbs - Javelin, 73.09m

- First-ever competitor to win four ACC men's javelin titles
- Third Virginia athlete to win four ACC titles in any event

#### Owayne Owens - Triple Jump, 16.61m

- Matched an outdoor-best mark
- Fourth ACC triple jump title second outdoors

# Nate Mountain - 3000 Steeplechase, 8:32.05

- First Cavalier to win the steeplechase title since 2014 (Kyle King)
- Personal best time trails only Derek Johnson for the school record
- First ACC title for Mountain

# Margot Appleton - 1500 Meters, 4:14.58

- First ACC title for Appleton
- Second Cavalier to win the title in three seasons both under head coach Vin Lananna (Michaela Meyer '21)
- Meyer went on to win an NCAA title in the 800 meters during the 2021 season becoming the first Cavalier to win a women's title at the NCAA Championships (Previous Cavalier titles were won in the AIAW)

# MURPHY THE MILER

Conor Murphy is set to compete at the NCAA Championships in the 800 meters, but over the course of the 2023 season, he has stood out as one the top runners in a stable of impressive milers within the Virginia program. The 2023 indoor season featured a school-record mile time from Murphy who led five milers to sub-four-minute times on the same day. His time leads a total of seven active Cavaliers who have broken the four-minute barrier:

Murphy placed sixth in the mile at the NCAA Indoor Championships to earn the first individual All-American honors of his career.

# **CONSISTENCY PERSONIFIED**

Four of Virginia's competitors have put together particulary impressive seasons spanning the indoor and outdoor track and field seasons as well as cross country. The following individuals are set to compete at the outdoor championships following an appearance at the indoor championships in March:

**Owayne Owens:** Virginia's veteran triple jumper has put together yet another incredible season in the final year of his collegiate career. Owens placed third at the ACC Indoor Championships in the triple jump and recorded a personal-best at the NCAA Indoor Championships placing third overall - his best finish at an NCAA Championship meet. Owens won his fourth ACC Triple Jump crown at the ACC Outdoor Championships.

**Margot Appleton:** A driving force behind Virginia's run to a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championships, Appleton led the team to it's first top-10 finish since 2013. She shattered a personal-best in the indoor mile as part of a campign in which she finished fourth at the NCAAs after qualifying as the 16th and final seed. She broke the Virginia 5000-meter record at the Virginia Challenge and went under 4:15 in the women's 1500 clocking 4:08.96 at Raleigh Relays. She won her first-ever ACC title in the 1500m at the ACC Outdoor Championships.

**Conor Murphy:** From the onset of the indoor season, Murphy shattered a Virginia record in the mile running sub-four for the first time in his career before going on to win silver in the 800 meters at the ACC Indoor Championships clocking a PB of 1:47.33. In his first appearance at an NCAA Championships, Murphy finished sixth in the mile as an All-American. Murphy earned second-team All-ACC status in both the 1500m and 800m at the ACC Outdoor Championships.

**Alix Still:** Her indoor season hit a high point at the ACC Championships where Still won silver in the pentathlon while setting a Virginia record and a Scottish national record while earning a berth at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Still has already set the Virginia record in the heptathon at the Virginia Challenge. That total ranks 22nd in the nation which put Still through to the NCAA Championships in Austin.

# A SEASONED COMPETITOR

Ethan Dabbs enters the NCAA championships as a seasoned veteran with a wealth of experience in championship meets. Dabbs has won gold at both the ACC and USATF Championships, but the NCAA title is one that has eluded him so far.

#### **Rare Air for Dabbs**

- At the ACC Outdoor Championships, Ethan Dabbs became just the fourth competitor to win four ACC titles in the men's javelin and the 12th to win four men's titles in any event (third Cavalier to accomplish the feat)
- · A season ago, Ethan Dabbs won gold in the javelin marking a conference and meet record (82.92m)
- · This season, Dabbs set a Virginia Challenge and Lannigan Field record with his season-best throw of 80.82 meters

# **NCAA Championship Experience**

- · Dabbs finished as the runner up at last season's NCAA Championships at Hayward Field in Eugene, Ore.
- He returned for the USATF Championships where he won gold on the same field
- · Dabbs went on to represent Team USA at the World Athletics Championships in Oregon
- Dabbs has qualified for the NCAA Championships in two of the three seasons in which he has competed
- He has failed to qualify for the meet only once in his career (2021) throwing through injury

# **Returning to Austin**

- Dabbs' first appearance at an NCAA Championship meet came at Mike A. Myers Stadium in 2019 where he earned All-American honors with a seventh-place finish
- Dabbs has competed at Mike A. Myers Stadium this season at the 95th Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays where he placed sixth in the competition (74.87 meters / 245'8")

# **Stiff Competition**

- The field of competition includes each of the previous two Champions: Marc Minichello (Georgia), Tzuriel Pedigo (LSU)
- Three competitors have surpassed 80 meters this season: Keyshawn Strachan (Auburn), Ethan Dabbs (Virginia), Marc Minichello (Georgia)
- · Nine of the meet's competitors faced off at Texas Relays earlier this season. Here are the results:

# LAYING DOWN THE LAW

Virginia's Ashley Anumba has continued to impress on the track throughout her second year as a law student at UVA.

- · Anumba has broken the UVA discus record on six occasions since arriving at Virginia in 2022
- She broke her own mark with her first throw of the season that reached 59.37m (193'9") at Raleigh Relays She would go on to break the record once more this season
- Anumba won silver at the ACC Outdoor Championships in the Discus throwing 58.50 meters. She also threw a personal-best of 16.19 meters in the shot put to place seventh.

#### A Trip to Tucson

- At the Tucson Elite Classic, Anumba once again broke the Virginia discus record marking 60.97m (200'0") for the win
- · She is one of six NCAA Division I throwers to break 60 meters this season and one of just four to hit 200 meters

# **Returning to the NCAAs**

- · Anumba is set to make her fourth appearance at the NCAA Championships Two with Penn, two with Virginia
- She has improved her placement in each appearance finishing 21st (2018), 19th (2019) and 15th (2022).

# STEEPLECHASE STARS

For the fifth time in eight seasons, the Virginia Cavaliers will be represented in the men's 3000-steeplechase at the NCAA Championships. This season features a repeat qualifier as well as a newcomer. The Cavaliers have been a force in the event so far this season taking 22 points from the steeple at the ACC Championships which featured a 1-2 finish from Nate Mountain and Derek Johnson.

# Mountain's Rise

- A season ago, Mountain placed fourth at the ACC Championships running 8:39.42 a time which qualified him for the NCAA East Preliminary Round where he placed 17th just slightly missing NCAA qualification
- This season, Mountain ran a then-best of 8:34.99 at the Virginia Grand Prix and went on to become the first Cavalier to win the event at the ACC Championships posting a personal best of 8:32.05 which ranks second all-time at UVA
- The 2023 championships will be Mountain's first experience at an NCAA Championship meet after running the fastest qualifying time at the East Regional

# Johnson's Return

- After an All-American campaign in the 3000 SC in 2021 when he placed seventh in the event at the NCAA Championships, Johnson was sidelined for 2021-22 due to injury
- In 2022-23 he is back in impressive form leading the Cavaliers to a automatic qualifier in the 2022 Cross Country season - the Hoos went on to finish 22nd at the NCAA Championships
- · Indoors, Johnson set the Virginia 5000m record at BU's David Hemery Valentine Invitational (13:39.88)
- · Outdoors, Johnson holds the Virginia record in the 3000 SC (8:28.72) which he set in 2021
- This season, Johnson finished second at the ACC Championships posting 8:33.82 He ran the seventh-fastest qualifying time at the East Regional

# **ACADEMIC SUCSESS**

# **Scholar Athlete of the Year**

- Owayne Owens led the Virginia program on the academic side after being named the ACC Scholar Athlete of the Year -An award that recognizes the conference's elite athletes who excell at the highest level in the classroom.
- · He becomes the first Virginia athlete to win the award for the indoor track season fourth overall
- Owens graduates with a masters in Leadership and Public Policy
