OPENING KICK

- Virginia will host Wake Forest at Scott Stadium for the first time since 2012. The Cavaliers are looking to snap a four-game winless streak against the Demon Deacons.
- The matchup features two coaches, Bronco Mendenhall and Dave Clawson, that rank in the top 16 in wins among active FBS coaches. Clawson ranks 15th with 133 wins while Mendenhall is right behind him at No. 16 with 131 wins.
- Virginia has won six-straight home games including non-conference wins over William & Mary and Illinois this season.
- Virginia will play its third night game of the season on Friday. Under Bronco Mendenhall, the Cavaliers are 8-1 at home in night games and have won eight-straight home games under the lights.



Armstrong passed for 554 yards against North Carolina, the most by a FBS quarterback in a game this season.

CLOSE CALLS AGAINST WAKE FOREST

- Six of the last eight games between Wake Forest and Virginia each have been decided by a touchdown or less.
- Virginia's last win against Wake Forest came in 2007 at Scott Stadium. Mikell Simpson scored from one yard out with 2:18 left in the fourth quarter. It was Virginia's fifth win by six points or fewer that year, a then-FBS record.
- The last three wins by UVA were by a combined eight points, including a one-point thriller in 2007 at Scott Stadium.
- After UVA won 20-of-21 meetings with Wake Forest (1984-2007), the Demon Deacons have won four-straight, their longest win streak of the series.

LAST MEETING

- With starting quarterback Brennan Armstrong out due to an injury, the Cavaliers used three different quarterbacks (Lindell Stone, Ira Armstead and Keytaon Thompson) and rushed for a total of 218 yards in a 40-23 loss at Wake Forest last season.
- Billy Kemp IV caught nine passes for 68 yards in the contest. Through four games last season he caught 36 passes, the most in program history over the first four games of a season.
- The two teams were tied 20-20 at the half before Wake Forest outscored UVA 20-3 in the second half.
- Demon Deacon running back Kenneth Walker III rushed for 128 yards and three scores and kicker Nick Sciba was a perfect 4-for-4 on field goal attempts including a long of 44 with 5:36 remaining in the fourth quarter.

WAKE FOREST CONNECTION

- Former Cavalier quarterback and coach Wayne Lineburg is Wake Forest's special teams coordinator and tight ends coach. A 1996 UVA graduate, Lineburg played quarterback and was part of three bowl teams and a member of UVA's 1995 ACC Championship team.
- Lineburg was a graduate assistant at UVA from 1998-99 and returned to UVA as an assistant on Al Groh's staff from 2007-09. He's had previous coaching stints at Richmond and William & Mary.

UVA AT HOME

- Since 2019, UVA is 14-1 at Scott Stadium. That is the seventh best overall home winning percentage in college football over the past two seasons and UVA's 19-2 home record since 2018 ranks No. 2 among all ACC teams.
- In its recent 8-1 stretch at home since 2019, Virginia has won three-straight home games against ACC foes.
- Since 2018 season, Virginia is 19-2 at home. Last year's loss against NC State in Charlottesville snapped a nine-game win streak at home, the third-longest of the UVA modern era.

NATIONAL/ACC RANKINGS

- Virginia enters Friday with the No. 2 passing offense in the country behind Western Kentucky (456.6). The Cavaliers are averaging 438.3 yards per game through the air.
- The Cavaliers enter the week averaging 559.3 yards of total offense, tops in the ACC and fourth most of any school in FBS.
- Brennan Armstrong leads the nation in passing yards per game (432.7). He ranks in the top five in the country in completions per game (2nd - 29), passing touchdowns (2nd - 11), passing yards (2nd - 1,298), points responsible for (3rd - 80), passing efficiency (4th - 188.7) and points responsible for per game (4th - 26.7)
- Virginia has 80 first downs this season, the third most in the ACC and the 13th most in the country.

RECORD BREAKING PERFORMANCE

- The Cavaliers broke the school single-game record for passing yards with 553 against North Carolina.
- It was the first time a UVA quarterback and a UVA offense accumulated 500 yards or more passing. It marked only the fifth time UVA has thrown for 400 or more yards as a team and the second time its passed for 400 or more yards in an ACC contest.

ARMSTRONG'S CAREER NIGHT IN CHAPEL HILL

- Brennan Armstrong passed for school-record 554 yards in UVA's 59-39 loss at North Carolina. It was the third-highest single-game total in ACC History.

- Armstrong is the first Cavalier quarterback to pass for 300 yards in consecutive games.
- Armstrong accounted for 538 yards of total offense, breaking the program's single game record previously held by Bryce Perkins (490 yards) against North Carolina in 2019. It was the seventh highest single-game total in ACC history.
- The 538 yards of total offense and the 554 yards passing are the most by any FBS player this season.
- Armstrong established career-highs in completions (39), attempts (54), passing yards (554), total yards and (538). It marked the second-straight week he established new career highs in completions and passing yards.
- The 554 yards passing was the most ever by a quarterback against North Carolina. Dave Brown of Duke set the previous record of 479 in 1989.
- Armstrong also set a UVA first half record, 364 yards in the first half.

ON THE RECEIVING END

- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks established career-highs in receptions (7) and yards (183) on Saturday against North Carolina. His 183 yards receiving were the sixth-highest single-game total ever by a UVA receiver. He caught a 40-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the second TD reception of 40 or more yards in his career (44 vs. Liberty in 2019).
- Wicks was the first UVA wideout with 150 yards in a game since Olamide Zaccheaus' school record 247 against Ohio in 2018.
- After three weeks of action, Wicks is second in the ACC in yards receiving with 346. He ranks in the top-10 in all purpose yards per game (7th - 115.3), receiving touchdowns (T-3 - 3) and yards per reception (T-2 - 24.71)
- Billy Kemp established career highs in yards (106) and touchdowns (2) against North Carolina. Kemp had a 32-yard reception in the 2nd quarter, a career-long.
- Virginia had two wide receivers with 100 or more receiving yards (Wicks-183, Kemp-106) against North Carolina, the first time since 2019 when Hasise Dubois (143) and Joe Reed (107) vs. Notre Dame in 2019.
- Armstrong and Keytaon Thompson found 11 different receivers against North Carolina. Jacob Rodriguez and Malachi Fields hauled in the first receptions of their careers against North Carolina.
- Virginia has five players ranked in the ACC's top 17 in receiving yards (No. 2. Wicks, No. 7. Kemp No. 11. Thompson, No. 15. Woods, No. 17. Henry)

HISTORIC OFFENSIVE START

- The Cavaliers have amassed 1,678 yards of total offense through the first three games, tops in the ACC and the sixth most in the country.
- This season marks the second time in program history Virginia has started the year with 500 yards of total offense in its first three games. UVA started the 2004 season with 504 yards at Temple, 549 yards against North Carolina and 522 yards against Akron.
- Through three games this season Virginia has posted total offense figures of 545 (vs. William & Mary), 556 (vs. Illinois) and 577 (at North Carolina).

MILESTONE WATCH

- Billy Kemp currently ranks 14th on UVA's all-time receptions list and is nine catches away from entering the top-10 and can move up to 13th with two catches to tie Germane Crowell (1994-97)
- Left tackle Ryan Nelson is poised to make his 41st-straight start for the Cavaliers, the most career starts and most consecutive starts of anyone on the team.
- Wayne Taulapapa needs 51 more yards rushing to become the 45th Cavalier to eclipse 1,000 yards for his career.

DEFENSIVE/SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

- Linebacker Noah Taylor was credited with a career-high 12 tackles against North Carolina, the first double-digit tackle effort of his career.
- Fentrell Cypress recorded his first career interception picking off a Sam Howell pass in the end zone and returning it 66 yards. The return was the 11th longest in program history.
- Virginia special teams has not fielded a kick return since week one against William & Mary. Opponents have kicked 13-straight touchbacks, including 10 by North Carolina on Saturday.
- The Cavaliers did not give up a red zone score this season until the second half against North Carolina. The Cavaliers rank third in the ACC and 17th in the country in red zone defense (0.600)
- Kicker Justin Duenkel has 14 touchbacks this season. Virginia is ranked 15th in the country in kick return defense (12.5 yards per return).

THE TOP 100

- Bronco Mendenhall won his 131st game as a collegiate coach earlier this year against Illinois. The win entered him into the top-100 of all-time in career victories by coaches at major schools.
- The 131 wins are the 10th most among active coaches at major schools.
- Mendenhall improved to 32-33 in his tenure at Virginia.

2021 CAPTAINS

- Senior Keytaon Thompson is listed on the UVA depth chart as a "FBP" or "Football Player". The versatile Thompson has lined up under center, in the backfield and out wide during his time at UVA.
- Thompson, a transfer from Mississippi State, is also known as "Trick Bag", a nickname given to him in high school as a tribute to his athleticism.

STRONG UP FRONT

- Headlined by Olusegun Oluwatimi, Virginia returns six offensive linemen – Ryan Nelson, Bobby Haskins, Ryan Swoboda, Chris Glaser, and Joe Bissinger that have combined to start 137 games.
- Last season the offensive line ranked No. 1 in the ACC and No. 12 in the nation in tackles for loss allowed (4.2). It ranked No. 3 in the nation among "Power-Five" schools in most rushing yards before contact per rush attempt (.270), trailing just Ohio State and Notre Dame

DEFENSIVE RETURNEES

- On the other side of the ball, the Cavaliers return five starters that have played in 20 or more college football games – Adeeb Atariwa, Mandy Alonso, De'Vante Cross, Nick Grant and Joey Blount.
- Alonso leads all defensive returners with 30 career starts
- De'Vante Cross has started 27-straight games, the longest active streak on the defensive side of the ball.

Bronco Mendenhall

Head Coach • Sixth Season

Since arriving at Virginia for the 2016 season, head coach Bronco Mendenhall has made an immense impact on the Cavalier program. From a two-win season, to the ACC's Coastal Division Championship and a New Year's Six bowl invitation, Virginia football's ascent has both remarkable and historic.

Mendenhall came to Charlottesville after a highly successful 11-year career at BYU with a vision and a plan of execution for the daunting renovation project he faced. He has masterfully crafted principles and culture, and instilled pride and purpose, leading to a standard of unbroken growth in just four seasons.

Having a plan and being able to execute a strategic approach to achieving results have been mission critical to Mendenhall's formula for success.

"Teams and organizations are perfectly designed to get the results that they get," Mendenhall is fond of saying regarding both successes and failures. His pursuit of "unbroken growth" centers around learning, applying and improving on tools, frameworks, networks, innovation and processes that deliver those results. His ultimate goal is more expansive than building a great football organization. He strives to build great people.

On-field success is just part of the story Mendenhall has scripted at Virginia. He is a powerful believer in balance, which he frequently sums up with one simple word ... AND. It has become the calling card for the UVA football program.

"I think decisions are made based on principle, and I think principles are governed by beliefs," Mendenhall said. "AND is one of our guiding principles, and that is based on my belief that football is a vehicle to develop people."

At his introductory press conference, Mendenhall stressed that he wanted students AND athletes and believed that combination was achievable, especially at an institution such as Virginia that ranks among the top three public universities in the nation. Since that time, he has not compromised his approach to achieving those means. More importantly, his teams have bought in on the concepts with great enthusiasm and demonstrated they can do so while also being successful on the field.

"I would love to win a national championship," Mendenhall said. "I'd love to develop a great program here. But what I would really love is for every kid in my program to have an amazing life."

In the world of big-time football, Mendenhall's philosophy is unconventional, but that doesn't faze him.

"I'm looking for the complete development of everyone in our program – and winning," he said. "One is not at the expense of the other. I think they go hand-in-hand, and winning, without the other, would be hollow to me."

Under Mendenhall, the UVA program has progressed from two to six to eight to nine wins prior to the 2020 pandemic-shortened season that saw the Cavaliers go 5-5. Achievements and recognitions on the field, in the classroom and around the community have exponentially increased as well.

In 2019, UVA placed 10 players on the ACC All-Academic team, the most in the program's history. Seven earned the award in 2020 when a total of 34 Cavaliers received ACC Honor Roll honors. Also in 2019, linebacker Jordan Mack was named the ACC's Jim Tatum Award winner as the league's top football scholar-athlete and was a finalist for the William B. Campbell Trophy, known in the sport as the "academic Heisman." Linebacker Micah Kiser, now a member of the Los Angeles Rams, won the award in 2017.

Giving back has become a cornerstone of Virginia football. Players frequently visit the University's Children's Medical Center and speak at local elementary schools. The team's Thursday's Heroes program has been recognized for its efforts to honor individuals across the state of Virginia who are dealing with personal adversity. In 2020, the ACC honored the Thursday's Heroes program with its "Game Changers" award, which recognizes and highlights specific conference teams' involvement with their local communities.

"I'm in pursuit, and we're in pursuit as a football program, of both of those things, and without compromising our expectations for one or the other," Mendenhall said. "I want good young people. I'm talking about morals, values, character, behavior and contribution to the world. And I want a great team. I know it sounds idealistic, but I would not coach football if I did not think it could be done, and I would not coach at Virginia if I did not think there was support for doing it that way."

Mendenhall's pursuit of individual growth is only magnified by the success his teams have also achieved on the field. His name appears often when the accolades of college football's leading active coaches are charted.

THE ARMSTRONG ERA

- QB Brennan Armstrong was named the starting quarterback by Bronco Mendenhall on Aug. 27, 2020. He was the third opening-day starting quarterback under Bronco Mendenhall, joining Kurt Benkert (2016-17) and Bryce Perkins (2018-19).
- Armstrong is the first left-handed starting QB at UVA since Jameel Sewell (2006, 2007, 2009).
- Armstrong enrolled at UVA in January 2018 and backed up Perkins for two seasons, saving his redshirt season in 2018 under the NCAA participation rules.
- Armstrong is the 13th different UVA starting quarterback to start an opener in the last 17 seasons. The list includes: Bryce Perkins (2018-19), Kurt Benkert (2016-17), Matt Johns (2015), Greyson Lambert (2014), David Watford (2013), Michael Rocco (2011-12), Marc Verica (2010), Vic Hall (2009), Peter Lalach (2008), Jameel Sewell (2007), Christian Olsen (2006) and Marques Hagans (2005).

2020 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- Tied for the FBS lead with most single-season games (6) with 200+ yards passing and 45+ yards rushing
- Tied for the FBS lead with most single-season games (4) with 200+ yards passing, 45+ yards rushing yards, 1+ passing touchdowns and 1+ rushing touchdowns, going 4-0 in such games
- No. 3 in the ACC and No. 18 in the nation with 296.6 yards of total offense a game
- No. 8 in the nation among non-option quarterbacks with 552 yards rushing
- No. 3 in the ACC and No. 25 in the nation with 15.6 points responsible for per game
- Brennan Armstrong rushed for 552 yards over the course of nine games in 2020 which ranks No. 4 all-time on UVA's single-season quarterback rushing list.
- QB Brennan Armstrong threw for 200+ yards in each of his first two career starts, including 269 against Duke and 270 at No. 1 Clemson. He is only the second Cavalier to throw for 200+ passing yards in each of his first two career starts. Armstrong joins Matt Blundin, who did so in his first four career starts that spanned 1989, 1990 and 1991.
- With UVA trailing by three points (20-17) entering the fourth quarter in the season-opening win over Duke, Armstrong was 8-of-9 passing for 144 yards and two touchdowns. His lone incompletion was ruled a catch on the field by Davis Jr., but overturned on replay.
- Armstrong passed for 270 yards and three touchdowns at No. 1 Clemson, while also rushing for 89 more yards. Dating back to 2000, he is the only QB to pass for 225+ yards, pass for 3+ touchdowns and rush for 70+ yards in a game against the Tigers.
- With Armstrong under center, the UVA offense accumulated 417 yards of total offense at No. 1 Clemson. The Cavaliers became the first ACC team to earn 400+ yards of total offense against the Tigers since 2017 when NC State (Nov. 4) did so. Since the start of the 2019 season only LSU, Notre Dame, Ohio State, Virginia (twice) and Syracuse have averaged 5.0+ yards per play against the Clemson defense.

ARMSTRONG VS. ASSOCIATED PRESS TOP 25 TEAMS

- In four career games against AP top-25 teams (No. 1 Clemson, No. 11 Miami and No. 15 North Carolina and No. 21 North Carolina) Armstrong has thrown for 1,213 yards (303.3 yards per game), 12 touchdowns (4 INTs) and rushed for 230 more yards and another score. That comes out to 1,443 yards of total offense (360.7 ypg) and 13 touchdowns responsible for.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

- The Virginia football program under Bronco Mendenhall has 14 guiding principles. They can be found on the walls of the McCue Center and outlining the fences of the practice facility. They are a constant reminder to the foundation of the program. Each one is a vehicle for the Virginia football program to develop people.
 - **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* "I would love to win a national championship. I'd love to develop a great program here. But what I would really love is for every kid in my program to have an amazing life."

THE 4TH SIDE

- The 4th Side will be woven into the UVA home game experience in 2021. Life-size 4th Side letters are located on the northeast concourse and are a perfect game day photo opportunity. The Virginia student section will unveil a giant 4thSide Tifo just prior to kickoff at every home game. Additionally, the stadium concourses will include new 4th Side pageantry posters to reinforce the importance of UVA fans and their contributions to the game day atmosphere.
- Offense and defense are two sides. Special teams is the third side. **The 4th Side**, in Bronco Mendenhall's teaching, is the sidelines. Mendenhall has made it a point of emphasis with his team since arriving in Charlottesville that **The 4th Side** is as important as the other three. And just as he expects his teams to perform on offense, defense and special teams, Mendenhall wants his players on the sidelines to thrive. By extension, the UVA fan base is also part of the **The 4th Side**.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* "It starts on our sideline and possibly the name of all of our fans as the entire stadium becomes The 4th Side."
- **WR Terrell Jana** *Said It:* "It is the 4th Side for a reason because of the four aspects of the team. Coach shows film in the meeting room of players on the 4th Side. The team sees that and takes pride in that."

EARN YOUR JERSEY NUMBER

- Head coach Bronco Mendenhall introduced what he sees as the bedrock of his "earned not given" mantra when he arrived in Charlottesville in 2016. The majority of numbers are picked over the course of the selection ceremonies during the final three weekends of fall camp. Once the season ends, all players return to the status of no number for winter conditioning, spring ball and summer workouts.
- To be considered for number selection, players have to meet certain physical benchmarks – weight room numbers, conditioning times, etc. – but it's also about dedication to the program, overall effort in practice and having the right disposition in the locker room.
- Bronco Mendenhall doesn't choose the order. The task unit leaders do.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* "The task unit leaders, they're the ones who are with their teammates every day in the locker room. They're with them in class. They're with them in their apartments. They see a lot more than I see. Our players have embraced it, and it matters to them to be endorsed by their peers to be on our team."
- Alum **Jordan Mack** *Said It:* "Part of our program is earned not given. They know what to expect coming in, and they know nothing is going to be given. To earn a number, gear, anything with a Virginia sabre on it, you're going to have to earn it through your hard work."

STATE CHANGES

- White ► Grey ► Orange ► Navy ► Black
- Workout gear color is immediate feedback where our student-athletes stand in their training in order to drive positive change.
- Everything in performance is tracked from the moment they step on Grounds to show their gains. All new players begin their UVA careers wearing white.
- Black workout gear is the pinnacle in the UVA strength & conditioning. Nick Grant and Mandy Alonso were the only to players on the current roster to reach black.

THURSDAY'S HEROES

- The Thursday's Heroes program is coordinated by the UVA team. Originally at BYU, Thursday's Heroes transitioned to UVA when Bronco Mendenhall became Head Coach in 2016. Since then, the program has continued to grow, warming the hearts of players, coaches, fans, and of course, the Heroes. Each Thursday during the Fall and Spring season, an individual who is undergoing a difficult circumstance (medical, physical, cognitive, etc.) and their family is invited to tour the football facilities, watch practice, meet the coaches/team, and receive special gifts unique to each Hero. Different players take turns showering the Hero with gifts, including UVA gear, an official game jersey, Beats by Dre, a bicycle, school supplies, Halloween costumes, and special video messages from favorite celebrities (Peyton Manning, Kenny Chesney, Damian Lillard, Chris Long and Hugh Jackman to name a few have taken part). The goal of the program is simple: to put a smile on the Hero's face and to welcome them to the Virginia Football family.
- TB **Wayne Taulapapa** *Said It:* "Everybody is Somebody ... Every day we look up to them and the fight they are in. We want them to know they are with us and we are with them."

UNIQUELY VIRGINIA FOOTBALL

MAD HATTERS (PUT ON THE HATS)

- The “Mad Hatters” is the name of the Virginia Football Scout Team. It drew inspiration from the character frozen in time in “Alice in Wonderland,” but the name has as much to do with the evolution of pennies scout team players once draped over their shoulder pads to brightly colored pieces of fabric, which stretch over their helmets. Hence, “Put on the hats.”
- Each Thursday after practice the “Mad Hatter of the Week” is announced by a task unit leader.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “The way I frame it to our team is without going through that process, I think there is a fundamental step missed in their development. Most recruits and most young people want to come in and play their first year. Most of us, right, it’s kind of about us. When you’re in that role, it’s really about serving and helping your team.”

UVA GROUNDSKEEPERS

- Virginia’s football program wants to be a catalyst for change in the community, helping to turn the pain of the Charlottesville riots of Aug. 12, 2017 into a celebration of life, love and unity. During the summer of 2020, a player-led initiative was born in the form of the Groundskeepers in order to “Take Back our Grounds” from the white nationalists that descended upon Charlottesville in 2017.
- To be part of the Groundskeepers, participants take part in their own march, which starts downtown at Heather Heyer Way — the street named in honor of the woman who lost her life during the Aug. 12 demonstrations — before heading to the Enslaved Workers Memorial and the Rotunda.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “We chose to take this march in direct opposition and the exact opposite direction of the events that happened in the death of Heather Heyer. We’re standing against hate, inequality, anything that doesn’t reflect well on the state of mankind, especially at the University of Virginia.
- **OLB Charles Snowden** *Said It:* We are committed to making a change in our community. We are committed to fighting for what’s right. We are committed to a better future. We are the Groundskeepers. Just thinking about what transpired those two days and what those two days signify and stand for — There were protests led in the name of hatred, racism, oppression and that’s harmful. That’s hurtful to a lot of people and that’s not what the city of Charlottesville stands for. That’s not what the University of Virginia stands for. The Groundskeepers here at UVA, we just want to show that’s not who we are and not what we stand for. So we’re just trying to take back the power of those days and show that we stand for love, unity, respect, uplifting one another, and just doing what’s right.”
- One of UVA’s four flags they run onto the field with each game is a flag that represents the Groundskeeper, which serves as constant reminder to the community of the importance of being unified in love rather than hate.

THE SHIELD

- The shield is an important part of the Virginia football program. On the shield, which was modeled after shields used in the movie 300, has three numbers: +1, 24, +5. They represent a formula that Bronco Mendenhall and his staff developed after years of data study and analytics that will lead to probable wins. Each game UVA’s goal is to be at least +1 in turnover margin, score at least 24 points while holding opponents under 24 points and being at least +5 in field position. Accomplishing each of those goals in a game creates a winning scenario.
- Virginia’s shield (pictured) is always represented in the UVA locker room.
- The shield also has the UVA guiding principles painted around the shield.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 490 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 284-194-12.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WAH

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

- Virginia has now won eight-straight night games
- The Cavaliers improve to 84-39-9 all-time in season openers
- Under Bronco Mendenhall, Virginia has won five of six season openers
- Billy Kemp had four receptions against W&M and now has 108 for his career, tied with Patrick Jeffers for the 19th most in UVA history.
- Kemp's career-high, 55-yard punt return in the first quarter setup the game's only points in the first quarter, a 39-yard field goal by Justin Duenkel.
- The Cavalier defense held William & Mary to 183 yards of total offense, the first time holding an opponent to under 200 yards since limiting the Tribe to 193 in 2019.
- Virginia's last shutout in a season opener came on August 30, 2003, a 27-0 blanking of Duke.
- Virginia is 31-6-1 against W&M and has won five-straight meetings
- Saturday's shutout was the 13th against William & Mary in 39 all-time games. The last time the Cavaliers shutout the Tribe was in 1951, a 46-0 victory in Charlottesville.
- It marked the first time William & Mary was shutout since September 29, 2018 (23-0 against Colgate).
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong passed for 336 yards, his second 300-yard passing game of his career
- The Cavalier offense amassed 500 yards of total offense for the three-straight home game. The Cavaliers compiled 518 yards against Abilene Christian on Nov. 21 and 549 against Boston College in last year's home finale.
- Armstrong scored Virginia's first touchdown of the season, a two-yard rush in the second quarter. The signal caller also scored the first of the year last year, a four-yard score against Duke.
- UVA has now wone nine-straight games against non-conference opponents at Scott Stadium. UVA is 10-2 under Mendenhall against non-ACC foes.
- Since 2019, Virginia is 13-1 at Scott Stadium.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson led UVA with 12 tackles, the eighth time in his career he's recorded 10 or more tackles.
- Saturday marked the first career starts for Dontavion Wicks, Chayce Chalmers and Fentrell Cypress.
- Three true freshmen made their debut for the Cavaliers – West Weeks, Langston Long and Jacob Rodriguez.

Game Notes

- Virginia recorded its first win over Illinois in three all-time meetings. The two teams have only met in bowl games, the 1999 MicronPc.com Bowl and the 1990 Citrus Bowl.
- Virginia has won five of its last seven matchups against Big Ten foes.
- Since 2019, UVA is 14-1 at Scott Stadium and have won 10-straight games at home against non-conference opponents.
- Virginia is 2-0 for the second time under Bronco Mendenhall (2019) and sixth time since 2000.
- Virginia has held its first two opponents of the season to 14 points, the fewest since shutting out both of its first two opponents in 1952.
- Brennan Armstrong became the third Cavalier quarterback to throw for 400 yards in a game. His 405 yards passing are the fourth most in a single game in program history.
- Armstrong threw five touchdown passes, a career-high and the most by a UVA quarterback since Kurt Benkert against Central Michigan in 2016. Armstrong has thrown multiple touchdown passes in three-straight games dating back to last season.
- Armstrong completed a career-high 27 passes. He was 7-for-13 with 171 yards (career-best) and two touchdowns in the first quarter. He completed seven of his first eight passes and completed six-straight passes starting with the Jelani Woods touchdown.
- Tight end Jelani Woods recorded a career-high 122 yards receiving, the most by a Cavalier tight end since Tom Santi (128 yards) in the 2005 Music City Bowl against Minnesota. Woods' previous career high of 54 yards receiving was established against Iowa State on Oct. 24, 2020 while at Oklahoma State.
- Woods' touchdown in the first quarter was the fifth of his career.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks caught three passes for 69 yards and two touchdowns. The two touchdown performance was the first of his career and the first by a UVA wideout since Lavel Davis Jr. caught two in the opener against Duke last season.
- Billy Kemp IV caught six passes bringing his career total up to 112, the 19th most in school history, two behind Herman Moore (1988-90) and Wali Lundy (2002-05). • Kemp IV has caught a pass in 17-straight games dating back to the 2019 season.
- Kemp's TD reception in the third quarter was his first of the season and third of his career.
- Brennan Armstrong caught his first pass of his career on the first career completion thrown by WR Dontayvion Wicks for 18 yards in the third quarter.
- Wayne Taulapapa's capped the UVA scoring in the fourth quarter with his first career receiving touchdown, a three-yard pass from Armstrong.
- Linebacker Noah Taylor recorded a career-high two sacks and now has six for his career.

Game Notes

- Virginia had its four-game winning streak against North Carolina snapped. The Cavaliers are 4-2 against the Tar Heels under Bronco Mendenhall.
- Virginia falls to 66-36-1 all-time in night games and 24-34 in road night games.
- The loss snaps a five-game win streak in ACC openers and is the first ACC opening loss under Mendenhall.
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's single-game passing record with 554 yards breaking Kurt Benkert's mark of 455 set in 2017 against UConn. He's the first Cavalier quarterback to throw for 500 yards in a game. He threw for 364 yards in the first half, also a program record.
- Armstrong accounted for 538 yards of total offense breaking the single-game school record set by Bryce Perkins (490 yards) against North Carolina in 2019.
- Armstrong the first UVA quarterback to throw for 300 yards in three-straight games. The 300-yard game was the fourth of his career.
- Armstrong threw four touchdown passes in the contest, the third time he's thrown for four or more touchdowns in a game. He now has 31 career touchdown passes, the seventh most in UVA history.
- Armstrong moved into 14th place in career total offense at UVA with 4,333 yards, passing Dan Ellis (1997-2000) and Bob Davis (1964-66).
- Armstrong entered UVA's top-15 in career passing yards with 3,673.
- The 554 yards passing was the most ever by a North Carolina opposing quarterback. Previous high was Dave Brown (Duke) 479 yards in 1989.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks established career-highs in receptions (7) and yards (183). His 183 yards receiving were the sixth-highest single-game total ever by a UVA receiver. He caught a 40-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the second TD reception of 40 or more yards in his career (44 vs. Liberty in 2019).
- Billy Kemp IV caught a team-high eight passes and has now caught a pass in 18-straight games. He finished with a career-high 104 yards receiving, his first 100-yard receiving game of his career. He scored touchdowns of 21 and nine yards, his first two-touchdown game of his career.
- Kemp has 120 career receptions, tied with Germane Crowell (1994-97) for the 14th most in school history.
- Fentrell Cypress recorded his first career interception taking Sam Howell's pass to the end zone 66 yards. The return was the 11th longest in program history.
