

OPENING KICK

- Virginia is making its 22nd bowl appearance and fourth in the last five years. The program opted out of a bowl game last season and has been eligible each year since the 2017.
- The Fenway Bowl first college football bowl game to be played at the historic home of the Boston Red Sox, and the first Division I bowl game to be held in New England. Football games have been played at Fenway Park as far back as 1914.
- The Cavaliers will play their first game in the city of Boston since 2010 when they visited Boston College. UVA is winless in all three previous games played in Boston, all against BC.
- The Fenway Bowl matchup against SMU is the first ever meeting between the Mustangs and Cavaliers. UVA has squared off against one other AAC opponent in a bowl - Navy (2017 Military Bowl).
- Virginia and SMU are two of the top passing offenses in the country. The Cavaliers rank 2nd, averaging 392.6 yards passing per game while SMU ranks 14th throwing for 304.5 yards per game. Only 15 programs in the country have averaged over 300 yards passing per game this season.



Quarterback Brennan Armstrong is averaging 404.4 passing yards per game. No other QB in ACC history has ever averaged over 348 yards per game.

TOP STORYLINES

- Virginia became bowl eligible after winning four-straight games, culminating with a 48-40 win over Georgia Tech on Oct. 23. The Cavaliers have dropped four-straight since, including three to nationally ranked opponents (then-No. 25 BYU, then-No. 7 Notre Dame & then-No. 20 Pitt). It was the first time UVA faced three-straight ranked opponents in the regular season since 2005.
- Head coach Bronco Mendenhall announced on Dec. 2 that he will step down as UVA's head coach after the Fenway Bowl. Virginia has been bowl eligible in five of his six seasons at UVA.
- Virginia is seeking its seventh win of 2021, the third seven-win season under Bronco Mendenhall.
- The Cavaliers are looking to avoid their fifth-straight loss. UVA hasn't lost five in-a-row since 2016, Mendenhall's first season in Charlottesville.

- 145** Passing yards needed for Brennan Armstrong to break the ACC single-season passing record.
- 415** Points scored this season, the third most in UVA history. UVA has eclipsed the 400-point mark five times (2021, 2019, 2002 1990, & 1894) in 132 years of football.
- 515.8** Virginia's average total yards per game, the third highest in the country. Only five teams nationally average over 500 yards per game this season.

• The Fenway Bowl is UVA's fourth all-time game against an AAC school, while that program is an active member of the conference, which began in 2013.

• UVA is 18-36 all-time against current members of the American Athletic Conference, this includes 39 games against Navy. UVA has faced AAC member East Carolina (1-2), Navy (11-28), Temple (2-0) and Tulane (2-4).

RB DEVIN DARRINGTON FENWAY HISTORY

• The Fenway Bowl will be the second game played by graduate student Devin Darrington at Fenway Park.
• Darrington, a Harvard transfer, played Yale at Fenway Park on Nov. 17, 2018, a 47-27 victory for the Crimson.
• Darrington rushed nine times for 91 yards and scored two touchdowns against Yale.

UVA WELCOMES TONY ELLIOTT

• Former Clemson offensive coordinator Tony Elliott was announced as the Fralin Family Head Football coach on Dec. 10 and will assume the role at the conclusion of the Fenway Bowl.
• Elliott spent 11 seasons as an assistant on Dabo Swinney's staff and the last seven years as an offensive coordinator.
• In his time at Clemson, the Tigers won six Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, made four appearances in the College Football Playoff National Championship game and captured national titles in 2016 and 2018.
• In his 16 years as a full-time college coach, Elliott has been a part of 15 winning seasons including 10-win seasons at Clemson from 2011-2020.

SMU COACHING TIES

• SMU is also going through a coaching transition as Sonny Dykes was hired as the head coach at TCU back on Nov. 30.
• Defensive Coordinator Jim Leavitt will serve as the Mustangs' interim head coach for the bowl game before former Miami offensive coordinator Rhett Lashlee will take over after the new year.
• Leavitt was an analyst at Florida State in 2019 when UVA defeated the Seminoles 31-24 at Scott Stadium.
• Lashlee faced UVA as an offensive coordinator in 2017 while he was at UConn (UVA won 38-18). While at Miami, Lashlee was 1-1 against UVA as the offensive coordinator including a 30-28 loss earlier this season.

HOW WE GOT HERE

• Including SMU, 9 of Virginia's 13 opponents are playing in postseason bowl games (North Carolina, Wake Forest, Miami, Louisville, BYU, Notre Dame, Pitt, Virginia Tech).
• Virginia has won four-straight and lost four-straight games in the same season for the second consecutive year. The Cavaliers won four-straight before falling to Virginia Tech in the 2020 season finale.
• With losses to North Carolina and Wake Forest, Virginia found itself at 2-2 with road games against Miami and Louisville in a 10-day stretch.
• The Cavaliers escaped with a 30-28 victory over Miami on Thursday night thanks to a 33-yard missed field goal by the Hurricanes as time expired. It snapped a five-game road losing streak and UVA recorded its first road win since Nov. 2, 2019 at North Carolina.
• Virginia erased a 17-point fourth-quarter deficit against Louisville, outscoring the Cardinals 21-3 in the final stanza. The 21 points were the most points in the fourth quarter all season.
• The back-to-back road wins sparked a four-game win streak and had Virginia sitting at 6-2 with four regular season games to play.

• Brennan Armstrong needs 191 yards of total offense to break UVA's career total offense record held by Bryce Perkins (2018-19).
• Armstrong needs one rushing touchdown to become the fifth ACC quarterback to throw for 30 touchdowns and rush for 10 touchdowns in the same season.

• Armstrong needs 145 yards to break the ACC's single season passing record held by Deshaun Watson. He needs 562 yards of total offense to break the league's single season total offense mark set by Lamar Jackson in 2017.
• 35 points would break Virginia's single-season scoring record set over 14 games in 2019. Virginia is averaging 34.6 points per game this season.
• Four touchdowns would tie the school's single season touchdown total set in 1990 and 2019.
• Jelani Woods has eight touchdown receptions this season, the second most by a tight end in UVA history. He needs one touchdown to tie Heath Miller's record of nine set in 2002.
• Woods is 41 yards away from 1,000 yards receiving for his career.

NOTES - OFFENSE

• Keytaon Thompson needs 10 yards receiving to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark for the season. UVA has never had two receivers with 1,000 yards in the same season.

• Running back Wayne Taulapapa needs eight yards rushing to reach 1,200 for his career. A total of 40 Cavaliers have reached the 1,200-yard mark in their careers.

THE 1,000 YARD RECEIVING CLUB

• Dontayvion Wicks became the fifth Cavalier to eclipse 1,000 yards receiving in a season after catching two passes for 32 yards against Notre Dame.

• Wicks matched Herman Moore as the fastest of the five to 1,000 yards. Wicks and Moore both reached the 1,000-yard mark in their 10th game of the season. Moore had 1,010 yards through 10 games back in 1990.

• Wicks is one of 13 wide receivers nationally with 1,200 yards this season and his 57 receptions are the fewest of the 12 wide receivers.

• Keytaon Thompson needs 10 yards to reach 1,000 yards for the season. Virginia has never had two wide receivers over 1,000 yards in the same season. He's had over 89 yards receiving in his last five games.

• Thompson set a new career-high with 11 catches against Pitt. He has nine or more catches in four of his last five games.

OVER THE CENTURY MARK

• Virginia has five receivers record 100-yard performances this season (Wicks-6; Thompson-3; Kemp-2; Woods-1; Henry-1) .

• Dontayvion Wicks recorded three-straight 100-yard receiving games beginning with Duke on Oct. 16. Germane Crowell (1997) is the only other UVA wideout with three-straight 100-yard receiving games in the same season.

• Wicks and Crowell are the only two Cavalier wide receivers with six 100-yard games in the same season. Crowell had six 100-yard games in 1997.

• The Cavaliers have had two players with 100 yards receiving in the same game three times this season, most recently against Pitt where Wicks racked up 144 yards and Thompson had 126. Wicks (183) and Kemp (104) each eclipsed 100 against North Carolina while Thompson (149) and Henry (179) went over 100 against Louisville.

THE CAVALIER TARGETS

• Virginia is the only school in the country to have five wide receivers with 500 or more receiving yards. Only two other schools have four (Nevada, Western Kentucky).

• To date, Billy Kemp IV, Keytaon Thompson, Dontayvion Wicks and Ra'Shaun Henry have each caught a pass in Virginia's 12 games this season.

• 15 Cavaliers have caught a pass this season, including quarterback Brennan Armstrong who has 18 receiving yards to his name. Five pass catchers have 30 or more receptions this season.

• Virginia is the only ACC school with four wide receivers in the league's top-16 in receiving yards – Dontayvion Wicks (3rd – 1,203), Keytaon Thompson (7th – 990), Billy Kemp (13th – 623) and Ra'Shaun Henry (15th – 603). No other ACC school has three.

• Wicks earned his second-straight ACC Wide Receiver of the Week award on Oct. 25 after catching six passes for 168 yards and two touchdowns. His 77-yard catch and run in the second quarter against Georgia Tech was the longest play from scrimmage for UVA in 2021. Wicks is the first UVA wideout since Herman Moore in 1990 to win back-to-back ACC Wide Receiver Week honors.

• Wicks is tops in the ACC and sixth in the country with 21.11 yards per reception. His 1,203 yards receiving are the third most in the ACC and rank 13th in FBS. Wicks has hauled in nine touchdowns on the year, third most in the conference and tied for 27th most among FBS receivers.

WOODS RELIABLE IN THE PASS GAME

• Tight end Jelani Woods eclipsed the 500-yard receiving mark after racking up 75 yards against Pitt and goes into the Fenway bowl with 44 receptions, 598 yards and eight touchdowns.

• He is one of six power five tight ends this season with 550+ receiving yards and ranks fifth among tight ends nationally in touchdown receptions (8).

• Woods has a touchdown in eight of the 11 games he's played this season. He had caught four scores in three seasons (34 games) at Oklahoma State and eclipsed that mark in six games played at UVA.

• Only nine ACC tight ends ever have accumulated 600 or more yards receiving in a season. A total of 10 ACC TE's have 50 or more receptions in a year.

• Armstrong is a captain for the second-straight season, while Alonso, Jackson and Taulapapa were elected for the first time. Only Micah Kiser (2016 & 2017) and Armstrong have been elected captains twice in Mendenhall's tenure.

• Including Armstrong, 12 Cavaliers have been named a captain twice since 1960: Perry Jones (2011-12), Vic Hall (2008-09), Chris Long (2006-07), Brennan Schmidt (2004-05), Byron Thweatt (1999-2000), Anthony Poindexter (1997-98), Shawn Moore (1989-90), Roy Brown (1988-89), Sean Scott (1986-87), Louis Martig (1960-61)

KEMP CONCLUDES BEST SEASON

- Wide receiver Billy Kemp IV announced he'll miss the Fenway Bowl after recovering from injury.
- Kemp established career highs in receptions (74), yards (725) and touchdowns (6) in 2021.
- Kemp caught a pass in 27-straight games, a streak that dated back to the 2019 season.
- The sure-handed Kemp is also one of the most experienced punt returners in college football, fielding 55 career punts, tied for the ninth most among active FBS players.

THE 1,000 YARD CLUB

- Senior Wayne Taulapapa rushed for a season-high 62 yards and 11 carries against Miami. In the process he became the 45th Cavalier to eclipse 1,000 yards for his career.
- He has three total touchdowns this season (2 rush; 1 receiving) and 20 (19 rush; 1 receiving) touchdowns for his career, the team's active leader.

BAG OF TRICKS

- Senior Keytaon Thompson is listed on the UVA depth chart as a "FBP" or "Football Player". The versatile Thompson has lined up under center, in the backfield and out wide during his time at UVA.
- Thompson, a transfer from Mississippi State, is also known as "Trick Bag", a nickname given to him in high school as a tribute to his athleticism.
- In Pro Football Focus' elusive rating, Thompson has 22 missed tackles forced after a reception, tied for the sixth most of any wide receiver. The outlet's "Elusive Rating" distills the success and impact of a runner with the ball independently of the blocking in front of him by looking at how hard he was to bring down.
- Thompson has started a career-high 10 games this season, eight at wide receiver and two at running back.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

- Nick Jackson leads the ACC with 117 tackles and has eclipsed the 100-tackle mark or the second-straight season. He is the first Cavalier with back-to-back 100-tackle seasons since Micah Kiser in 2016 & 2017.
- The UVA defense has featured the ACC's top tackler three times (2016, 2017, 2021) and had student-athletes rank in the top four in six seasons.
- Jackson has recorded double-digit tackles seven times this season including 16 against BYU on Oct. 30 to match his career high.
- Joey Blount recorded a sack and an interception to go along with four tackles at Pitt. The sack in the second quarter was his first of the season and first since Oct. 30, 2019 against Clemson. In the 2019 season opener at Pitt he made seven tackles, had two sacks and intercepted a pass.
- The interception for Blount was his ninth of his career and his third of the season, matching his career-high total of three in 2019. Only 24 Cavaliers have recorded 10 or more interceptions in a career at UVA and the nine career interceptions are the 10th most among active FBS players.
- Blount has 54 solo tackles, the third most in the ACC.
- The Virginia defense has recorded an interception four of the last six games including two against Pitt's Kenny Pickett. It marked only the third time in the two seasons that Pickett threw two or more interceptions in a game.
- Nick Grant has nine pass breakups in 10 games played, tied for the second most in the ACC. He recorded his first career forced fumble in the season finale against Virginia Tech. The turnover gave the UVA offense one more chance to win the game.
- Against Virginia Tech, the Cavaliers combined for a season-high four sacks, the second time this year UVA has record four sacks.
- Two of the four sacks have come from Elliott Brown, Virginia's third multi-sack performance of the season (Mandy Alonso vs. Miami & Noah Taylor vs. Illinois).

"BREAKING THE ROCK"

"Breaking the Rock," has also become a tradition in UVA football, started in 2018 by Shawn Griswold, the team's director of football development and performance. It represents how you move a mountain, one rock at a time. The hardest worker during summer workouts is awarded the honor of swinging the sledgehammer and breaking the designated rock to close the summer phase. After a Cavalier win, the "unofficial player of the game" breaks the rock for that week. Below is the collection of Cavaliers to Break the Rock since the tradition began. Griswold started the tradition while at Tulsa and also included it at Pitt and Arizona State.

SHUTOUTS IN 2021

- Virginia, No. 1 Georgia and Penn State are the only Power-5 schools in the country with multiple shutouts this season.
- To preserve the shutout against Duke, UVA recovered a fumble on the goal line on Duke's final possession of the game. It was the first fumble recovered by the Virginia defense in a goal-to-go situation since 2018 at Pittsburgh.
- The Virginia defense held Duke to 110 yards rushing. The Blue Devils came into the contest with the second-best rushing attack in the ACC, averaging 218 yards per game. It was Duke's lowest rushing total of the season.
- The shutout was Virginia's first in ACC play since 2008 when it blanked Maryland, 31-0.
- Mataeo Durant, who ranked second in the ACC in rushing coming into the game accumulated 82 yards on the ground, only the second time this season he was held under 100 yards.
- Virginia has two shutouts on the season (W&M, 43-0, Duke, 48-0). It marks the first time since 2008, UVA has two or more shutouts in the same season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- Kicker Brendan Farrell is 11-for-11 on field goals from 43 yards and in. Additionally, he is 34-for-34 on extra point tries this season. The 31 extra point conversions are tied for the fourth most in the ACC.
- The 61 touchbacks between Justin Duenkel (37) and Farrell (24) are the seventh most in the country.
- Farrell was chosen to "Break the Rock" after the 48-0 win over Duke. He's the first kicker since Brian Delaney in 2018 to swing the sledgehammer.
- Punter Jacob Finn is averaging 44.2 yards on 39 total punts which currently the fifth-best season average of any punter in school history. His 41 punts this season come up just short of the NCAA national rankings minimums but 29 qualified punters across the country have a higher punt average.
- Against BYU, he kicked a season-long, 59-yarder, the furthest punt by a UVA punter since Nash Griffin's 78-yarder in 2019.

RECORD BREAKING YEAR

- Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's single season passing record in just nine games.
- In addition, Armstrong has set Virginia's single season records for total offense (4,700), passing touchdowns (31) and completions (326).
- Armstrong has thrown a TD pass in the last 17 games he's played, the longest streak in UVA history, eclipsing Matt Schaub's mark of 14-straight in 2002
- Armstrong has thrown for 300 or more yards 10 times and 400 yards six times in 11 games played, both school records. Prior to this year a UVA quarterback hadn't thrown for 300 yards more than four times (Matt Schaub and Bryce Perkins) in the same season or thrown for 400 yards twice in the same season.
- Armstrong has thrown for 400 yards in four-straight games. There were only three 400-yard passing performances in UVA history prior to this season.
- Armstrong owns three of the top 11 passing performances by an FBS quarterback this season. His 554 at UNC were the third most by an FBS QB this season

THE ARMSTRONG ERA

• QB Brennan Armstrong was named the starting quarterback by Bronco Mendenhall on Aug. 27, 2020. He was the third opening-day starting quarterback under Bronco Mendenhall, joining Kurt Benkert (2016-17) and Bryce Perkins (2018-19).
 • Armstrong is the first left-handed starting QB at UVA since Jameel Sewell (2006, 2007, 2009).

• Armstrong enrolled at UVA in January 2018 and backed up Perkins for two seasons, saving his redshirt season in 2018 under the NCAA participation rules.

• Armstrong is the 13th different UVA starting quarterback to start an opener in the last 17 seasons. The list includes: Bryce Perkins (2018-19), Kurt Benkert (2016-17), Matt Johns (2015), Greyson Lambert (2014), David Watford (2013), Michael Rocco (2011-12), Marc Verica (2010), Vic Hall (2009), Peter Lalich (2008), Jameel Sewell (2007), Christian Olsen (2006) and Marques Hagans (2005).

Head Coach • Sixth Season

Since arriving at Virginia for the 2016 season, head coach Bronco Mendenhall has made an immense impact on the Cavalier program. From a two-win season, to the ACC's Coastal Division Championship and a New Year's Six bowl invitation, Virginia football's ascent has both remarkable and historic.

Mendenhall came to Charlottesville after a highly successful 11-year career at BYU with a vision and a plan of execution for the daunting renovation project he faced. He has masterfully crafted principles and culture, and instilled pride and purpose, leading to a standard of unbroken growth in just four seasons.

Having a plan and being able to execute a strategic approach to achieving results have been mission critical to Mendenhall's formula for success.

"Teams and organizations are perfectly designed to get the results that they get," Mendenhall is fond of saying regarding both successes and failures. His pursuit of "unbroken growth" centers around learning, applying and improving on tools, frameworks, networks, innovation and processes that deliver those results. His ultimate goal is more expansive than building a great football organization. He strives to build great people.

On-field success is just part of the story Mendenhall has scripted at Virginia. He is a powerful believer in balance, which he frequently sums up with one simple word ... AND. It has become the calling card for the UVA football program.

"I think decisions are made based on principle, and I think principles are governed by beliefs," Mendenhall said. "AND is one of our guiding principles, and that is based on my belief that football is a vehicle to develop people."

At his introductory press conference, Mendenhall stressed that he wanted students AND athletes and believed that combination was achievable, especially at an institution such as Virginia that ranks among the top three public universities in the nation. Since that time, he has not compromised his approach to achieving those means. More importantly, his teams have bought in on the concepts with great enthusiasm and demonstrated they can do so while also being successful on the field.

"I would love to win a national championship," Mendenhall said. "I'd love to develop a great program here. But what I would really love is for every kid in my program to have an amazing life."

In the world of big-time football, Mendenhall's philosophy is unconventional, but that doesn't faze him.

"I'm looking for the complete development of everyone in our program – and winning," he said. "One is not at the expense of the other. I think they go hand-in-hand, and winning, without the other, would be hollow to me."

Under Mendenhall, the UVA program has progressed from two to six to eight to nine wins prior to the 2020 pandemic-shortened season that saw the Cavaliers go 5-5. Achievements and recognitions on the field, in the classroom and around the community have exponentially increased as well.

In 2019, UVA placed 10 players on the ACC All-Academic team, the most in the program's history. Seven earned the award in 2020 when a total of 34 Cavaliers received ACC Honor Roll honors. Also in 2019, linebacker Jordan Mack was named the ACC's Jim Tatum Award winner as the league's top football scholar-athlete and was a finalist for the William B. Campbell Trophy, known in the sport as the "academic Heisman." Linebacker Micah Kiser, now a member of the Los Angeles Rams, won the award in 2017.

Giving back has become a cornerstone of Virginia football. Players frequently visit the University's Children's Medical Center and speak at local elementary schools. The team's Thursday's Heroes program has been recognized for its efforts to honor individuals across the state of Virginia who are dealing with personal adversity. In 2020, the ACC honored the Thursday's Heroes program with its "Game Changers" award, which recognizes and highlights specific conference teams' involvement with their local communities.

"I'm in pursuit, and we're in pursuit as a football program, of both of those things, and without compromising our expectations for one or the other," Mendenhall said. "I want good young people. I'm talking about morals, values, character, behavior and contribution to the world. And I want a great team. I know it sounds idealistic, but I would not coach football if I did not think it could be done, and I would not coach at Virginia if I did not think there was support for doing it that way."

Mendenhall's pursuit of individual growth is only magnified by the success his teams have also achieved on the field. His name appears often when the accolades of college football's leading active coaches are charted.

They are a constant reminder to the foundation of the program. Each one is a vehicle for the Virginia football program to develop people.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “I would love to win a national championship. I’d love to develop a great program here. But what I would really love is for every kid in my program to have an amazing life.”

THE 4TH SIDE

- The 4th Side will be woven into the UVA home game experience in 2021. Life-size 4th Side letters are located on the northeast concourse and are a perfect game day photo opportunity. The Virginia student section will unveil a giant 4thSide Tifo just prior to kickoff at every home game. Additionally, the stadium concourses will include new 4th Side pageantry posters to reinforce the importance of UVA fans and their contributions to the game day atmosphere.
- Offense and defense are two sides. Special teams is the third side. **The 4th Side**, in Bronco Mendenhall’s teaching, is the sidelines. Mendenhall has made it a point of emphasis with his team since arriving in Charlottesville that **The 4th Side** is as important as the other three. And just as he expects his teams to perform on offense, defense and special teams, Mendenhall wants his players on the sidelines to thrive. By extension, the UVA fan base is also part of the **The 4th Side**.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “It starts on our sideline and possibly the name of all of our fans as the entire stadium becomes The 4th Side.”
- **WR Terrell Jana** *Said It:* “It is the 4th Side for a reason because of the four aspects of the team. Coach shows film in the meeting room of players on the 4th Side. The team sees that and takes pride in that.”

EARN YOUR JERSEY NUMBER

- Head coach Bronco Mendenhall introduced what he sees as the bedrock of his “earned not given” mantra when he arrived in Charlottesville in 2016. The majority of numbers are picked over the course of the selection ceremonies during the final three weekends of fall camp. Once the season ends, all players return to the status of no number for winter conditioning, spring ball and summer workouts.
- To be considered for number selection, players have to meet certain physical benchmarks – weight room numbers, conditioning times, etc. – but it’s also about dedication to the program, overall effort in practice and having the right disposition in the locker room.
- Bronco Mendenhall doesn’t choose the order. The task unit leaders do.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “The task unit leaders, they’re the ones who are with their teammates every day in the locker room. They’re with them in class. They’re with them in their apartments. They see a lot more than I see. Our players have embraced it, and it matters to them to be endorsed by their peers to be on our team.”
- Alum **Jordan Mack** *Said It:* “Part of our program is earned not given. They know what to expect coming in, and they know nothing is going to be given. To earn a number, gear, anything with a Virginia sabre on it, you’re going to have to earn it through your hard work.”



STATE CHANGES

- White ► Grey ► Orange ► Navy ► Black
- Workout gear color is immediate feedback where our student-athletes stand in their training in order to drive positive change.
- Everything in performance is tracked from the moment they step on Grounds to show their gains. All new players begin their UVA careers wearing white.
- Black workout gear is the pinnacle in the UVA strength & conditioning. Nick Grant and Mandy Alonso were the only to players on the current roster to reach black.

THURSDAY’S HEROES

- The Thursday’s Heroes program is coordinated by the UVA team. Originally at BYU, Thursday’s Heroes transitioned to UVA when Bronco Mendenhall became Head Coach in 2016. Since then, the program has continued to grow, warming the hearts of players, coaches, fans, and of course, the Heroes. Each Thursday during the Fall and Spring season, an individual who is undergoing a difficult circumstance (medical, physical, cognitive, etc.) and their family is invited to tour the football facilities, watch practice, meet the coaches/ team, and receive special gifts unique to each Hero. Different players take turns showering the Hero with gifts, including UVA gear, an official game jersey, Beats by Dre, a bicycle, school supplies, Halloween costumes, and special video messages from favorite celebrities (Peyton Manning, Kenny Chesney, Damian Lillard, Chris Long and Hugh Jackman to name a few have taken part). The goal of the program is simple: to put a smile on the Hero’s face and to welcome them to the Virginia Football family.
- TB **Wayne Taulapapa** *Said It:* “Everybody is Somebody ... Every day we look up to them and the fight they are in. We want them to know they are with us and we are with them.”

UNIQUELY VIRGINIA FOOTBALL

MAD HATTERS (PUT ON THE HATS)


- The “Mad Hatters” is the name of the Virginia Football Scout Team. It drew inspiration from the character frozen in time in “Alice in Wonderland,” but the name has as much to do with the evolution of pennies scout team players once draped over their shoulder pads to brightly colored pieces of fabric, which stretch over their helmets. Hence, “Put on the hats.”
- Each Thursday after practice the “Mad Hatter of the Week” is announced by a task unit leader.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “The way I frame it to our team is without going through that process, I think there is a fundamental step missed in their development. Most recruits and most young people want to come in and play their first year. Most of us, right, it’s kind of about us. When you’re in that role, it’s really about serving and helping your team.”

UVA GROUNDSKEEPERS

- Virginia’s football program wants to be a catalyst for change in the community, helping to turn the pain of the Charlottesville riots of Aug. 12, 2017 into a celebration of life, love and unity. During the summer of 2020, a player-led initiative was born in the form of the Groundskeepers in order to “Take Back our Grounds” from the white nationalists that descended upon Charlottesville in 2017.
- To be part of the Groundskeepers, participants take part in their own march, which starts downtown at Heather Heyer Way — the street named in honor of the woman who lost her life during the Aug. 12 demonstrations — before heading to the Enslaved Workers Memorial and the Rotunda.
- **Bronco Mendenhall** *Said It:* “We chose to take this march in direct opposition and the exact opposite direction of the events that happened in the death of Heather Heyer. We’re standing against hate, inequality, anything that doesn’t reflect well on the state of mankind, especially at the University of Virginia.
- **OLB Charles Snowden** *Said It:* We are committed to making a change in our community. We are committed to fighting for what’s right. We are committed to a better future. We are the Groundskeepers. Just thinking about what transpired those two days and what those two days signify and stand for — There were protests led in the name of hatred, racism, oppression and that’s harmful. That’s hurtful to a lot of people and that’s not what the city of Charlottesville stands for. That’s not what the University of Virginia stands for. The Groundskeepers here at UVA, we just want to show that’s not who we are and not what we stand for. So we’re just trying to take back the power of those days and show that we stand for love, unity, respect, uplifting one another, and just doing what’s right.”
- One of UVA’s four flags they run onto the field with each game is a flag that represents the Groundskeeper, which serves as constant reminder to the community of the importance of being unified in love rather than hate.

THE SHIELD

- The shield is an important part of the Virginia football program. On the shield, which was modeled after shields used in the movie 300, has three numbers: +1, 24, +5. They represent a formula that Bronco Mendenhall and his staff developed after years of data study and analytics that will lead to probable wins. Each game UVA’s goal is to be at least +1 in turnover margin, score at least 24 points while holding opponents under 24 points and being at least +5 in field position. Accomplishing each of those goals in a game creates a winning scenario.
- Virginia’s shield (pictured) is always represented in the UVA locker room.
- The shield also has the UVA guiding principles painted around the shield.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.

Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.

Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.

Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.

Virginia has played 490 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 284-194-12.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WAH

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wah" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

- Virginia has now won eight-straight night games
- The Cavaliers improve to 84-39-9 all-time in season openers
- Under Bronco Mendenhall, Virginia has won five of six season openers
- Billy Kemp had four receptions against W&M and now has 108 for his career, tied with Patrick Jeffers for the 19th most in UVA history.
- Kemp's career-high, 55-yard punt return in the first quarter setup the game's only points in the first quarter, a 39-yard field goal by Justin Duenkel.
- The Cavalier defense held William & Mary to 183 yards of total offense, the first time holding an opponent to under 200 yards since limiting the Tribe to 193 in 2019.
- Virginia's last shutout in a season opener came on August 30, 2003, a 27-0 blanking of Duke.

- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong passed for 336 yards, his second 300-yard passing game of his career
- The Cavalier offense amassed 500 yards of total offense for the three-straight home game. The Cavaliers compiled 518 yards against Abilene Christian on Nov. 21 and 549 against Boston College in last year's home finale.
- Armstrong scored Virginia's first touchdown of the season, a two-yard rush in the second quarter. The signal caller also scored the first of the year last year, a four-yard score against Duke.
- UVA has now wone nine-straight games against non-conference opponents at Scott Stadium. UVA is 10-2 under Mendenhall against non-ACC foes.
- Since 2019, Virginia is 13-1 at Scott Stadium.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson led UVA with 12 tackles, the eighth time in his career he's recorded 10 or more tackles.
- Saturday marked the first career starts for Dontayvion Wicks, Chayce Chalmers and Fentrell Cypress.
- Three true freshmen made their debut for the Cavaliers – West Weeks, Langston Long and Jacob Rodriguez.

Game Notes

- Virginia recorded its first win over Illinois in three all-time meetings. The two teams have only met in bowl games, the 1999 MicronPc.com Bowl and the 1990 Citrus Bowl.
- Virginia has won five of its last seven matchups against Big Ten foes.
- Since 2019, UVA is 14-1 at Scott Stadium and have won 10-straight games at home against non-conference opponents.
- Virginia is 2-0 for the second time under Bronco Mendenhall (2019) and sixth time since 2000.
- Virginia has held its first two opponents of the season to 14 points, the fewest since shutting out both of its first two opponents in 1952.
- Brennan Armstrong became the third Cavalier quarterback to throw for 400 yards in a game. His 405 yards passing are the fourth most in a single game in program history.
- Armstrong threw five touchdown passes, a career-high and the most by a UVA quarterback since Kurt Benkert against Central Michigan in 2016. Armstrong has thrown multiple touchdown passes in three-straight games dating back to last season.
- Armstrong completed a career-high 27 passes. He was 7-for-13 with 171 yards (career-best) and two touchdowns in the first quarter. He completed seven of his first eight passes and completed six-straight passes starting with the Jelani Woods touchdown.
- Tight end Jelani Woods recorded a career-high 122 yards receiving, the most by a Cavalier tight end since Tom Santi (128 yards) in the 2005 Music City Bowl against Minnesota. Woods' previous career high of 54 yards receiving was established against Iowa State on Oct. 24, 2020 while at Oklahoma State.
- Woods' touchdown in the first quarter was the fifth of his career.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks caught three passes for 69 yards and two touchdowns. The two touchdown performance was the first of his career and the first by a UVA wideout since Lavel Davis Jr. caught two in the opener against Duke last season.
- Billy Kemp IV caught six passes bringing his career total up to 112, the 19th most in school history, two behind Herman Moore (1988-90) and Wali Lundy (2002-05). • Kemp IV has caught a pass in 17-straight games dating back to the 2019 season.
- Kemp's TD reception in the third quarter was his first of the season and third of his career.
- Brennan Armstrong caught his first pass of his career on the first career completion thrown by WR Dontayvion Wicks for 18 yards in the third quarter.
- Wayne Taulapapa's capped the UVA scoring in the fourth quarter with his first career receiving touchdown, a three-yard pass from Armstrong.
- Linebacker Noah Taylor recorded a career-high two sacks and now has six for his career.

Game Notes

- Virginia had its four-game winning streak against North Carolina snapped. The Cavaliers are 4-2 against the Tar Heels under Bronco Mendenhall.
- Virginia falls to 66-36-1 all-time in night games and 24-34 in road night games.
- The loss snaps a five-game win streak in ACC openers and is the first ACC opening loss under Mendenhall.
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's single-game passing record with 554 yards breaking Kurt Benkert's mark of 455 set in 2017 against UConn. He's the first Cavalier quarterback to throw for 500 yards in a game. He threw for 364 yards in the first half, also a program record.
- Armstrong accounted for 538 yards of total offense breaking the single-game school record set by Bryce Perkins (490 yards) against North Carolina in 2019.
- Armstrong the first UVA quarterback to throw for 300 yards in three-straight games. The 300-yard game was the fourth of his career.
- Armstrong threw four touchdown passes in the contest, the third time he's thrown for four or more touchdowns in a game. He now has 31 career touchdown passes, the seventh most in UVA history.
- Armstrong moved into 14th place in career total offense at UVA with 4,333 yards, passing Dan Ellis (1997-2000) and Bob Davis (1964-66).
- Armstrong entered UVA's top-15 in career passing yards with 3,673.
- The 554 yards passing was the most ever by a North Carolina opposing quarterback. Previous high was Dave Brown (Duke) 479 yards in 1989.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks established career-highs in receptions (7) and yards (183). His 183 yards receiving were the sixth-highest single-game total ever by a UVA receiver. He caught a 40-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter, the second TD reception of 40 or more yards in his career (44 vs. Liberty in 2019).
- Billy Kemp IV caught a team-high eight passes and has now caught a pass in 18-straight games. He finished with a career-high 104 yards receiving, his first 100-yard receiving game of his career. He scored touchdowns of 21 and nine yards, his first two-touchdown game of his career.
- Kemp has 120 career receptions, tied with Germane Crowell (1994-97) for the 14th most in school history.
- Fentrell Cypress recorded his first career interception taking Sam Howell's pass to the end zone 66 yards. The return was the 11th longest in program history.

Game Notes

- Wake Forest extended its win streak to five games against Virginia, the longest in the series against UVA.
- The loss snapped the Cavaliers' six-game home win streak that dated back to last season.
- UVA dropped to 8-2 in night games at home under Bronco Mendenhall and 1-2 at night this season.
- The home loss for Virginia was only its third in its last 22 games at Scott Stadium.
- Virginia has accumulated 500 yards of total offense in four-straight games after 506 against Wake Forest (407 passing, 99 rushing).
- Brennan Armstrong threw for 300 yards for the fourth-straight game. Only Matt Schaub (8), Aaron Brooks (6), Bryce Perkins (5) and Armstrong (5) and have five or more 300-yard passing games in their careers. Armstrong is the only one of the group to throw for 300 in four consecutive games.

- Armstrong added a season-high 33 yards rushing and accounted for 440 yards of total offense.
- Billy Kemp IV made seven catches and now has caught a pass in 19-straight games, a streak that dates back to Nov. 9, 2019.
- Kemp now has 127 receptions for his career, surpassing former teammate Terrell Jana for 12th place on UVA's career receptions list.
- Jelani Woods, Ra'Shaun Henry, Billy Kemp, Keytaon Thompson, Mike Hollins & Dontayvion Wicks have each caught a pass in all four games this season.
- Wicks caught a career-high eight passes for 114 yards and a touchdown. He has now caught three touchdowns in the last two games.
- Wicks is the first Cavalier wide receiver with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Hasise Dubois in 2019 (Virginia Tech & Clemson).

- Virginia snapped a five-game road losing streak and picked up its first road win since Nov. 2, 2019 at North Carolina.
- In its first appearance on ESPN Thursday night football since 2012, UVA improved to 7-6 all-time in the primetime slot.
- The victory at Hard Rock Stadium was Virginia's first since 2011. The Cavaliers had dropped six-straight games in the facility, including the 2019 Orange Bowl (to Florida).
- Virginia improves to 11-12 in night games under Bronco Mendenhall and 2-2 this season.
- The Cavaliers are 8-10 against Miami in ACC regular season action.
- Virginia recorded its second safety of the season. Virginia hasn't been credited with two safeties in a season since 2012.
- Virginia rushed for 181 yards, the most in an ACC contest since totaling 262 against Boston College last season.
- The 30 points were the most against Miami since 2014, a 30-13 victory in Charlottesville.
- Virginia held Miami to 372 yards of total offense, including a season-low 203 yards passing. The 203 yards passing were the fewest by an ACC opponent against UVA since Louisville's 161 in 2020.
- The Cavaliers held Miami to 10 yards of total offense in the first quarter.
- With a team-high 62 yards rushing, Taulapapa eclipsed 1,000 yards for his career, the 45th Cavalier rusher to reach 1,000 yards.
- Miami native, Mandy Alonso had career-highs sacks (2) and tackles for losses (3). He made the tackle on the first quarter safety.
- Dontayvion Wicks caught two passes for 75 yards and a touchdown all in the second half. He has a touchdown in four-straight games and leads the team with five on the season.
- Billy Kemp IV has caught a pass in 20-straight games after catching a game-high nine passes for 81 yards in the contest.
- Kemp jumped four spots on UVA's top-10 list for career receptions and now sits in sole possession of eighth place with 136 career catches.

Game Notes

- Virginia recorded its first win in five tries at Cardinal Stadium and evened up the all-time series with Louisville, 5-5.
- The Cavaliers rallied from a 17-point fourth quarter deficit, the largest fourth-quarter comeback since overcoming a 10-point margin against Syracuse in 2015, ultimately prevailing 44-38 in three overtimes.
- Virginia has won back-to-back road games for the first time since 2017 (Boise State/UNC) and back-to-back road ACC games for the first time since 2011 (Miami/Maryland)
- Virginia outscored Louisville 21-3 in the fourth quarter, the most points in the fourth quarter all season. The Cavaliers scored 21 points one other time this season, the second quarter against North Carolina.
- The game's final touchdown came with 22 seconds on the clock, the first time UVA scored in the final minute to win a game since 2012 when Michael Rocco connected with Jake McGee for a 10-yard score to top Miami, 41-40.
- Ra'Shaun Henry had nine catches for 179 yards, both the most in his two seasons at UVA. His collegiate career-high came while at St. Francis (Pa.) when he caught 12 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns against Delaware State in 2019.
- The 179 yards receiving are the second-most by a UVA wide receiver this season (Dontayvion Wicks – 183 at North Carolina) and the ninth-most ever by a UVA wide receiver in a game.
- Keytoan Thompson had a career high in receptions (10) and yards (149). He made four catches on the Virginia's final drive for 68 yards, including two on fourth down.
- Billy Kemp had eight catches on the afternoon, tying him with Heath Miller (2002-04) for sixth all-time on UVA's career receptions list with 145. He is six behind former teammate Hasise Dubois (2016-19) for fifth place.
- Brennan Armstrong was 40-of-60 for 487 yards and three touchdowns. The 60 pass attempts were a career-high. The 486 yards passing was the second-highest total in school history. He set the UVA passing record vs. North Carolina (554) earlier this year. Of the seven 400-yard games in program history, Armstrong has four of them.
- Armstrong has thrown for 300 yards in a game six times in his career and all but one game this season. The six, 300-yard games are tied with Aaron Brooks for the second most in UVA history.
- Armstrong moved into 10th place on UVA's all-time passing list with 4,835 yards, moving past Michael Rocco (2010-12) 4,731. Armstrong trails Marques Hagans (2002-05) by 42 yards for ninth place.
- Defensive back Coen King made a team-high, eight tackles, one shy of his career high. In the second quarter he a forced fumble and recovered it on a Louisville drive in UVA territory. It was only the second fumble recovery by the Virginia defense this season.

Game Notes

- Virginia has won seven-straight meetings against Duke and leads all-time series, 40-33. UVA is 16-6 against the Blue Devils since 2000.
- Virginia is 49-45-2 all-time in homecomings games and has now won three-straight for the first time since 2007-09.
- The Cavaliers scored 34 points in the first half, the most in an ACC game since 2004 against North Carolina.
- Virginia intercepted two passes, the first multi-interception game of the season and first since picking off five against Duke in the 2020 season opener. It was the first time this season that Duke had thrown multiple interceptions.
- The Virginia defense held Duke to 110 yards rushing. The Blue Devils came into the contest with the second-best rushing attack in the ACC, averaging 218 yards per game. It was Duke's lowest rushing total of the season.
- Mataeo Durant, who ranked second in the ACC in rushing coming into the game accumulated 82 yards on the ground, only the second time this season he was held under 100 yards.
- The shutout was Virginia's first in ACC play since 2008 when it blanked Maryland, 31-0.
- The 48-point margin of victory was the highest in the Bronco Mendenhall era. (2016-present). It was the sixth time since 2016 UVA has scored 48 or more points in a game.
- The 48-0 shutout was the largest in ACC play since defeating Miami, 48-0 in 2007.
- Virginia has two shutouts on the season (W&M, 43-0, Duke, 48-0). It marks the first time since 2008, UVA has two or more shutouts in the same season
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong passed for 364 yards, all in three quarters of action. It marked the sixth time this season he has passed for 300 or more yards.
- Armstrong went over the 5,000-yard passing mark for his career and moved into seventh place all-time on UVA's career passing list with 5,199 yards. He surpassed Marques Hagans (4,877), Marc Verica (4,992) and Aaron Brooks (5,118) in Saturday's game.
- Wide receiver Billy Kemp IV caught six passes for 65 yards, his 22nd straight game with a reception. He took over sole possession of sixth place all-time on UVA's career reception list (150 receptions), passing Heath Miller (144 receptions).
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks led UVA with seven catches and 125 yards and a touchdown. The 100-yard receiving game was Wicks' third of the season. He has a reception in all seven games this season.
- Specialist Brendan Farrell was a perfect 2-for-2 on field goals (31, 34) and was 5-for-5 on extra points. He is 6-for-6 this season on field goals from 43 yards and in.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson made a game-high 11 tackles, the fourth time this season he has registered double-digit tackles. He also recorded a sack and a career-high four tackles for loss.
- Joey Blount recorded his seventh career interception and made four tackles (three solo).
- De'Vante Cross intercepted a second quarter pass that setup Farrell's 34-yard field goal. He has six career interceptions.

Game Notes

- Virginia won its fourth-straight ACC games for the first time since 2011.
- The Cavaliers amassed 636 yards of total offense the sixth-most in a single game in program history and the most since 643 yards against Duke in 2010.
- It marked the 43rd meeting between Georgia Tech and Virginia, the all-time series is even at 21-21-1.
- The 48 points against Georgia Tech were the most by UVA since 1992, a 55-24 win in Charlottesville.
- Virginia compiled 454 combined yards between the second and third quarters, out-scoring the Yellow Jackets, 34-11 in that span.
- Virginia rushed for 240 yards, its second highest total of the season and the most in an ACC contest since 262 against Boston College last season.
- Brennan Armstrong accounted for 495 yards of total offense (396 passing, 99 yards rushing), the second-highest single-game total in program history. He owns the single-game mark of 538 set against North Carolina earlier this season.
- Armstrong's 99 rushing yards were the most by a Cavalier this season. His 45-yard rush in the second quarter was also the longest by a UVA rusher in 2021.
- Armstrong accounted for a career-high, six touchdowns (4 passing, 2 rushing). It marked the third time in his career he's had multiple rushing touchdowns in a game. UVA improved to 7-0 when Armstrong rushes for a touchdown. Armstrong has 10 career rushing touchdowns, the 10th most by a UVA quarterback.
- Dontayvion Wicks recorded his fourth 100-yard receiving performance of the season, finishing with six catches for 168 yards and two touchdowns. He collected 132 yards in the second quarter. His 77-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter was the longest play from scrimmage this season for UVA.
- Wicks' had his second two-touchdown game of the season (at UNC). He has a touchdown reception in all but two games this year and leads the team with eight touchdowns in 2021.
- Billy Kemp IV caught Brennan Armstrong's first pass of the night to extend his consecutive games with a reception streak to 23 games. He caught eight balls for 50 yards and caught his seventh career touchdown.
- Kemp surpassed former teammate Hasise Dubois for fifth place all-time on UVA's reception list and now has 158 receptions at UVA.
- For the second-straight game, Joey Blount intercepted a pass. It was the second of the season and eighth of his career.
- Noah Taylor blocked a point after try on Georgia Tech's second touchdown of the day, the first PAT block by UVA since Juan Thornhill blocked one at Indiana in 2018.

- The 115 combined points in the contest were the most ever in a UVA football game.
- Virginia scored 42 points in the first half the third highest total in school history
- UVA's 35 points in the second quarter were tied for the most in a single game (Colgate, 1970).
- Brennan Armstrong broke the school record for passing yards with an eight-yard completion to Jelani Woods in fourth quarter. He finished the game with 337 yards passing and upped his season total to 3,557, surpassing former teammate Bryce Perkins' mark of 3538 in 2019.

- Brennan Armstrong's two rushing touchdowns were his sixth and seventh of the season. He now has 12 career rushing touchdowns, tied with Don Majkowski for the eighth most in school history.
- Virginia had been 7-0 when Armstrong rushed for a touchdown. The two-rushing touchdown performance is his fourth of his career and third of the season.
- Devin Darrington's 49-yard rushing touchdown was the longest of his career (both UVA & Harvard). It was also the longest rush by a Cavalier this season.
- Dontayvion Wicks recorded his fifth, 100-yard receiving game of the season. Only Germaine Crowell (6 in 1997) and Kris Burd (5 in 2011) have five 100-yard receiving games in the same season in UVA history.
- Linebacker Nick Jackson matched his career-high with 16 tackles, nine of them were unassisted. The 16 tackles were the second most in a single-game by an ACC defender this season.
- Punter Jacob Finn had three punts for a total of 169 yards including a 59-yard blast, his longest of the season. His 46.4 punting average on 29 punts currently stands as the highest single-season total in program history.

Game Notes

- Virginia dropped to 0-4 all-time against Notre Dame.
- The Cavalier defense forced four turnovers, a fumble recovery, interception and two turnovers on downs.
- Virginia held Notre Dame to just seven, second-half points, the fourth time this season an opponent has scored seven or less points in second half (William & Mary, Illinois, Duke, Notre Dame). It was the first time Notre Dame was held to seven or less in the second half since its season opener against Florida State.
- The announced attendance of the game was 48,584, the largest crowd at Scott Stadium this season and the most since the 2019 season finale against Virginia Tech.
- It was the first time Virginia was held scoreless in the first half since 2017 (Virginia Tech)
- Freshman Jay Woolfolk became the first true freshman to start at quarterback for UVA since 1977, when Bryan Shumock started the first five games of the season.
- Woolfolk threw for 196 yards the most ever by a true freshman starting quarterback, eclipsing Scott Gardner's 189 yard performance against North Carolina in 1972.
- Keytaon Thompson led UVA with nine catches and 110 yards receiving. It was his second 100-yard receiving game of the season and the third-straight game with nine receptions.
- Wide receiver Billy Kemp IV passed Taquan Mizell (162) for fourth place on UVA's career receptions list. Kemp caught four passes for 37 yards on the night and now has 165 receptions in his career. Kemp has caught a pass in 25-straight games.
- Dontayvion Wicks became the fifth Cavalier ever to go over the 1,000-yard receiving mark. He caught two passes for 32 yards and now has 1,004 on the year.
- Thompson, Kemp, and Wicks have a catch in all 10 games this season.
- Defensive back Anthony Johnson was credited with second interception of the season, picking of Jack Coan in the third quarter. The interception was his fourth of his career.
- Noah Taylor recovered a fumble in the red zone, his first career fumble recovery.

Game Notes

- Pittsburgh snapped Virginia's four-game ACC win streak.
- The UVA defense matched a season-high with two interceptions, only the second multi-interception game for Pitt's Kenny Pickett this season.
- Virginia accumulated 514 yards of total offense, the ninth time this season the Cavaliers have gone over the 500-yard threshold.
- Quarterback Brennan Armstrong returned after missing the previous game due to injury and threw for 487 yards and three touchdowns. It marked the fifth time this season he has thrown for 400 or more yards. The 487 yards tied his own mark set against Louisville (Oct. 9, 2021) for the second most in a single game in UVA history. Armstrong now owns the three highest single game yardage totals in UVA history.
- Armstrong broke UVA's single-season passing touchdown record with a 7-yard touchdown to Jelani Woods in the second quarter. His 30 for the season surpass Matt Schaub's 28 in 2002.
- Keytaon Thompson finished with a career-high 11 receptions and had 126 yards receiving. It was Thompson's second-straight 100-yard receiving effort and third 100-yard game of the season. Thompson scored two touchdowns (one receiving, one rushing).
- Dontayvion Wicks had a career-best, 10 catches and totaled a team-best, 144 yards receiving. It was Wicks' sixth 100-yard game of the season, tying Germane Crowell (1997) for the most 100-yard receiving games in a season in UVA history.
- Wicks has 1,148 yards receiving in 2021, the second most ever by a UVA wide out. He trails Herman Moore's school-record of 1,190 yards set in 1990.
- Billy Kemp, Thompson, Wicks, Ra'Shaun Henry have each caught a pass in all 11 games this season.
- Defensive back Joey Blount recorded a sack and an interception to go along with four tackles. The sack in the second quarter was his first of the season and first since Oct. 30, 2019 against Clemson. In the 2019 season opener at Pitt he made seven tackles, had two sacks and intercepted a pass.
- The interception for Blount was his ninth of his career and his third of the season, matching his career-high total of three in 2019.

Game Notes

- Virginia eclipsed the 400-point mark for the season, only the fourth time in school history UVA has scored 400 points in a season. The 420 total points this season are the third-most in program history.
- The Virginia defense matched a season-high with four sacks in the contest.
- Saturday was the final game for Kim Kirschnick who served the Virginia football program as the mounted Cavalier on horseback for the past 21 seasons. He led the Cavalier football team on the field for the past 21 seasons, more than 140 games and a number of bowl games.
- Wide receiver Dontayvion Wicks set the Virginia single-season receiving yardage record on a 19-yard reception on UVA's second scoring drive in the first quarter. He surpassed Herman Moore's mark of 1,190 yards set back in 1990.
- Wicks finished with three catches for 55 yards on eight targets. He now has 1,203 yards on the season.
- Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's single-season total offense record with a 27-yard pass to Wicks on UVA's second play of the game. The record was previously held by Bryce Perkins - 4,307 in 2019. Armstrong now has 4,705 on the season which is fifth-most in ACC history.
- Armstrong rushed for his eighth and ninth touchdowns of the season. The nine rushing touchdowns are the sixth most by a UVA quarterback in school history. He now has 14 for his career, the sixth most ever by a UVA quarterback.
- Armstrong threw for over 400 yards for the sixth time this season and went over the 300-yard mark for the 11th time in his career, both school records. His 405 yards in the contest was the most ever by a UVA quarterback against Virginia Tech.
- Armstrong has 4,449 yards passing this season, the fourth-highest single-season total in ACC history.
- Jelani Woods caught a career-high seven passes and racked up 64 yards receiving. His touchdown on the opening drive of the game was his eighth of the season, the second most by a tight end in UVA history and one shy of Heath Miller's school record of nine in 2002.
- Woods has 598 yards receiving on the season, the third most ever by a UVA tight end.
- West Weeks recorded his first sack of the season, a 14-yard loss that forced a VT fourth down late in the second quarter.
- Nick Jackson had 10 tackles, the third-straight double-digit tackle game by the linebacker. He has seven 10+ tackle games this season and a total of 117 tackles on the year.
- Elliott Brown had a career-high, two sacks to go along with four tackles.
- Billy Kemp led the Cavaliers with eight catches and 102 yards receiving. The 100-yard game was his second of the season and third of his career.



Virginia won the 2018 Belk Bowl over South Carolina, 28-0. It gives UVA its third Belk Bowl win, which is the most by any school in Belk Bowl history. UVA won the first two Continental Tire Bowls in 2002 and 2003. Since 2011, the Charlotte bowl has been known as the Belk Bowl. The shutout of South Carolina was the first time an SEC team was shutout in a bowl game since Florida in the 1975 Gator Bowl.



Wali Lundy set the UVA bowl-scoring record with four touchdowns against West Virginia in the inaugural 2002 Continental Tire Bowl, which is currently the Belk Bowl. Lundy's 24 points scored is still a Belk Bowl record.
