INSIDE SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

- Saturday is the 105th meeting between Virginia and Virginia Tech. The two teams have played the final regular season game against one another in 29 of the last 34 years.
- The rivalry was first played in 1895, a 38-0 UVA victory in Charlottesville. Virginia Tech leads the all-time series, 61-38-5.
- A win for the Cavaliers would make them bowl eligible for the first time under head coach **Tony Elliott** and the first time since 2021.
- Virginia is looking to close out a perfect fall season against Virginia Tech. UVA leads the Smithfield Commonwealth Clash standings, 5.0-0.0, in the annual all-sports competition. UVA won the Clash for the 2023-24 academic year.
- The Cavaliers visit Blacksburg for the first time since the 2020 season. The four-year gap between games at Virginia Tech is the longest since 1970.
- UVA is looking to snap an 11-game road losing skid at Virginia Tech. The Cavaliers' last win at Lane Stadium was in 1998, a 36-32 comeback that saw UVA score the game-winning touchdown with 2:01 remaining on a 47-yard pass from Aaron Brooks to **Ahmad Hawkins**, who currently serves as UVA's radio analyst.
- The Hoos are looking to capture the Commonwealth Cup for the first time since 2019, when UVA claimed its first ACC Coastal Division championship and a trip to its first Orange Bowl.
- Virginia is 0-3 (2006, 2008, 2014) in contests against the Hokies that also determine a trip to a bowl game for the UVA.
- Saturday will be Virginia's fourth night game of the season. The Cavaliers sport a 3-1 record in 2024 at night and have won four of their last six night games beginning with a road night win over then-No. 10 North Carolina last year.

TOP STORYLINES

- Virginia and Virginia Tech are two of 16 FBS teams with five wins going into the final week of the regular season. The only other matchup of potential bowl eligible teams on the slate is Eastern Michigan and Western Michigan (1:30 p.m. ET). Virginia and Virginia Tech played one another for bowl eligibility one other time, a 24-20 Hokies victory in Blacksburg in 2014.
- The Cavaliers' last three opponents boasted a combined record of 25-3 entering games against Virginia. UVA's opponent season winning percentage of .649 is the 12th highest of any FBS team and third-highest in the ACC. North Carolina and Virginia Tech are the only two Cavalier opponents with records below .500 entering their respective games.
- Virginia is 3-2 on the road this season, which includes a road win at then-No. 23 Pitt (Nov. 9). The Cavaliers have not won four road games in a single season since 2011. Virginia is seeking its third ACC road win of the year, a feat that last accomplished in 2011.
- After Saturday's loss to then-No.13 SMU, the Cavaliers dipped below the .500 mark for the first time this season. UVA held a lead in each of its first nine games and has been even or on the plus side of the turnover margin in seven of the 11 games in 2024. The Cavaliers are 2-2 when winning the turnover battle this season.

UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.

First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year: Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.

Commonwealth: Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.

UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.

THE CAVALIER MASCOT

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

Since 2000, Kim Kirschnick led the Cavaliers out of the tunnel on horseback and retired after the 2021 season finale against Virginia Tech. 2022 marks Julie Caruccio first season as the mounted Cavalier. A former interim dean of students at UVA, Caruccio is the first female in school history to have the mounted Cavalier job on a full-time basis. When the tradition rotated among members of the club polo team until Kirschnick took over in 2000, at least two women - Bess Worrall and Kerry McDaniel - were on horseback for a few games in the early '90s.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WA

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wa" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

SMITHFIELD COMMONWEALTH CLASH

- The Commonwealth Clash has been a part of the UVA-Virginia Tech rivalry since 2014. It is an all-sports points-based program with the Commonwealth Clash trophy presented to the winning school each year for its superiority in head-to-head competitions. In some sports, the point is decided by team finishes in ACC Championship competition.
- UVA captured the 2023-24 trophy and has won all five competitions this fall (men's soccer, women's soccer, men's cross country, women's cross country and volleyball).

COMMONWEALTH CLASH STANDINGS

- The Cavaliers currently lead the 2024-25 Smithfield Commonwealth Clash standings, 5-0.
- 1.0 points are on the line for Saturday's football game in Blacksburg.

THE COMMONWEALTH CUP

- The award was started for the 1996 game between the two state foes, with the Hokies receiving the trophy for the first time with a 26-9 win.
- After holding the trophy following wins in 1997 and 1998, the Cavaliers have taken it just twice since then (2003 & 2019).

CAVALIER-VIRGINIA TECH CONNECTIONS

- UVA quarterback **Tony Musckett's** older brother Peter, who also played quarterback at West Springfield High School, walked on at Virginia Tech in 2017 and is a Hokies graduate.
- Virginia Tech assistant head coach/WRs coach **Fontel Mines** played tight end at UVA from 2002-06 under former head coach Al Groh.

COMMON OPPONENTS BETWEEN UVA & TECH

- UVA and Virginia Tech share two common opponents this season, ACC foes Boston College and Clemson.
- Both the Cavaliers and Hokies are 1-1 against their shared opponents.

BOWL IMPLICATIONS AROUND FBS

- With overall records of 5-6, the winner of Saturday's contest between Virginia and Virginia Tech will officially become bowl eligible.
- UVA is 0-3 (2006, 2008, 2014) in contests against the Hokies in which the outcome determines a trip to a bowl game for the Cavaliers.
- There are currently 16 FBS teams with exactly five wins.
- Virginia-Virginia Tech and Eastern Michigan-Western Michigan (1:30 p.m. ET) are the only two games nationally this week with two five-win teams going head-to-head.
- The 16 five-win teams mentioned above include Appalachian State (Sun Belt), Auburn (SEC), Cincinnati (Big 12), Coastal Carolina (Sun Belt), Eastern Michigan (Mid-American), Kansas (Big 12), Michigan State (Big Ten), New Mexico (Mountain West), **NC State (ACC)**, North Texas (American), Oregon State (Pac-12), ULM (Sun Belt), **Virginia (ACC)**, **Virginia Tech (ACC)** and Western Michigan (Mid-American).
- There are currently 77 six-win FBS teams who are already bowl eligible heading into the final week of the regular season.

LAST MEETING AGAINST VIRGINIA TECH

- In UVA's 2023 regular-season finale, Virginia Tech shut out the Hoos in the first half and ultimately scored the first 31 points of the game to run away with a 55-17 victory at Scott Stadium.
- UVA scored two touchdowns, both on passes from true freshman quarterback **Anthony Colandrea** to wideout **Malachi Fields**. Fields finished with six catches for 89 yards.
- **Jonas Sanker** made a team-high 10 tackles (8 solo), had one tackle for loss, a fumble recovery and a pass breakup in the contest. He led UVA in tackles in seven of the 12 games in 2023. Sanker finished his junior campaign with a team-high 107 tackles, the most by a UVA defensive back since Quin Blanding - 137 tackles in 2017.
- The 55 points were the most Virginia has allowed in the series, which dates back to 1895.
- With the win, the Hokies improved 6-6 overall and 5-3 in ACC play, and became bowl-eligible. It also marked Tech's third straight win in series, which they lead, 61-38-5.
- Virginia's defense allowed 500 yards. Of the Hokies' offensive touchdowns, five came on plays of 32 yards or longer. UVA rarely pressured Drones, who passed for 244 yards and three TDs.

LAST TIME OUT

- UVA dropped its final game of the season at Scott Stadium, 33-7, to then-No. 13 SMU.
- The Cavaliers finished with season lows in both total offense (173) and points (7).
- The Mustangs sacked UVA quarterback **Anthony Colandrea** nine times and were credited with two QB hurries.
- The Cavaliers held SMU to 111 rushing yards, its lowest output in an ACC game this season and second-lowest overall.
- UVA is the Mustangs' second opponent in their last 10 games to not give the ball away. SMU entered Saturday's game 10th in FBS and third in the ACC in turnovers gained per game (2.0).
- In what was also its 10th straight road win and 16th straight conference victory, SMU clinched a spot in the ACC Championship game (Dec. 7) in its first year as a member of the ACC.

YEAR THREE UNDER TONY ELLIOTT

- **Tony Elliott** is in his third year at the helm of the Virginia football program. His staff only has one newcomer, Mike Adams. Elliott and Adams previously coached together at South Carolina State as assistant coaches during the 2006 and 2007 seasons.
- Elliott brought a wealth of championship football experience to Charlottesville. In his 16 years as a full time college coach, Elliott has been a part of 15 winning seasons including 10-win seasons at Clemson from 2011-20.
- With Elliott as offensive coordinator, Clemson went 89-10 and made four CFP National Championship game appearances.

TONY ELLIOTT: ONE OF 16 AFRICAN-AMERICAN HEAD COACHES IN FBS

- Fralin Family Football Head Coach **Tony Elliott** is one of 16 African-American head coaches in FBS.
- There have been a total of 12 games in which two black coaches have gone head to head, including Elliott against Mike Locksley (Maryland) and Marcus Freeman (Notre Dame).
- The Cavaliers have six full-time African-American assistant coaches.

FOLLOW THE LEADER

- Virginia has held a lead in all but two games this season (at #8 Notre Dame, vs. #13 SMU).
- In UVA's loss at Notre Dame, Virginia muffed its attempted opening kickoff return and the Irish recovered the ball UVA's own 25-yard line.
- The Cavaliers are 4-2 this season when scoring first.

FOURTH-QUARTER EMPHASIS

- Virginia has been much improved in the fourth quarter this season, a point of emphasis by head coach **Tony Elliott**.
- The Cavaliers have outscored their opponents in seven of their 11 games by a combined margin of, 91-59.
- In Elliott's first two seasons at UVA, the Cavaliers were outscored by their opponents in the fourth quarters 43-36 in 2022 and 114-54 in 2023.

TOUGH WAY TO GO

- Three the Cavaliers' final four opponents (No. 23 Pitt, No. 8 Notre Dame, No. 13 SMU) were ranked top in the AP top-25 poll at the time of each matchup.
- The SMU game marked only the sixth instance in program history (1949, 1996, 2002, 2005, 2019, 2021, 2024) in which the Cavaliers faced three consecutive opponents ranked in the AP top-25 poll.
- Entering the game against Pitt, UVA was tied for the fourth-most difficult remaining schedule, based on opponent win percentage, according to WarrenNolan.com.

JONAS SANKER: ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP DBs

- Virginia safety **Jonas Sanker** is one of the nation's top defensive backs and has proved it with his performances at then-No. 23 Pitt (Nov. 9) and then-No. 8 Notre Dame (Nov. 16).
- Sanker claimed his fourth ACC Defensive-Back-of-the-Week honor on Nov. 18 after a standout performance on the road against the Irish after recording a career-high 13 tackles, including eight solo, and a fumble recovery on special teams.
- Sanker is the only defensive player in program history to earn an ACC weekly honor four times in the same season.
- On three consecutive plays in the third quarter against Pitt (Nov. 9), Sanker recorded a TFL to force fourth down, blocked a field goal attempt and recorded an interception on the Panthers' first play of their ensuing drive.

- The Cavaliers trailed by six when Sanker blocked the kick and scored the go-ahead touchdown on the next possession.
- Sanker returned his interception 45 yards into the red zone to help set up what proved to be the game-winning score.
- A 2023 first-team All-ACC selection, Sanker currently leads the ACC and is currently seventh in FBS in solo tackles per game (5.5), while his total tackles per game average (8.1) is good for sixth in the conference.

VIRGINIA'S CAREER RECEIVING YARDS LEADERS

- With his first of four receptions, including a touchdown, against then-No. 13 SMU (Nov. 23), **Malachi Fields** tallied his 26th consecutive game with at least one reception.
- As of Nov. 26, Fields is one of 29 FBS receivers, including four in the ACC, with a streak of at least 25 games with a reception.
- The last time Fields did not haul in a reception was against Notre Dame in 2021.
- In Virginia's 11 games this season, Fields has 53 receptions for 788 yards. His 71.6 receiving-yards-per-game average is good for fifth in the ACC.

HOOS' EXPERIENCE ON DEFENSE

- Virginia has one of the most experienced defenses in the country.
- Entering 2024, UVA's projected starting defense had combined for 343 games played and 231 starts, including **Kam Butler** (44) and **Kempton Shine** (40).
- Virginia's projected defensive starters entered 2024 with an average of 31.2 career games played and 21.0 starts.
- Cornerback **Kempton Shine**, who transferred to UVA this offseason, entered the 2024 season with 25 consecutive starts.

IN GOOD HANDS

- Virginia is one of 14 schools with a female athletic trainer as its primary care provider for the football program. Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine, Kelli Pugh, has worked closely with the UVA football program since 2002.
- Of those 14 female athletic trainers, Pugh is one of four working at Power-4 institutions.

TYLER NEVILLE'S INSPIRATIONAL STORY

- Virginia tight end **Tyler Neville**, who transferred to UVA this offseason after playing three seasons at Harvard, has overcome an unconscionable number of medical obstacles dating back to the day he was born.
- Born without hearing, ear tube surgery was the first of more than 20 surgeries, including Pectus-Excavatum, Septoplasty and a dozen ear tube surgeries, before Neville's 18th birthday.
- Despite the many medical challenges Neville overcame, it was the cancer diagnosis (Hodgkin lymphoma) in the fall of 2016 that really knocked the wind out of him.
- Due to his Pectus-Excavatum condition and surgery in which a metal rod was inserted into his chest, radiation treatment was not an option. As a freshman in high school Neville was forced to undergo chemotherapy beginning in the fall of 2016, but after fourth months of chemo treatment was declared cancer free – and without missing a single football or basketball practice.

HARDIE FOOTBALL OPERATIONS CENTER

- This past summer, Virginia Athletics proudly opened the 93,000-square-foot **Molly and Robert Hardie Football Operations Center**, which conveniently sits adjacent to the team's George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility and outdoor practice fields.
- The state-of-the-art space encompasses: the team locker, players' lounge and 96-person dining space, 14,000-square-foot strength and condition space with over 150,000 lbs of weight-lifting equipment, cardio mezzanine, 195-seat team meeting space, tiered-seating meeting spaces for each position group, and coaches' offices.
- The exterior of the Hardie Center displays a classic yet chic design and is enclosed by red brick, which is synonymous with the architectural style of the University's most prominent edifices across Grounds such as The Rotunda.
- Of the Hardie Center, Fralin Family Football head coach **Tony Elliott** said, "I wanted the building to be timeless. I wanted to capture all different eras, to be contemporary enough to show the flash and the glitz and glamor as an area for certain recruits, but then also pay homage to all the guys that didn't have an opportunity to walk through those doors today but laid the foundation for Virginia football."

SIGNIFICANT UPGRADES TO SCOTT STADIUM

- This past year the Cavaliers' home venue, Scott Stadium, underwent one of the most significant transformations since it debuted in 1931.
- A 6,700-square-foot videoboard, the Ramon W. Breeden Jr. Videoboard, was constructed along with an accompanying custom-point audio system.
- The new videoboard replaced the previous 'Hoo Vision' board, which was installed in 2009, and elevates Virginia into the upper echelon of college football in this space.
- Other fan experience refinements include the addition of new access points to The Hill behind the north end zone to enhance fan safety and manage capacity, expanded concession options, and additional free shuttles to and from Scott Stadium.

CARLA WILLIAMS ON CFP COMMITTEE

- On Feb. 8, 2024, Virginia Director of Athletics **Carla Williams** was named to the College Football Playoff (CFP) Management Committee.
- As a new member, Williams began a three-year term beginning in the spring of 2024.
- "Carla is an outstanding advocate for college football and will be a knowledgeable, passionate and valuable member of the College Football Playoff Selection Committee," said ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips. "Throughout her time at Virginia as well as her entire career, Carla has consistently shown to be a tremendous leader."
- Williams is in her seventh year as director of athletics at Virginia. During her time in Charlottesville, UVA teams have captured multiple national titles across numerous sports, including the 2019 men's basketball title, 2019 and 2021 men's lacrosse titles, three straight women's swimming and diving championships from 2021-23, and the 2022 and 2023 men's tennis team titles. In addition, UVA has won 17 ACC Championships.
- Williams was a three-year starter and All-SEC guard for the Georgia women's basketball team from 1987-89. Williams then served as an assistant coach for the team before moving into administration as UGA's assistant director of compliance for a year before taking administrative roles at Florida State and Vanderbilt.

Tony Elliott, a patient man, was looking for the right fit when it came time for him to leave the assistant coaching ranks and take on the responsibility of running a collegiate football program as the head coach. During his 11-year tenure at Clemson, his alma mater, several opportunities presented themselves, but it was not until Virginia came calling that he felt the setting was right for what he wants to accomplish.

On Dec. 10, 2021, Elliott was named the University of Virginia's Fralin Family Head Football Coach. At his introductory press conference, he explained his decision to become the Cavaliers' head coach and what he wants to accomplish in Charlottesville.

"I chose UVA because I wanted to lead a program that was partnered with a university that had world-class academics," he said "I wanted to be able to recruit the best and the brightest student-athletes.

"I wanted to compete in the best conference in college athletics. I wanted to be a part of an alignment with (athletic director) Ms. Carla (Williams) and President (Jim) Ryan that shared a vision that was similar to mine, which is centered around the holistic development of the student-athlete. And lastly, I wanted to be part of a university and athletic department that would not compromise its values to win.

"There is no better place for me than UVA. And there is no better time than now."

With that, Elliott went to work crafting what he had hoped to build for years - The Model Program.

"My vision for the UVA football program is to become the model in college football, the model program in college football," he said. "My goal is to contribute to changing the narrative in college football and demonstrate that you can win at the highest level and you can do so while achieving excellence in education, leadership and service."

Elliott's cornerstones of that culture are based on **H.E.A.R.T.- humility, effort, accountability, respect and toughness.**

"I think that building a championship culture starts with making sure that you have alignment and a vision," he said. "You clearly state the vision and you are particular in the people that you bring in and make sure that they align with the vision, and then you stay grounded to the principles that you set in place for the players and the staff, and you go to work every single day, and you keep an inside-out mentality. It's one day at a time, and eventually that will bring your championship culture to life."

Elliott's background and coaching pedigree is rich with championship experiences.

He spent 11 seasons as an assistant on Dabo Swinney's staff at Clemson. In January of 2021, he was named the program's assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He previously served as the team's co-offensive coordinator (2014-20) and the team's running backs coach (2011-20).

At Clemson, Elliott was a part of a 10-season stretch in which the Tigers won 10 or more games. In that span, Clemson won six Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, made four appearances in the College Football Playoff National Championship game and captured national titles in 2016 and 2018.

After Elliott's promotion to co-offensive coordinator prior to the 2014 Russell Athletic Bowl, the Tigers posted an 89-10 record and ranked in the top 12 nationally in total offense. Clemson either led or ranked No. 2 in the ACC in total offense in five of his seven seasons as an offensive coordinator. Elliott's 2018 and 2019 offenses were responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history.

Elliott was named the Frank Broyles Award recipient as the nation's top assistant coach in 2017. Before transitioning to the tight ends room this year, Elliott was in charge of Clemson's running backs for his first 10 seasons. In that time, he guided Clemson running back Travis Etienne to one of the most illustrious careers in ACC and college football history, helping him set the NCAA record for most games scoring a touchdown (46) and secure ACC records for career rushing yards (4,952), total touchdowns (78), rushing touchdowns (70) and points (468).

As the program's offensive coordinator, Elliott worked with two first-round draft picks at quarterback, including the 2021 first overall pick Trevor Lawrence. From 2015-2020, a Clemson offensive player took home both the ACC's Player of the Year and Offensive Player of the Year awards four times.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Elliott spent three seasons at Furman (2008-10) and two at South Carolina State (2006-07) coaching wide receivers at both schools. Prior to his coaching career he worked for Michelin North America for two years.

In 2002, Elliott earned his undergraduate degree in industrial engineering from Clemson, where he was a first-team Academic All-ACC selection as well as a CoSIDA Academic District III member. He was also a recipient of an ACC Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship.

Under Tommy Bowden, he came to Clemson as a walk-on wide receiver in the fall of 1999 and finished his career with four letters and appeared in 44 games. Swinney was his position coach his senior year (2003) in which he was named a co-captain of a team that finished with a 9-4 record and a No. 22 final ranking by AP and USA Today.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

- The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.
- Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.
- Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.
- Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.
- Virginia has played 490 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 284-194-12.

Virginia Team Notes

- At 5-6 overall, UVA enters its final game of the season one win away from becoming bowl eligible for the first time since 2021.
- UVA is now 2-6 against ranked opponents under head coach Tony Elliott.
- For the first time since 2021 and sixth time in program history (1949, 1996, 2002, 2005, 2019, 2021, 2024), the Cavaliers played their third consecutive game against a ranked opponent.
- In its last six home games against top-25 opponents (dating back to 2018), Virginia is 3-3.
- The Cavaliers held SMU to 111 rushing yards, its lowest output in an ACC game this season and second-lowest overall.
- UVA scored its lone touchdown in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers are outscoring their opponents 91-59 in the fourth quarter this season.
- Virginia is the Mustangs' second opponent in their last 10 games to not give the ball away. SMU entered Saturday's game 10th in FBS and third in the ACC in turnovers gained per game (2.0).
- UVA is 2-2 when winning the turnover battle this season, dropping contests against Louisville and SMU.
- With the victory, SMU clinched a spot in the ACC Championship game on Dec. 7 in Charlotte. SMU is 7-0 in ACC play in its first season in the conference. The Mustangs have won 16 straight conference games dating back to their time in the American Athletic Conference.
- SMU has won 10 straight road games, the second-longest streak in program history.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Malachi Fields (4 receptions, 42 yards, 1 TD) has caught at least one pass in 26 consecutive games.
- UVA's only TD of the game was a Fields' reception in the end zone in the fourth quarter. It marked his fifth touchdown of the season and 11th of his career.
- With 127 career receptions, Fields needs only two more to crack UVA's top-10 career leaders list.
- Fields now has 1,830 career receiving yards, still good for ninth all-time in program history.
- Noah Vaughn rushed for career highs in both rushing attempts (10) and rushing yards (44).
- Jam Jackson tied his career high with nine tackles, including six solo. Jackson also had nine take-downs against Maryland (9/14) earlier this season.
- Kempton Shine has now made 36 consecutive starts dating back to his tenure at Eastern Michigan, the sixth most amongst active FBS secondary players.
- With one successful PAT, Will Bettridge tied fellow placekicker Wayne Morrison (1979-92) for 13th on UVA's career points list. In 30 career games, Bettridge has 193 career points with 67 PATs and 42 field goals made.
- Daniel Sparks recorded a season-high 333 total yards punting and tied his season high of seven punts.

Virginia Team Notes

- The contest marked the 129th all-time meeting between Virginia and North Carolina, "The South's Oldest Rivalry," It tied with Georgia-Auburn for the second-most played rivalry in FBS. North Carolina improved to 66-59-4 in the all-time series that was first played in 1892.
North Carolina has won three-straight games at Scott Stadium and seven of the last eight against UVA in Charlottesville.
Virginia is outscoring their opponents 74-40 in fourth quarters this season including an 8-3 edge against UNC.
Despite the loss, Virginia has won five of the last eight meetings against North Carolina.
UNC's Omarion Hampton (105 yards) is only the second player to rush for 100 yards in a game against UVA this season (Louisville's Issac Brown, 146 yards). Hampton has 100 yards in all but one game this season and eclipsed 1,000 yards for the second-straight year.
The 135 total rushing yards are the fewest by the Tar Heels this season.
JR Wilson became the 12th Cavalier to score a touchdown with a 68-yard reception in the fourth quarter.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Malachi Fields caught three passes for 48 yards and moved into 12th place on UVA's career receiving yards list. His 1,695 career receiving yards are eight yards shy of Heath Miller (2002-04) who finished his career with 1,703.
Fields has now caught a pass in each of his last 23 games played.
Tight end Tyler Neville eclipsed the 1,000-yard career receiving mark, with four catches for 32 yards against North Carolina. He has 1,013 for his career with 689 at Harvard and 317 at UVA.
Jonas Sanker finished with seven tackles, including six unassisted. Sanker now has 154 career solo tackles.
Kicker Will Bettridge, who came into the contest with the most field goals per game in the ACC, added successful tries of 30 and 27. He now has 184 career points, four shy of matching Bill Dudley (1939-41) for the No. 15 spot on UVA's all-time scoring list.
Anthony Britton recorded a career-high 10 tackles, also a game high. Britton's previous career best was four which he achieved three times, most recently at Clemson last week.
With an interception in the third quarter, Anthony Colandrea's four-game streak without an interception came to a close. His interception on the first drive in the third quarter was the first in his last 146 passing attempts.
JR Wilson scored his first career touchdown on a 68-yard pass from Tony Muskett with 10:07 to play, which is Virginia's longest pass play this season and second-longest play from scrimmage.
Wilson's touchdown also marks UVA's longest passing play since Kobe Pace's 75-yard catch against James Madison in 2023.
With a 60-yard boot in the second quarter, Daniel Sparks now has 14 career punts (12 at UVA) of 60 yards or more. He eclipsed the 11 career 60-yard punts by Russ Henderson (1975-78) for the most ever by a Cavalier.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia scored 31 points in the contest, its second-most ever against Clemson in 50 all-time meetings. UVA scored 35 in a 40-35 loss in Clemson in 1966.
UVA outscored Clemson 21-10 in the fourth quarter and is outscoring opponents 66-37 in fourth quarters this season.
Virginia's 10-3 advantage in the second quarter marked its first lead over Clemson since the 2004 meeting, a span of five games in the series.
Virginia's interception at the end of the first quarter was the first Clemson turnover since Sept. 28 against Stanford. Clemson entered Saturday's contest with three turnovers in 2024 (2 INT, 1 fumble).
In four ACC games this season, Virginia has forced seven turnovers (5 INT, 2 fumbles).
With its lost fumble in the third quarter, UVA committed its first turnover in its previous three games. It snapped a streak of 14-consecutive quarters without a turnover.
A season-high 12 different UVA receivers caught a pass in the contest, including four different for a touchdown.
Clemson recorded its sixth-straight win over Virginia and improved to 41-8-1 in the all-time series with Virginia.
Clemson is 22-3-1 all-time against UVA at Memorial Stadium.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- With 65 receiving yards, Malachi Fields cracked UVA's top-15 career receiving yards list ... In his 31st career game, Fields surpassed Tim Smith's 1,591 career-receiving-yards mark.
Fields finished with three receptions, including a 44-yard touchdown, and has now hauled in at least one pass in 22-straight games played.
Fields caught his fourth touchdown pass of the season, a 44-yard completion from Anthony Colandrea to open the fourth quarter. It marked his third touchdown in his last four games and 10th of his career. The 44-yard catch is the longest touchdown reception of his career.
Dakota Twitty caught his first career touchdown, an eight-yard reception to give UVA a 10-3 lead in the second quarter. The reception is the sixth of his career and fifth of the season. On the previous play, Twitty caught a five-yard pass over the middle for a first down at the Clemson 8-yard line.
Kam Robinson intercepted his first pass of the season and third of his career. The interception setup UVA's first touchdown of the day.
Ethan Davies caught a 65-yard touchdown pass from Tony Muskett with 1:39 to play. It marked UVA's second-longest play overall of the season and longest through the air.
Sackett Wood Jr. recorded his first career touchdown, an eight-yard reception from Muskett with 2:11 left to play in the fourth quarter. It was Wood's second catch of the season and 23rd of his career.
Muskett's pair of touchdowns marked his first multiple-passing-touchdown effort since UVA's home game against William & Mary on Oct. 7, 2023, when Muskett also had two.
Linebacker Trey McDonald recorded a game-high 11 tackles, also his career best. In McDonald's second career start, he also tied for a game-high seven solo tackles along with teammates Jonas Sanker and Kam Robinson.

- Virginia and Coastal Carolina met for the first time. UVA improved to 6-4 all-time against current members of the Sun Belt Conference.
- The Chanticleers were one of 43 unbeaten teams in FBS coming into the weekend.
- UVA rushed for 384 yards, the first time UVA eclipsed the 300-yard rushing mark since 2018 vs. Richmond. It was the most rushing yards in a game by a UVA offense since compiling 446 yards against San Jose State in 1998.
- Virginia's 43 points were the most scored under Elliott and the most since scoring 49 against BYU in 2021.
- Virginia accumulated 525 yards of total offense (384 rush, 141 pass), the most in a game under Elliott and the most since racking up 588 against BYU in 2021.
- UVA is 3-1 on the season, its best start under head coach Tony Elliott and its best start since 2019 (4-0).
- Marks the fourth time in last 17 years (since 2008) Virginia has three or more wins through its first four games (2024 - 3-1; 2019 - 4-0; 2018 - 3-1; 2017 - 3-1).
- Virginia forced a season-high, three turnovers (two fumbles, one interception). It was the first time UVA forced three or more takeaways since forcing four against Boston College (4 - 2 fumbles, 2 interceptions). In addition, the Cavaliers forced a three of turnover on downs.
- UVA never trailed in the contest and took the lead 1:24 into the game.
- Second time in four games UVA scored on opening drive (Richmond - 3 plays, 77 yards). The scoring drive was UVA's shortest in yardage (13 yards) of the season.
- Announced attendance at Brooks Stadium was 22,104, the largest crowd in facility history. It broke the previous record of 21,324 set against Marshall on Oct. 23, 2023.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Xavier Brown rushed for 171 yards on nine carries (19.0 ypc). He is UVA's first 100-yard rusher since Perris Jones ran for 134 yards against William & Mary last season. He is the first Cavalier to rush for 150+ yards since Bryce Perkins vs. Virginia Tech in 2019 (164 yards) and the first UVA running back with 150+ since 2018 (Jordan Ellis vs. Ohio).
- 75-yard run by Brown is the longest by a UVA rusher since Jordan Ellis' 75-yard scamper against Louisville in 2018
- Grady Brosterhous rushed for two touchdowns on three carries. He has six carries for 10 yards and three touchdowns this season.
- Brosterhous is the first Cavalier with multiple rushing touchdowns in a game since Mike Hollins against North Carolina (3 touchdowns) in 2023. He's the first Cavalier quarterback with multiple rushing scores since Brennan Armstrong had two against Virginia Tech in 2021.
- The three rushing touchdowns this year by Brosterhous are the most in a season by a UVA quarterback since 2022 (Brennan Armstrong - 6).
- For the second time in his career, Malachi Fields caught two touchdown passes in a game. The TD receptions were his first two of the season and he ups his career total to eight. He finished the game with 4 receptions, 64 yards and two touchdowns.
- Dating back to last years' season finale, Fields has four touchdowns in his last five games.
- On the opening kickoff, Landon Danley forced a fumble that was recovered by Eli Wood. Today marked the fifth game of Danley's career.

Virginia Team Notes

- With the win, the Cavaliers snapped a five-game losing skid in the series with Wake Forest and improved to 35-17 in the all-time series, which began in 1889.
- Virginia collected its first win in Winston-Salem since 2002, when it scored the final three touchdowns to erase a 17-point deficit and win, 38-34.
- Virginia is off to its first 2-0 start since 2021 and only the third since the 2013 season.
- UVA trailed for nearly 58 minutes until Will Bettridge's extra point with 2:07 remaining.
- Virginia trailed by as many as 14 points, the largest deficit overcome in a victory since 2021 (at Louisville).
- Wake Forest was the first UVA opponent to score a touchdown on the opening drive since JMU on Sept. 9, 2023, a span of 11 games.
- UVA had not won a game when an opponent has scored a touchdown on the opening drive since it defeated Georgia Tech on Oct. 23, 2021.
- The Virginia defense totaled six sacks, the most in a game since recording eight at Georgia Tech on Oct. 20, 2022.
- The Cavaliers won their first ACC opener on the road since knocking off Pitt in 2019. UVA came into the contest having lost three-straight ACC openers.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Malachi Fields finished with career high in receptions (11) and receiving yards (148). He recorded his second-straight 100-yard receiving effort. It marks the ninth-straight game a UVA wide receiver has gone over the century mark dating back to last season.
- Fields has 329 yards receiving in his last three games, which includes the 2023 season finale.
- Trell Harris caught a career-high seven passes for 91 yards, three yards shy of matching his career best.
- Tyler Neville recorded his first two-touchdown game of his career, catching first half scores of 18 and 24 yards. He now has 10 career touchdown receptions (8 at Harvard, 2 at UVA). He's the first Cavalier tight end with two touchdown receptions in a game since Tom Santi against Duke on Sept. 8, 2007. Neville finished the night with four catches for 68 yards.
- Quarterback Anthony Colandrea completed 33 of 43 passes (77 percent) for 357 yards and matched a career-best with three touchdown passes. His 33 completions were a career-high and the most by a UVA quarterback since 2021 (Brennan Armstrong, 36 at Pitt).
- For the second-straight week, Antonio Clary led the team in tackles with 11 and he added his second career sack. Fellow safety Jonas Sanker finished with 10 tackles including seven solo efforts and his first career sack.
- In his only rushing attempt of the night, quarterback Grady Brosterhous plunged forward for a one-yard rushing touchdown with 2:07 remaining, which ultimately led to Bettridge's game-winning PAT. It was the first rushing touchdown of Brosterhous' career. Linebacker Trey McDonald made a career-high nine tackles (four solo) and was credited with his first collegiate sack.
- With 1:24 remaining, Malcolm Greene forced a fumble after Wake's Taylor Morin hauled in a 20-yard reception, and Antonio Clary recovered the ball at the UVA 29-yard line. Greene's forced fumble was the second of his career and first as a Cavalier.
- Jahmeer Carter made his 25th consecutive start, the longest active streak on the team as a Cavalier.

- UVA has won seven of its last eight season openers and owns an 86-40-9 (.670) all-time record in season-opening games
- The Cavaliers are 80-21-7 (.773) all-time in home season openers and have won 23 of their last 28 season openers in Scott Stadium
- Virginia improves to 31-3-2 all-time against Richmond have won 13 of the last 14 meetings.
- Virginia's first completed pass of the season went for a touchdown, a 35-yard completion from Anthony Colandrea to Trell Harris. It marked the first time in 135-year history of Virginia football that the first completed pass of the season went for a touchdown.

- Jack Griese notched his second career touchdown (first receiving) on a 57-yard reception late in the first quarter ... It was the fourth reception of his career and the longest reception of his career.
- Malachi Fields first career 100-yard receiving effort. His previous career-high was 89 yards against Virginia Tech last season. A Cavalier has recorded a 100-yard receiving performance in Eight-straight games dating back to last season.
- Kobe Pace career-high is 191 yards against Wake Forest (at Clemson) in 2021. He has two career 100-yard games, both came at Clemson.
- Anthony Colandrea accounted for 346 yards of total offense (297 pass, 49 rush), the second-highest total of his career (403 vs. Louisville in 2023). His three total touchdowns (2 pass, 1 rush) matched a career-best. He recorded his first career rushing touchdown with a seven-yard keeper with 8:31 left in the third quarter.
- Jason Hammond III made his first college start at defensive tackle. First years Ethan Minter and Billy Koudelka made their collegiate debuts.
