INSIDE SATURDAY'S MATCHUP

- Virginia will play in its first bowl game since the 2019 Orange Bowl against Florida. The Cavaliers were most recently bowl eligible in 2021, but the Fenway Bowl against future ACC foe SMU was canceled due to COVID issues.
- Saturday will be Virginia's 22nd bowl game appearance and the third time UVA has been a participant in the Gator Bowl (1991, 2008, 2025).
- Missouri is Virginia's first SEC opponent since squaring off against Tennessee at Nissan Stadium in Nashville for the 2023 season opener.
- Virginia and Missouri will meet for only the second time ever. The only other meeting was a 31-7 Tiger victory in Columbia, Mo., back in 1973.
- Virginia's last win against an SEC foe game in the 2018 Belk Bowl, a 28-0 shutout of South Carolina in Charlotte. The Cavaliers are 33-54-6 all-time against SEC opponents and have defeated seven of the 16 current SEC teams.
- The matchup of Virginia (No. 20) and Missouri (No. 25) is one of three bowl games outside the College Football Playoff that feature both teams ranked in the AP Top 25. BYU (No. 12) and Georgia Tech (No. 24) in the Pop Tarts Bowl and Texas (No. 14) and Michigan (No. 18) in the Cheez It Citrus Bowl are the others.
- Virginia finished No. 19 in the final CFP Rankings and is currently No. 20 in the latest AP poll. The Cavaliers were included in all six CFP rankings for the first time ever and have been inside the AP Top 25 for 11-consecutive weeks, its longest stay since the 2004 season.
- UVA is amid its second-ever 10-win season, matching the 1989 team for the most in school history.
- At 7-1 in the ACC, Virginia matched its best record in league play and marked the first time ever UVA has finished alone atop the league standings. The Cavaliers have never won the league outright, winning shares in 1989 (6-1) and 1995 (7-1) before the ACC championship game began determining the league champion in 2005.
- For the second-straight game, Virginia will play in an NFL Stadium following the 2025 ACC Championship game, which took place in Bank of America Stadium (Charlotte, N.C.) on Dec. 6. The Cavaliers have played in an NFL stadium in seven of the last eight years and return to EverBank for the first time since the 2008 Gator Bowl.

TOP STORYLINES

- With a 10-3 overall record, the Cavaliers are seeking an 11th win, which would be the most in a single season in the 136-year history of the program. Virginia and Miami are the only two ACC teams to finish the regular season with double-digit victories.
- Virginia head coach **Tony Elliott** was a member of the 2000 Clemson team that played in the Gator Bowl. Originally a walk-on, Elliott was a four-time letterwinner as a wide receiver for the Tigers and Dabo Swinney was his position coach as a senior in 2003. UVA defensive end coach **Chris Slade** was on the UVA team that squared off against Oklahoma in the 1991 Gator Bowl.
- Virginia offensive coordinator **Des Kitchens** was on staff with current Missouri head coach Eli Drinkwitz at NC State for three seasons (2016-18). Kitchens spent a total of eight years at NC State coaching running backs (2012 - and worked with Drinkwitz from 2016-18 when he was the Wolfpack offensive coordinator. The duo has combined to coach the top rusher in the SEC (Ahmad Hardy) and the ACC (**J'Mari Taylor**) this season. While co-offensive coordinator at Clemson, Tony Elliott got the best of three matchups against the duo of Drinkwitz and Kitchens at NC State (2016 - 24-17 OT; 2017 - 38-31; 2018 - 41-7).
- A total of 13 Cavaliers hail from the state of Florida, the most of any other state besides Virginia. UVA's seventh-year safety, **Antonio Clary**, is the lone Jacksonville native from either team participating in the bowl, having played his prep football at Sandalwood High School on the east side of town. He is UVA's lone holdover from the 2019 Orange Bowl squad, and with the 27-7 win over Virginia Tech in the regular season finale is the first Cavalier to beat the Hokies twice since 1998.

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UNIQUELY UVA

The University of Virginia is an institution rich with history and tradition. Here is some of the terminology that contributes to UVA's culture.

Grounds: The term used by students, faculty and alumni to refer to the University dating as far back as Thomas Jefferson. "Campus" is never used.**First Year, Second Year, Third Year, Fourth Year:** Instead of freshman, sophomore, junior, senior. Why you may ask? To be a "senior" implies that a person has reached the final phase of learning, a feat that Thomas Jefferson believed to be impossible, arguing instead that education is a life-long process.**Commonwealth:** Virginia is one of four constituent states of the United States of America that officially uses the name "Commonwealth" instead of the word state in all references. The other three commonwealths are Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania.**UNIVERSITY NICKNAMES**

Virginia's athletics teams have been accompanied by a somewhat confusing array of nicknames. The most prominent and widely accepted of these monikers are "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos."

Although the terms "Cavaliers," "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are used almost interchangeably to refer to University teams and players, "Cavaliers" is more often used by the media, while "Wahoos" and "Hoos" are frequently used by Virginia students and fans.

Legend has it that Washington & Lee baseball fans dubbed the Virginia players "Wahoos" during the fiercely contested rivalry that existed between the two in-state schools in the 1890s. By 1940, "Wahoos" was in general use around Grounds to denote University students or events relating to them. The abbreviated "Hoos" sprang up later in student newspapers and has gained growing popularity in recent years.**THE CAVALIER MASCOT**

The costumed Cavalier with a large character head debuted during Virginia's 1984 football season and has remained the official mascot of the University.

The first documented Cavalier on horseback was Francis Bell, a Virginia student from Dublin, Va., in 1947. Bell rode onto the field dressed as Cavaliers for Virginia's home football game with Harvard on the afternoon of October 11.

The Cavalier on horseback returned as the University's mascot in 1963. The UVA Polo Club provided both the horse and rider. However, the mounted Cavalier and his horse parted company in 1974 with the inception of AstroTurf at Scott Stadium.

The mounted Cavalier made its return in the Florida Citrus Bowl at the end of the 1989 football season. Due to its instant popularity, the Cavalier on horseback returned the following season on a regular basis and continues to lead the Virginia football team onto the field at the beginning of all home games.

Since 2000, Kim Kirschnick led the Cavaliers out of the tunnel on horseback and retired after the 2021 season finale against Virginia Tech. 2022 marked Julie Caruccio first season as the mounted Cavalier. A former interim dean of students at UVA, Caruccio is the first female in school history to have the mounted Cavalier job on a full-time basis. When the tradition rotated among members of the club polo team until Kirschnick took over in 2000, at least two women – Bess Worrall and Kerry McDaniel – were on horseback for a few games in the early '90s.

UNIVERSITY COLORS

Orange and blue were adopted as the University of Virginia's official athletic colors at a mass student meeting in 1888. UVA athletic teams had previously worn silver gray and cardinal red, but those colors did not stand out on muddy football fields, prompting a student movement to change them.

One of the students attending the mass meeting was Allen Potts, a star athlete who played on Virginia's first football team in 1888. Potts showed up at the meeting wearing a navy blue-and-orange scarf that he had acquired during a summer boating expedition at Oxford University. Orange and blue were chosen as the official athletic colors after one of Potts' fellow students pulled the scarf off Potts' neck and, waving it to the crowd, yelled, "How will this do?" UVA later served as the inspiration for schools like Auburn and Florida when they selected school colors.

WAH-HOO-WA

The origin of "Wah-hoo-wa" is uncertain. The cheer was used to root on Virginia teams as early as 1890 and may have been borrowed from Dartmouth College, whose athletics teams were once known as the Indians.

Legend attributes the yell to Natalie Floyd Otey, who sang the ballad "Where'er You Are, There Shall My Love Be" at Charlottesville's Levy Opera House in 1893. The predominantly student audience noticed that Otey warbled the first three words of the song between each of the stanzas and decided to join in the refrain. By evening's end, goes the legend, the crowd had corrupted "Where'er You Are" into "Wah-hoo-wah."

The Levy Opera House stands at the corner of High Street and Park Street and has since been renovated into an office building.

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A WIN FOR THE CAVALIERS WOULD BE...

- UVA's 11th victory of the season and set the program's single-season wins record. The only teams in school history to win 10 games are the 1989 and 2025 Cavaliers.
- Virginia's largest overall win improvement from year to year in its 136-year history.
- The program's 699th all-time win. UVA's first season of football was 1888.
- Virginia's seventh victory of the season while ranked in the AP poll. The last time UVA had six or more wins while ranked in the AP top-25 was in 2004, when it was ranked in every game that year.
- UVA's first-ever win in the Gator Bowl. UVA is 0-2 at EverBank Stadium, suffering losses in Dec. 29, 1991 and Jan. 1, 2008.
- UVA's first bowl win since its 28-0 shutout over South Carolina in the 2018 Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C.
- Virginia's first win over an SEC opponent since the 2018 Belk Bowl and its first win over an SEC opponent that is not South Carolina since 1998, when the Cavaliers shut out Auburn 19-0 in the season opener.

UPCOMING MILESTONES

- Tailback **Harrison Waylee** is expected to make his 50th career appearance. Waylee is also two carries shy of his 100th this season and 700th of his career.
- Quarterback **Chandler Morris**' next rushing attempt will be the 100th of his career. Morris also needs 17 completions for the 800th of his career.
- Receiver **Cam Ross**' next reception will be the 200th of his career.
- Receiver **Trell Harris**' next touchdown reception would mark the 10th of his career.
- Receiver **Jahmal Edrine**'s next touchdown reception would mark the 10th of his career.
- Defensive end **Mitchell Melton** needs two sacks for the 10th of his career.
- Safety **Antonio Clary** needs two tackles to reach 200 total for his career. He also needs nine solo tackles to reach No. 100. His next interception would be the fifth of his career.

CAVALIERS RETURN TO GATOR BOWL

- Virginia is 0-2 all-time in the Gator Bowl, home to the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars. See chart below.
- Additionally, Saturday's will also mark the program's 13th game in an NFL stadium since the start of 2018 season. UVA is 4-8 in such contests. Virginia's last win at an NFL stadium came in a primetime matchup against Pittsburgh at Acrisure Stadium, formerly (and still colloquially) known as Heinz Field.

YEAR FOUR UNDER TONY ELLIOTT

- **Tony Elliott** is in his fourth year at the helm of the Virginia football program.
- Additionally, Elliott returned his entire assistant coaching staff from 2024, including **Des Kitchings** (offensive coordinator) and **John Rudzinski** (defensive coordinator), making UVA one of only six Power-4 schools to return their entire coaching staff in 2025.
- Elliott brought a wealth of championship experience to Charlottesville following an 11-year tenure at Clemson University, his alma mater. Elliott helped the Tigers win national championships in 2016 and 2018 and seven ACC championships (2011, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020).
- During his 16-year tenure as an assistant coach, Elliott has been a part of 15 winning seasons, including 10-win seasons at Clemson from 2011-20.
- With Elliott as offensive coordinator, Clemson went 89-10 and made four CFP National Championship game.

ELLIOTT GARNERS NATIONAL RECOGNITION

- Virginia head coach **Tony Elliott** has been named a semifinalist for three national coach-of-the-year awards.
- He was named a semifinalist for the Munger Award, Bobby Dodd Trophy and Paul “Bear” Bryant Coach of the Year Awards.
- Prior to the season, Virginia had won nine or more games in a season eight times in the 136-year history of the program.
- Despite being picked 14th in the 2025 ACC preseason poll, Elliott and the Cavaliers posted a league-best 7-1 record in ACC play, which also tied the program’s best record in conference play.
- The Cavaliers are bowl-eligible for the first time since 2021 and earned a berth in the ACC Championship game for only the second time in program history, also the first since 2019.

ACC WIN IMPROVEMENT UNDER ELLIOTT

- Virginia has increased its ACC win total each year under head coach **Tony Elliott**.
- The Cavaliers were the only ACC team to finish 7-1 in league play this year. UVA’s 7-1 ACC record tied with the 1995 Cavaliers’ best record in ACC play in program history.
- Elliott is also the fastest UVA head football coach to clinch at least a share of first place in the final ACC standings.
- This year, the Cavaliers won their first five ACC games, the longest ACC win streak in program history.

WAHOOS HAVE THREE OVERTIME WINS

- Virginia has emerged victorious in three overtime games this season: Florida State [46-38] in double overtime, and road games against Louisville [30-27] and North Carolina [17-16].
- As of Dec. 18, UVA is one of only eight teams in college football history to have won three overtime games in the same season.
- Texas Tech was the previous team with three OT wins during the 2022 season.
- Overtime in college football was first instituted in 1996.
- Not since 1935 has UVA had more than three tied scores at the end of regulation.

IMPROVEMENT IN ONE-SCORE GAMES

- The Cavaliers have been much improved in one-score games over the last two seasons in contrast to 2022 and 2023.
- UVA has won four of its last six one-score games, dating back to its double-overtime win over then-No. 8 Florida State (Sept. 26).

HOOS INSIDE AP TOP 25

- At **No. 20** in the Dec. 7 edition of the Associated Press (AP) Top 25, UVA has been ranked in the previous 11 consecutive polls, dating back to Sept. 28 (week 5).
- The last time the Cavaliers were ranked in at least 11 consecutive polls was in 2004, when they were in the top-25 in every week that season.
- Following its 31-21 road win over Cal, Virginia earned a No. 12 ranking in the AP poll, its highest since Oct. 31, 2004.
- Following the program’s highest-ranked win at Scott Stadium in the last 20 years the Cavaliers — a 46-38 double overtime win over then-No. 8 Florida State —

made their season debut in the AP poll at No. 24 in the week 6 edition on Sept. 28.

- Virginia received votes in the week 2 edition of the AP poll following its 48-7 season-opening rout of Coastal Carolina.

FOURTH-QUARTER EMPHASIS

- Virginia has improved in the fourth quarter over the last two seasons, a point of emphasis by head coach **Tony Elliott**.
- This year, Virginia has outscored its opponents 61-53 in quarter No. 4, and 85-72 when factoring in overtime periods. UVA is also 3-1 in overtime games this season.
- The Cavaliers’ defense unit has only given up three touchdowns in the fourth quarter in the previous seven games (Duke, VT, Duke, Wake, Cal, UNC, WSU).
- In 2024, Virginia outscored its opponents in the fourth quarter in seven of its 12 games by a combined margin of 97-66.
- In Elliott’s first two seasons at UVA, the Cavaliers were outscored by their opponents in the fourth quarters 114-54 in 2023 and 43-36 in 2022.
- In its seventh win of the 2025 season, UVA shut out North Carolina (Oct. 25) for the entire second half of regulation. During that span, the Cavaliers forced four UNC punts and nabbed two interceptions.
- Against Washington State (Oct. 18), UVA outscored the Cougars 12-0 in the fourth quarter to mount a comeback after trailing by 10 [17-7] at the half. After struggling for much of the game, the Cavaliers’ offense put together a 97-yard touchdown drive, which tied the score [20-20], and then added a safety to take the lead for good with under 3:00 to play.
- On Sept. 26, then-No. 8 Florida State, which entered the game with the nation’s No. 1 offense, became the first team this season to score points from scrimmage against UVA in the fourth quarter. The Seminoles were UVA’s fifth opponent of the year.

WAHOOS’ DEFENSIVE DELIVERANCE

- In its last six games – all of which have been against ACC foes – Virginia is holding its opponents to an average of 17.3 points per game.
- The Cavaliers lead the ACC and are third nationally in third-down defense (28.2%).
- UVA is also third in the ACC in scoring defense (20.5) and total defense (313.3).
- In its last four games (Duke, VT, Duke, Wake), the Cavaliers’ defensive unit has only given up four touchdowns in regulation.
- Virginia is 9-1 in this season when forcing a turnover. Its only loss when forcing a turnover was against Duke (Dec. 6) in the ACC Championship game.
- The Cavaliers did not allow Wake Forest’s offense to score a touchdown.
- Clutch plays down the stretch were a determining factor in UVA’s seven-game win streak.
- With interceptions by true freshman **Corey Costner** and junior **Kam Robinson** at Cal (Nov. 1), UVA recorded two interceptions in three consecutive games (Cal, UNC, Wazzu), a first since 2011 (Idaho, Georgia Tech, NC State).
- Robinson’s pick-six at Cal put the game out of reach with under a minute to play.
- At North Carolina (Oct. 25), **Emmanuel Karnley**

helped make a goal-line stand on the Heels' two-point conversion attempt in overtime to deliver UVA's third overtime victory this season.

- Robinson's safety late in the fourth quarter against Washington State (Oct. 18) proved to be the game-winning score after breaking a 20-20 tie.
- The Cavaliers came up with two interceptions in their 46-38 win double-overtime win over then-No. 8 Florida State (Sept. 26), the second of came on the final play on fourth down.

CAVALIERS ARE MUCH REFINED IN GOAL-TO-GO

- This season, Virginia has scored touchdowns on 23 of its 30 goal-to-go situations, a clip of 76.7 percent, and came away with points on all but two chances.
- UVA scored touchdowns in all three goal-to-go situations in its most recent 27-7 win over Virginia Tech (Nov. 29).
- The Cavaliers came away with TDs on their first 10 goal-to-go situations this year.
- In 2024, UVA scored 15 touchdowns in 24 goal-to-go situations, a clip of 62.5 percent.

PROTECT THE BALL, PROTECT THE QB

- Virginia head coach **Tony Elliott** has said that the ball and the quarterback "are the program," underscoring the central role both play in a team's success.
- The Cavaliers have played six games this season without committing a giveaway (VT, Cal, WSU, UoFL, SU, CCU).
- Virginia has turned the ball over only 11 times (8 INT, 3 fumbles), which is tied for first among all ACC teams this season.
- The only the game the Cavaliers have lost a fumble was against Wake Forest (Nov. 8), when they lost three. UVA entered the matchup as one of two teams nationally to have not lost a fumble.
- Virginia has not allowed a sack in five games this year, most recently in its 34-17 road win over Duke (Nov. 15), and in its first three games of the season.
- This season marked the first time since 2011 that UVA went three consecutive games without giving up a sack. The 2011 team had the same starters in all 13 games and was comprised of Oday Aboushi, Austin Pasztor, Anthony Mihota, Luke Bowanko and Morgan Moses. Four of those players went on to play in the NFL.

J'MARI TAYLOR: ONE OF THE NATION'S LEADING RUSHERS

- **J'Mari Taylor**, who transferred to UVA this past January from North Carolina Central, leads all ACC players in rushing yards (1,062) and leads all ACC tailbacks in rushing touchdowns (14).
- The Charlotte native is the seventh UVA player to rush for at least 14 touchdowns in season and first since Keith Payne did so in 2010. The UVA single-season record is 17 posted by Wali Lundy (2004) and Bill Dudley (1941).
- Taylor has scored at least one rushing TD in 20 of his last 24 games, dating back to his time at NCCU.
- His 81.7 rushing yards-per-game average is also good for third among all ACC players.
- Taylor has three 100-yard rushing performances this season (150 at NCSU, 133 at Duke, 105 at Cal), the

most by a UVA tailback in a season since Jordan Ellis in 2018.

- Taylor scored the game-winning TDs in overtime in road contests at both North Carolina (10/25) and Louisville; both rushes occurred on direct snaps.
- His streak of 14 games with at least one touchdown that ended in UVA's 48-20 win over Stanford (9/20). During that span, Taylor had scored 23 total touchdowns, 21 of which came on the ground.
- At NC State (9/6), Taylor matched his career high of three rushing TDs and surpassed 2,000 career rushing yards.
- Taylor also became the first UVA player with five rushing TDs in the first two games of the season since Kevin Parks also had five in 2011.
- Taylor has nine career multi-rushing TD performances, including four at UVA.
- He had two rushing TDs in his Cavalier debut against Coastal Carolina (8/30).

MORRIS STEERING THE CAVALIERS' OFFENSE

- Virginia quarterback **Chandler Morris** is leading a UVA team that's averaging 426.3 yards of total offense – good for third in the ACC.
- With Morris under center, UVA (10-3) tied the program's single-season wins record, also its highest wins mark since 1989.
- Morris is one of only six ACC QBs who have completed at least 64.6 percent of passes and thrown for at least 16 touchdowns.
- Morris is averaging 215.5 yards passing and 234.4 yards of total offense per game.
- His standout performances include UVA's wins over Stanford (380 yards passing), Duke (316 yards passing) and then-No. 8 Florida State (266 yards of total offense). Morris accounted for five total TDs in wins over the Cardinal and Seminoles.
- With Morris under center, the Cavaliers have scored at least 30 points in eight games so far this season.
- For his efforts, Morris has garnered national recognition. He was named one of 20 FBS semifinalists for the Davey O'Brien Award, Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award National Player of the Week, and a two-time ACC Quarterback of the Week.

BETRIDGE ON UVA'S CAREER SCORING LIST

- Placekicker **Will Bettridge** is one of three players in UVA history to reach the 300-point club .
- This year, he's averaging 8.8 points per game, good for third among all ACC players and is 11th nationally (as of Dec. 17).
- For the second consecutive season, Bettridge led all UVA scorers in 2024 with 78 points (18-21 FG, 24-24 PAT).
- His 6.5 points-per-game average was good for 16th among all ACC players.

SIX WINS AT SCOTT STADIUM

- Virginia's six home victories this season mark only the third time in the past 34 years that UVA has recorded at least six wins at Scott Stadium.
- UVA has achieved six or more home wins in a season 13 times: 2025, 2019, 2002, 1991, 1989, 1951, 1925, 1914, 1913, 1912, 1911, 1910 and 1902.
- For the first time under **Tony Elliott**, UVA achieved a winning record at home.
- Elliott has stressed the importance of "defending Scott [Stadium]" throughout his tenure at UVA.
- Of UVA's seven home games played this season, four occurred within the first five weeks of the season
- Virginia played seven home games at Scott Stadium including four in the first five weeks of the season.

CAVALIERS RECLAIM THE COMMONWEALTH CUP

- For only the third time since 2000, Virginia defeated its in-state rival, Virginia Tech, 27-7 in the regular-season finale at Scott Stadium.
- As a result, the Cavaliers reclaimed the Commonwealth Cup for the first time since 2019 and secured the program's second-ever berth in the ACC Championship game, also a first since 2019.
- The win was also UVA's 10th of the season, which tied the program's single-season wins record set in 1989.
- Virginia's defense held Tech to 197 yards, 57 of which came on its lone score of the game, a touchdown pass late in the fourth quarter.
- It marked the first time UVA has held Virginia Tech to single-digit points since the 1991 meeting, a 38-0 victory for the Wahoos in Charlottesville.
- The Hokies' six first downs were their fewest in a game since 1998.
- An announced crowd of 58,832, the largest for a game at Scott Stadium since 2011, savored the victory Saturday night.

HOOS GOING INTERNATIONAL TO KICK OFF 2026

- Virginia and NC State will open the 2026 season in a Week 0 ACC matchup on Aug. 29 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, at Nilton Santos Stadium (Engenhão).
- The meeting is the first-ever FBS game to be played in South America.
- Rio de Janeiro hosted the FIFA World Cup in 1950 and 2014, the 2016 Summer Olympic Games, and Copa America as recently as 2021. The National Football League has held matchups in São Paulo and recently signed a multi-year agreement to bring at least three more games to Brazil over five years, starting with a game in Rio de Janeiro in 2026
- In May 2024, Virginia and NC State announced a home-and-home football non-conference series; however, the 2026 matchup will now be contested as a conference game, as announced by the ACC.
- In a designated non-conference game earlier this season, the Wolfpack intercepted a UVA pass in the end zone to seal a 35-31 victory in Raleigh.
- First contested in 1904, the Wolfpack lead the all-time series with UVA, 38-22-1.
- Virginia will still host six regular-season home games at Scott Stadium in 2026.
- The event, **College Football Brasil**, is powered by Athlete Advantage, in partnership with Brasil Sports Business, and with the full support of the Governor

POP-TARTS CRAZY GOOD TEAM OF THE WEEK

- Following its 46-38 double-overtime win over No. 8 Florida State (Sept. 26), Virginia was named the Pop-Tarts Crazy Good Team of the Week, as selected by the All-America Committee of the Football Writers Association of America.
- This is the third time for Virginia (4-1, 2-0 in the ACC) to receive the award from the FWAA and the first time in two seasons since it won at No. 10 North Carolina, 31-27, the weekend of Oct. 21, 2023.
- Since 2002, the FWAA has named a National Team of the Week. Coming into the 2025 season, 284 teams have been honored, including 101 different Division I programs. Each honored team will receive a custom Pop-Tarts "care package" along with a hand-crafted game ball made in America by Dallas-based Big Game USA, the nation's leading manufacturer of custom footballs.

HISTORIC WIN OVER NO. 8 FLORIDA STATE

- On the night of Friday, Sept. 26, unranked Virginia toppled No. 8 Florida State 46-38 in double overtime at Scott Stadium.
- UVA QB **Chandler Morris** led the effort on offense with five total touchdowns, including three rushing, and completed 26 of his 35 passing attempts for 229 yards. Defensively, nickelback **Ja'son Prevard** finished with a career-best two interceptions including one on the final play of double overtime.
- The win marked UVA's first over a top-10 opponent at Scott Stadium 2005, when it since defeated the fourth-ranked Seminoles 26-21. It was also UVA's first home win over a top-25 opponent since 2020, when the Hoos knocked off then-No. 15 North Carolina.

UVA's victory was its third over a ranked opponent under head coach **Tony Elliott** (No. 8 FSU-2025, No. 23 Pitt-2024, No. 10 UNC-2023). Elliott joined George Welsh (4) as the second head coach in program history with multiple top-10 wins.

- The win also marked the second of the season (as of Sept. 30) by an unranked FBS team over a top-10 team. The other was when then-unranked FSU upset then-No. 8 Alabama 31-17 in week 1.
- UVA's 46 points are its most ever against in Florida State, its highest-ever against a top-10 opponent, and the most by an unranked ACC team vs. a top-10 foe since 2009 (per Stats Perform).
- The nationally-televised contest on ESPN peaked at 6.9 million viewers, the most-watched ESPN game on record (excluding Black Friday holiday games).

CARTER, RICKERT BRING WEALTH OF EXPERIENCE TO CAVALIERS' DEFENSIVE LINE

- Entering the 2025 season, Virginia defensive linemen **Jahmeer Carter** (44) and **Daniel Rickert** (36) had combined for 80 career starts - the most of any defensive line duo in the nation.
- Both Carter and Rickert are now in their sixth season of college football.
- Carter is one of two players on this year's roster who has spent the last six seasons at UVA.
- Rickert transferred to Virginia this offseason after five season at Tennessee Tech.

WAYLEE'S BURST ON TO THE SCENE

- Tailback Harrison Waylee exploded for three touchdowns and 151 yards rushing in UVA's 55-16 rout of William & Mary (9/13).
- His performance was highlighted by the longest rush from scrimmage in UVA history, a 97-yard dash in the third quarter. It's the longest by any NCAA rusher this season, and he is one of two Power 4 running backs (Jeremiah Love, Notre Dame) with a rush of at least 97 yards dating back to 2019.
- It was his third multi-TD game of his career and first since he had three against Ball State in 2022 when he played for Northern Illinois.
- The W&M game marked the first time since 2004 in which UVA had a player scored three rushing touchdowns in consecutive games (J.Taylor at NC State & Waylee vs. William & Mary). Wali Lundy scored three rushing TDs in three straight games against Akron, North Carolina and Temple in 2004.
- Waylee went over the 100-yard mark for the first time as a Cavalier and the 14th time for his career.
- Waylee leads all active FBS players with 3,368 rushing yards over the course of 39 career appearances.

CAM ROSS' HISTORIC UVA DEBUT PERFORMANCE

- In his UVA debut against Costal Carolina (8/30), receiver **Cam Ross** accounted for 224 all-purpose yards and two total touchdowns.
- In the third quarter of UVA's dominant 48-7 season-opening victory, Ross returned a CCU kickoff 100 yards for a touchdown, which tied for the longest kickoff return in school history.
- He also had seven catches for 124 yards, highlighted by a 29-yard TD reception. His 124 receiving yards marked the fourth 100-yard receiving game of his career.
- Ross became the first FBS player since 2020 to record at least 120 yards receiving and return a kick for a touchdown in the same game.
- For his performance, he was named the ACC's Receiver and Specialist of the Week (Sept. 2), and became the first UVA player ever to earn both honors.

MORRIS' FOURTH CONSECUTIVE YEAR STARTING

- For the fourth consecutive year, **Chandler Morris** was the starting quarterback in his team's season opener.
- Morris was one of 14 FBS quarterbacks to start for his team for the fourth consecutive year.
- Morris was named the top signal caller on UVA's depth chart heading into fall camp. The previous two seasons (2023-24) featured QB battles. Virginia did not return a QB that completed a pass in 2024.
- Morris started all 13 games for North Texas in 2024. At TCU, he started the first six games of the 2023 season before injuring his left knee — the same knee that had sidelined him in the 2022 season opener and subsequently kept him out for the remainder of the year.
- Morris is one of only four FBS QBs to start for at least three different schools. The others are Bowling Green's Drew Pyne (Missouri, Arizona State & Notre Dame), Eastern Michigan's Noah Kim (Coastal Carolina & Michigan State) and Fresno State's E.J. Warner (Rice & Temple).

MORRIS' PRE-EXISTING TIES TO TONY ELLIOTT

- **Chandler Morris'** father, Chad Morris, coached alongside **Tony Elliott** at Clemson, where Morris served as offensive coordinator from 2011-14.
- As a child, Chandler often spent time around the Clemson football facility with the children of Dabo Swinney and Brent Venables.
- Chad was also the head coach at SMU (2015-17) and Arkansas (2018-19).
- On the timing of the decision, Elliott said: "to go in this offseason without a true quarterback controversy or battle or waiting until the end of camp ... I think was important for our football team especially with the number of transfers we brought in."

TRANSFER CONNECTIONS

- Defensive end **Mitchell Melton** (Ohio State) and wideout **Jayden Thomas** (Notre Dame) squared off against each other in the 2024 national championship game, with the Melton and the Buckeyes prevailing, 34-23.
- Army defensive back transfer **Donavon Platt's** most recent interception came against current UVA QB **Chandler Morris**. Platt intercepted a pass in the red zone in then-No. 18 Army's 14-3 victory over North Texas on Nov. 9, 2024.
- UVA's offensive line coach and offensive run game coordinator **Terry Heffernan** coached offensive lineman **Drake Metcalf** for two seasons (2021-22) at Stanford.

AN EMBARRASSMENT OF RICHES

- Virginia is the only FBS program with 19 combined sixth- and seventh-year players.
- Additionally, UVA and Colorado are the only two FBS schools with three players who are in their seventh season of college football.
- Virginia's group seventh-years includes **Antonio Clary** (S), **Cam Ross** (WR) and **Kenan Johnson** (DB).
- UVA's sixth-year players are: **Chandler Morris** (QB), **Harrison Waylee** (RB), **Owen Gardner** (RB), **Walker Wallace** (TE), **Drake Metcalf** (OL), **Monroe Mills** (OL), **Ethan Sipe** (OL), **Brady Wilson** (OL), **Tyshawn Wyatt** (OL), **Mitchell Melton** (DE), **Daniel Rickert** (DE), **Jahmeer Carter** (DT), **Da'Marcus Crosby II** (DB), **Devin Neal** (S) and **Daniel Sparks** (P).
- Clary has spent all seven seasons at UVA and battled numerous injuries throughout his career.
- Ross (James Madison) transferred to UVA in January, while Johnson transferred in May.
- Of its 16 sixth-year players, Carter is the only one who has played at UVA for the entirety of his college career.

LOOK HOOS DEEP IN THE TRENCHES

- With the addition of seven offensive linemen by way of the transfer portal this offseason, Virginia entered the 2025 season with the nation's most experienced offensive line, based on the combined number of career games played (334) and starts (213).
- Entering 2025, UVA was the only program whose offensive line combined for at least 300 career appearances and 200 career starts.
- **Noah Josey** (guard) and **McKale Boley** (tackle) are UVA's only returning starters on the offensive line from last year.
- Virginia's offensive line is led by assistant coach **Terry Heffernan**, who also serves as the program's offensive run game coordinator.
- On Aug. 6, head coach **Tony Elliott** told the media that **Makilan Thomas** (foot) is expected to miss "multiple months," while **Monroe Mills** (knee) is not expected to play this season.
- **Elliott** on this year's offensive line group: "Even though I'm a receiver at heart and coached skill guys my whole life, you win up front ... And that's why the biggest area that we addressed was the offensive line and adding depth to the offensive line. That's probably the one position that we've been playing catch up the most over the last three years, but with the addition of the seven guys that we brought in this offseason, I think we're in a space now where we can have competitive depth, which creates for competitive practice, which allows us to create that chemistry."

A LOOK BACK AT 2024 SLATE

- Three of the Cavaliers' final four opponents (No. 23 Pitt, No. 8 Notre Dame, No. 13 SMU) of the 2024 season were ranked in the AP top-25 poll at the time of each matchup.
- The SMU game marked only the sixth instance in program history (1949, 1996, 2002, 2005, 2019, 2021, 2024) in which the Cavaliers faced three consecutive opponents ranked in the AP top-25 poll.
- Entering the game against Pitt, UVA was tied for the fourth-most difficult remaining schedule, based on opponent win percentage, according to WarrenNolan.com.
- Both SMU and Clemson went on to secure their spot in the ACC Championship game and College Football Playoff.
- After knocking off Indiana, Georgia and Penn State in the CFP, Notre Dame advanced to the national championship game, where the Fighting Irish fell 34-24 to Ohio State.



2024 STORYLINES IN REVIEW

- Virginia (3-5 ACC) finished only one win away from .500 in league play in 2024. The Cavaliers mounted fourth-quarter comebacks at Wake Forest (31-30) and against Boston College (24-14). UVA earned its signature win in a 24-19 road win over then-No. 23 Pitt in primetime.
- Behind a dominant 384-rushing-yard performance, the Cavaliers downed Coastal Carolina 43-24 to secure UVA's largest margin of victory on the road under head coach **Tony Elliott**.
- After a standout senior campaign in 2024, former safety Jonas Sanker was selected 93rd overall by the New Orleans Saints in the third round of the 2025 NFL Draft.
- Sanker was a two-time First Team All-ACC selection and became UVA's only four-time ACC Defensive Back of the Week in the same season (2024).

IN GOOD HANDS

- Virginia is one of 13 schools with a female athletic trainer as its primary care provider for the football program. Associate Athletics Director for Sports Medicine, **Kelli Pugh**, has worked closely with the UVA football program since 2002.
- Of those 13 female athletic trainers, Pugh is one of six working at Power-4 institutions.

ACADEMIC REPORT CARD

- The UVA football program recorded its highest-ever semester team GPA with a 3.22 during the 2025 spring semester.
- At his introductory press conference head coach **Tony Elliott** stated, "I chose UVA because I wanted to lead a program that was partnered with a university that had world-class academics. I wanted to be able to recruit the best and the brightest student-athletes ... I wanted to be part of a university and athletic department that would not compromise its values to win."
- "My vision for the UVA football program is to become the model in college football, the model program in college football," Elliott said. "My goal is to contribute to changing the narrative in college football and demonstrate that you can win at the highest level and you can do so while achieving excellence in education, leadership and service."
- In 2002, Elliott earned his bachelor's degree in industrial engineering from Clemson, where he was a first-team All-ACC Academic selection and a CoSIDA Academic District III member. He was also a recipient of the ACC's Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship.

HARDIE FOOTBALL OPERATIONS CENTER

- In June 2024, Virginia Athletics proudly opened the 93,000-square-foot **Molly and Robert Hardie Football Operations Center**, which conveniently sits adjacent to the team's George Welsh Indoor Practice Facility and outdoor practice fields.
- The state-of-the-art space encompasses: the team locker, players' lounge and 96-person dining space, 14,000-square-foot strength and condition space with over 150,000 lbs of weight-lifting equipment, cardio mezzanine, 195-seat team meeting space, tiered-seating meeting spaces for each position group, and coaches' offices.
- The Hardie Center recently opened its full-service dining hall capable of providing meals for the entire team and staff.
- The exterior of the Hardie Center displays a classic yet chic design and is enclosed by red brick, which is synonymous with the architectural style of the University's most prominent edifices across Grounds such as The Rotunda.
- Of the Hardie Center, Fralin Family Football head coach **Tony Elliott** said, "I wanted the building to be timeless. I wanted to capture all different eras, to be contemporary enough to show the flash and the glitz and glamor as an area for certain recruits, but then also pay homage to all the guys that didn't have an opportunity to walk through those doors today but laid the foundation for Virginia football."

CARLA WILLIAMS ON CFP COMMITTEE

- On Feb. 8, 2024, Virginia Director of Athletics **Carla Williams** was named to the College Football Playoff (CFP) Management Committee.
- As a member of the committee, Williams began a three-year term beginning in the spring of 2024.
- “Carla is an outstanding advocate for college football and will be a knowledgeable, passionate and valuable member of the College Football Playoff Selection Committee,” said ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips. “Throughout her time at Virginia as well as her entire career, Carla has consistently shown to be a tremendous leader.”
- Williams is in her eighth year as director of athletics at Virginia. During her time in Charlottesville, UVA teams have captured multiple national titles across numerous sports, including the 2019 men’s basketball title, 2019 and 2021 men’s lacrosse titles, four straight women’s swimming and diving championships from 2021-24, and the 2022 and 2023 men’s tennis team titles. In addition, UVA has won 2022 ACC Championships.
- Williams was a three-year starter and All-SEC guard for the Georgia women’s basketball team from 1987-89. Williams then served as an assistant coach for the team before moving into administration as UGA’s assistant director of compliance for a year before taking administrative roles at Florida State and Vanderbilt.

BRYCE PERKINS EARNS UFL MVP HONORS

- Former UVA quarterback Bryce Perkins was named the 2025 MVP of the United Football League after passing for 1,342 yards and nine touchdowns in seven games. Perkins also rushed for 269 yards and five touchdowns.
- Perkins was previously a member of the Los Angeles Rams from 2020-22 and made his NFL debut in 2022, playing in five games with one start.
- He was a member of the Rams’ roster, which defeated the Cincinnati Bengals 23-20 to win Super Bowl LVI in 2022.

Tony Elliott, a patient man, was looking for the right fit when it came time for him to leave the assistant coaching ranks and take on the responsibility of running a collegiate football program as the head coach. During his 11-year tenure at Clemson, his alma mater, several opportunities presented themselves, but it was not until Virginia came calling that he felt the setting was right for what he wants to accomplish.

On Dec. 10, 2021, Elliott was named the University of Virginia's Fralin Family Head Football Coach. At his introductory press conference, he explained his decision to become the Cavaliers' head coach and what he wants to accomplish in Charlottesville.

"I chose UVA because I wanted to lead a program that was partnered with a university that had world-class academics," he said "I wanted to be able to recruit the best and the brightest student-athletes."

"I wanted to compete in the best conference in college athletics. I wanted to be a part of an alignment with (athletic director) Ms. Carla (Williams) and President (Jim) Ryan that shared a vision that was similar to mine, which is centered around the holistic development of the student-athlete. And lastly, I wanted to be part of a university and athletic department that would not compromise its values to win.

"There is no better place for me than UVA. And there is no better time than now."

With that, Elliott went to work crafting what he had hoped to build for years – The Model Program.

"My vision for the UVA football program is to become the model in college football, the model program in college football," he said. "My goal is to contribute to changing the narrative in college football and demonstrate that you can win at the highest level and you can do so while achieving excellence in education, leadership and service."

Elliott's cornerstones of that culture are based on **H.E.A.R.T. – humility, effort, accountability, respect and toughness.**

"I think that building a championship culture starts with making sure that you have alignment and a vision," he said. "You clearly state the vision and you are particular in the people that you bring in and make sure that they align with the vision, and then you stay grounded to the principles that you set in place for the players and the staff, and you go to work every single day, and you keep an inside-out mentality. It's one day at a time, and eventually that will bring your championship culture to life."

Elliott's background and coaching pedigree is rich with championship experiences.

He spent 11 seasons as an assistant on Dabo Swinney's staff at Clemson. In January of 2021, he was named the program's assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He previously served as the team's co-offensive coordinator (2014-20) and the team's running backs coach (2011-20).

At Clemson, Elliott was a part of a 10-season stretch in which the Tigers won 10 or more games. In that span, Clemson won six Atlantic Coast Conference Championships, made four appearances in the College Football Playoff National Championship game and captured national titles in 2016 and 2018.

After Elliott's promotion to co-offensive coordinator prior to the 2014 Russell Athletic Bowl, the Tigers posted an 89-10 record and ranked in the top 12 nationally in total offense. Clemson either led or ranked No. 2 in the ACC in total offense in five of his seven seasons as an offensive coordinator. Elliott's 2018 and 2019 offenses were responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history.

Elliott was named the Frank Broyles Award recipient as the nation's top assistant coach in 2017. Before transitioning to the tight ends room this year, Elliott was in charge of Clemson's running backs for his first 10 seasons. In that time, he guided Clemson running back Travis Etienne to one of the most illustrious careers in ACC and college football history, helping him set the NCAA record for most games scoring a touchdown (46) and secure ACC records for career rushing yards (4,952), total touchdowns (78), rushing touchdowns (70) and points (468).

As the program's offensive coordinator, Elliott worked with two first-round draft picks at quarterback, including the 2021 first overall pick Trevor Lawrence. From 2015-2020, a Clemson offensive player took home both the ACC's Player of the Year and Offensive Player of the Year awards four times.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Elliott spent three seasons at Furman (2008-10) and two at South Carolina State (2006-07) coaching wide receivers at both schools. Prior to his coaching career he worked for Michelin North America for two years.

In 2002, Elliott earned his undergraduate degree in industrial engineering from Clemson, where he was a first-team Academic All-ACC selection as well as a CoSIDA Academic District III member. He was also a recipient of an ACC Weaver-James-Corrigan Postgraduate Scholarship.

Under Tommy Bowden, he came to Clemson as a walk-on wide receiver in the fall of 1999 and finished his career with four letters and appeared in 44 games. Swinney was his position coach his senior year (2003) in which he was named a co-captain of a team that finished with a 9-4 record and a No. 22 final ranking by AP and USA Today.

SCOTT STADIUM, HOME OF THE CAVALIERS

- The Carl Smith Center, home of David A. Harrison III Field at Scott Stadium, with its unique architectural design, scenic setting on the University's Grounds and exceptional sight lines, is one of the nation's finest college football settings.
- Opened in 1931, Scott Stadium might be one of the oldest campus college football stadiums in the nation, but you could never tell from its appearance. Numerous upgrades and expansions make it a modern home for the Cavaliers and their fans.
- Scott Stadium was the gift of Frederic William Scott and Elisabeth Strother Scott, and was dedicated to the memory of his parents, Frederic Robert Scott and Frances Branch Scott.
- Virginia played its dedication game at Scott Stadium on Oct. 15, 1931 against the Virginia Military Institute before a then-capacity crowd of 22,000. Prior to that season, the Cavaliers staged their home games at the University's Lambeth Field.
- Virginia has played 490 games in the historic venue. UVA's all-time record at Scott Stadium stands at 284-194-12.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia made its second-ever appearance in the ACC Championship game and first since 2019.
- The Cavaliers have lost three games this season by a combined 18 points and fell to 4-3 in one-score games.
- UVA becomes the fifth FBS team ever to play in four overtime games in a season (2013 San Diego State, 2012 Louisiana-Monroe, 2008 Buffalo and 2004 Northwestern).
- Virginia is 3-1 in overtime games in 2025. The three wins are tied for the most of any team in a single season since overtime was instituted in 1996.
- The contest was the first ACC Championship game to go to overtime.
- Duke is UVA's first two-time opponent in the same season since 1906, when the Cavaliers defeated Richmond in both matchups.
- Virginia owns a 42-34 all-time record against Duke and the contest at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte was the first neutral-site game in the series since 1951 (Richmond).
- Duke is the first team to score at least 21 points against UVA since Oct. 4, a 30-27 overtime win at Louisville. The stretch of six-straight opponents with 21 points or less was the longest streak from a UVA defense since 1996.
- The game was UVA's fifth all-time at Bank of America Stadium. UVA is now 3-2 all-time at the Carolina Panthers' home venue.
- Virginia dipped to 9-1 in this season when forcing a turnover.
- Corey Costner's interception in the first quarter marked the Cavaliers' 13th of the year, the most in a season since 2018.
- The Cavaliers now have 20 takeaways (13 interceptions, 7 fumble recoveries) on the year, their most in a season since 2018 (21).
- Virginia trailed by as many as 10 points [20-10] with as little as 3:55 to play and scored 10 points in a span of 3:32 to ultimately force overtime.
- UVA outscored Duke 10-3 in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers have outscored their opponents 61-53 in fourth quarters this year and 85-72 when factoring in overtime.
- UVA surpassed 3,000 passing yards on the season for only the eighth time in program history. UVA now has 3,130 passing yards, its most since 2021.
- Virginia now has 2,392 yards rushing, which ranks ninth all-time in UVA single-season history. That's also the most since the 2004 Cavaliers set the program record with 2,914 rushing yards.
- UVA has scored 418 points this season, the third-most in program history. Only five UVA teams have scored 400 or more points in a season - 2019 (449), 1990 (442), 2025 (418), 2021 (415), 2002 (402).
- With 5,442 yards of total offense in 2025, the Cavaliers only trail the 2021 team for the most in a season (6,191) in program history.
- For the first time this season, UVA trailed at the end of the first quarter [7-0].
- The Cavaliers also trailed at the half for only the third time this season (also WSU & WFU).
- Virginia held Duke to 6-for-16 (37.5 percent) on third downs and came into the contest with the second-best third-down defense in the country (27%).
- Virginia capped a 10-play, 96-yard drive late in the fourth quarter with a touchdown reception by Eli Wood from Chandler Morris. The 96-yard drive was the third-longest in ACC Championship Game history.
- For the 12th game this season, the Cavaliers did not lose a fumble.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- With 65 yards rushing, tailback J'Mari Taylor became the 16th Cavalier in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. He is UVA's first 1,000-yard rusher since Jordan Ellis (1,026) in 2018. Taylor now has 1,062 yards rushing.
- It also marks the second consecutive season in which Taylor has rushed for at least 1,000 yards, having done so at North Carolina Central last year, when he had 1,146 yards in only 11 games.
- Taylor is only 50 yards shy of 3,000 for his career.
- Taylor is the first ACC player with at least 1,000 rushing yards, 10 rushing TDs and 40 receptions in the same season since Giovanni Benard (North Carolina) in 2011. Taylor is one of five ACC players to accomplish the feat in the last 25 years.
- With a touchdown reception in the second quarter, Taylor became the first Cavalier with a passing, rushing and receiving touchdown in the same season since Olanmiloke Zaccheaus in 2015.
- Receiver Cam Ross surpassed 500 yards receiving with 59 yards on five receptions. Ross is also one reception shy of the 200th of his career.
- Defensive tackle Jacob Holmes finished with 1.5 tackles for loss. He now has 20.5 TFLs for his career.
- Linebacker James Jackson tied for a team-high seven tackles, including a game-high five solo. He now has 250 total tackles for his career and 103 solo efforts.
- First-year Corey Costner recorded his second interception of the season, picking off Darian Mensah in the final minute of the first quarter. The turnover led to UVA's first touchdown of the game, an 11-yard reception by Taylor from Morris. Costner finished with season-high five tackles.
- Chandler Morris attempted 40 passes for the second time this season. The other game against NC State also resulted in a one-possession loss.
- Defensive end Daniel Rickert's strip sack in the fourth quarter upped his season total to a team-best 6.5. His 6.5 sacks are the most by a Cavalier since Chico Bennett Jr. had seven in 2022.
- Eli Wood had a career-high three receptions, including an 18-yard touchdown catch with 22 seconds remaining in regulation to tie the game, 20-20. He has three touchdowns this season, two receiving and one rushing.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia won its ninth game of the season, the ninth time in program history and first time since 2019 that the Cavaliers have won nine games in a season.
- Virginia clinched its second-ever berth in the ACC Championship game (est. 2005) and will play Duke on Dec. 6 in Charlotte. The only other time UVA played in the conference title game was in 2019.
- UVA matched the program's single season record of 10 wins. The 1989 team is the only other team in program history to achieve a 10-win season.
- For the first time in program history, UVA (7-1) finished the regular season in sole possession of first place in the ACC standings.
- only Elliott, who's in his fourth season at UVA, became the fastest UVA head football coach to clinch at least a share of first place in the final ACC standings.
- The Cavaliers were co-ACC champions in 1989 and 1995.
- UVA's 7-1 record in ACC play also tied with the 1995 Cavaliers' best record in ACC play in school history.
- Virginia's six home victories this season mark just the third time in the past 34 years that UVA has recorded at least six wins at Scott Stadium. Entering Saturday's game, UVA has achieved six or more home wins in a season 13 times: 2025, 2019, 2002, 1991, 1989, 1951, 1925, 1914, 1913, 1912, 1911, 1910, and 1902.
- Elliott is now 6-0 as UVA head coach in games following a bye week.
- Virginia forced two turnovers and improved to 9-0 this season when forcing a turnover.
- Saturday marked the first time UVA has held Virginia Tech to single-digit points since the 1991 meeting, a 38-0 victory in Charlottesville.
- Virginia has held its last five opponents, all ACC contests, to an average of 15.4 points per game.
- UVA achieved its largest overall win improvement from year to year since 1986 (3-8) to 1987 (8-4). The only other time in program history that UVA improved by five games from one season to the next was in 1892 (3-2-1) to 1893 (8-3). The Cavaliers finished 5-7 overall in 2024.
- Virginia recorded the program's 698th all-time win. UVA's first season of football was 1888.
- The Cavaliers earned their second victory of the series with Virginia Tech for only the second time in the last 21 meetings, dating back to 2004.
- The Cavaliers held the Hokies scoreless in the first half. It marked the third team they held scoreless in a half this season.
- Prior to Virginia Tech's fourth-quarter touchdown, UVA's defense had allowed only one offensive touchdown in the previous 11 quarters (4th quarter at Duke).
- UVA now has 12 interceptions on the season, its most in a season since 2019. With Maddox Marcellus' first quarter interception, eight different Cavaliers have picked off a pass this season.
- The Cavaliers held the Hokies to four completed passes. The last time they held a team with five or less was in 2018 against Georgia Tech, when the Yellow Jackets had only one completion.
- Virginia held the Hokies to six first downs, the fewest by a UVA opponent since Akron's six on Sept. 18, 2004.
- Virginia Tech was 2-for-14 (14.3%) on third-down conversions, the lowest by a UVA opponent since Notre Dame was 1-for-12 on Nov. 16, 2024. The Cavaliers came into the contest ranked third in the country in third down defense.
- Virginia secured its sixth victory of the season while ranked in the AP poll. It marked the first time since 2004 that UVA recorded six or more wins in a year in which it appeared in every AP Top 25.
- UVA earned its second straight victory over the Hokies on Nov. 29. The previous time the Cavaliers defeated Virginia Tech on that date was Nov. 29, 2019, at Scott Stadium.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Making his first start of the season and first since playing for Eastern Kentucky last season, linebacker Maddox Marcellus led the Cavaliers with nine tackles (3 solo) and recorded his first interception as a Cavalier and third of his career. He was also credited with a half sack and one tackle for loss.
- Tailback J'Mari Taylor played in his 50th college game and finished with 80 yards on 20 carries and scored his 14th touchdown of the season. He is three yards shy of 1,000 for the season and leads the ACC with 997.
- Taylor is the seventh UVA player to rush for 14 touchdowns in season and the first since Keith Payne in 2010. The UVA single-season record is 17 posted by Wali Lundy (2004) and Bill Dudley (1941).
- Taylor also was credited with his first career touchdown pass with a 1-yard pass to Sage Ennis in the second quarter. He is the first non-QB to throw a TD pass for UVA since Olamide Zaccheaus vs. Duke in 2015.
- Taylor is the first ACC running back with a passing touchdown and a rushing touchdown in the same game since Clemson's Will Shipley against Wake Forest in 2021. Tony Elliott was Clemson's offensive coordinator. He's only the second UVA running back since 1995 to accomplish the feat, joining Wali Lundy against Western Michigan 2003.
- Quarterback Chandler Morris rushed for his career-best, fifth touchdown of the season. He now has 15 in his collegiate career.
- Wide receiver Kam Courtney established a career high with six receptions and had 50 yards receiving.
- Kicker Will Bettridge took over sole possession of third place on UVA's all-time scoring list with nine points (2-2 FG / 3-3 XP). He now has 302 career points and is 10 points behind Wali Lundy (312).

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia won its ninth game of the season, the ninth time in program history and first time since 2019 that the Cavaliers have won nine games in a season.
- The 9-2 start to the season is the best 11-game start since 2007.
- Virginia has won four-straight road games to match a school record set in 1984 and 1990. The Cavaliers finished the regular season 4-1 on the road.
- UVA improved to 6-1 in the ACC, the first time UVA has won six of its first seven ACC games since 2007 and only the fourth time ever (1989, 1995, 2007, 2025).
- The Cavaliers are assured of at least a 6-2 record in ACC regular-season games for the first time since 2019. That year, UVA went on to face Clemson and Tony Elliott, both at the time served as the Tigers' offense coordinator, in the ACC championship game.
- Virginia tallied its fifth win of the season while ranked in the AP poll (No. 20). The last time UVA had five or more wins while ranked in the AP top-25 was in 2004, when it was ranked in every game that year.
- Virginia improved to 42-34 in the all-time series with Duke, which was first contested in 1890. UVA's 42 wins over the Blue Devils are third-most against any other opponent in program history. The Cavaliers have won nine of the last 10 meetings against Duke.
- UVA has totaled at least 30 points in eight games this year, a feat not achieved since the 2021 season.
- The Cavaliers started the game with their longest opening drive of the season, which spanned 6:47 and ended with a five-yard touchdown by J'Mari Taylor.
- Duke's first touchdown in the fourth quarter marked the first surrendered by UVA in a play from scrimmage in its last seven quarters of action (123 minutes and 34 seconds). The last touchdown from scrimmage by a UVA opponent was Cal (Nov. 1), which score early in the fourth quarter.
- UVA has scored first in 10 of its 11 games and is 9-1 when scoring first this season.
- UVA held the Blue Devils to season lows in several categories, including total offense (255) rushing yards (42), passing yards (213), pass completions (18), points scored (17) and first downs (11).
- Duke entered Saturday's game as the No. 4 passing offense (312.9) in the country, while also averaging 35.2 points per game, good for fourth in the ACC and No. 22 in FBS.
- The Virginia defense held the Blue Devils to 16 yards of total offense in the first quarter. This is the lowest Duke has had in a quarter this season.
- Virginia held Duke to three first-downs in the opening half. Duke is the third UVA opponent to be held to less than five first-downs this season.
- Virginia held the Blue Devils to 50 yards of total offense in the first half. Duke is the fifth opponent that UVA has held to under 100 yards in a half this season.
- For the sixth time this season, UVA held its opponent to without a touchdown in the first half.
- UVA doubled its opponent's total yardage (540 to 255) for the second time this season (W&M; 700 to 263).

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Trell Harris (8 rec, 161 yards, 1 TD) is the first Cavalier wide receiver with at least 150 yards receiving since Malik Washington against Louisville in 2023. Harris' eight receptions and 161 yards are career bests.
- Harris' third reception of the game, a 29-yard catch in the second quarter, marked the 100th of his career.
- J'Mari Taylor (18 rushes, 133 yards 2 TD) has scored at least one rushing TD in 19 of last 22 games dating back to his time at NC Central. Taylor now has 13 touchdowns this season, the most by a Cavalier in a season since Keith Payne had 14 in 2010. Taylor also now has 36 career rushing touchdowns.
- Taylor broke a 78-yard TD rush in the third quarter, which is tied for the 11th-longest rush in school history (Alvin Pearman vs. Virginia Tech in 2004).
- For the fourth time this season, Taylor rushed for multiple touchdowns. The last UVA player to record four multi-rushing TD games was Brennan Armstrong in 2021.
- With Taylor and Harris' performances, UVA had a 100-yard pass catcher and 100-yard rusher in the same game for the first time since 2023 against William & Mary. Pernis Jones (134 yards rushing) and Malik Washington (112 yards receiving) were the last duo to accomplish that feat.
- Taylor and Harris combined for a total of 319 all-purpose yards, the most by a Cavalier duo since Keytaon Thompson (151) and RaShaun Henry's (179) 330 all-purpose yards at Louisville (Oct. 9, 2021).
- Chandler Morris (23-35, 316 yards, 2 TD) went over the 300-yard mark for the second time this season (the other was against Stanford, when he had 380) and the 11th time of his career.
- Morris' touchdown pass in the second quarter to Sage Ennis was the 60th touchdown pass of his career. Morris now has 61 career passing TDs.
- Fisher Camac (6 tackles, 3 solo, 2 sacks, 2.5 TFL, 1 QBH) is the third Cavalier to record a multi-sack game this season, joining Mitchell Melton (2 vs. Louisville) and Daniel Rickett (2 vs. Stanford). Camac upped his season total to 4.5 and now has 13 career sacks.
- On fourth down in the third quarter, defensive end Mitchell Melton recorded a strip sack and recovered his own forced fumble. It was Melton's third forced fumble this season, which leads the team. Melton is one three Cavaliers in the last 10 years with at least three forced fumbles in a season. Jonas Sanker had three in 2023, and Micah Kiser had five in 2016.
- Defensive tackle Jacob Holmes matched his career high of six tackles. Holmes also had one sack and 1.5 tackles for loss.
- Cornerback Emmanuel Karnley finished with a career-high three pass break-ups. Karnley also started in Saturday's game at Durham, his seventh of the season and fifth consecutive start.
- With two catches, receiver Jahmal Edrine reached 100 receptions for his career.
- Linebacker and team captain James Jackson appeared in his 50th career game.
- With 10 points, Will Bettridge (2-2 FG, 4-4 PAT) is now tied for third on UVA's career scoring list with Gene Mayer (1912-15). Bettridge has 293 career points.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia's seven-game win streak came to a close. The win streak tied for the program record. UVA also recorded seven-game streaks in 1914, 1945, 1949, 1990 and 2007.
- UVA's five-game win streak in ACC play – a program record – also ended.
- With an overall record of 8-2, UVA is still off to its best start since 2007.
- The Cavaliers are now one of five ACC teams with only one loss in conference play (Duke, Georgia Tech, Pitt, SMU and Virginia).
- The result was UVA's first home loss of the season and first since the SMU game in 2024.
- The night game was UVA's fifth at Scott Stadium this season. UVA is now 4-1 in home night games this season.
- UVA dipped to 35-18 in the all-time series with Wake Forest, which began in 1889. The Demon Deacons have won three straight games at Scott Stadium (2012, 2021, 2025).
- Five of the Cavaliers' last six games have been decided by one score. UVA is now 4-1 in such contests. The Cavaliers had also won their previous four games decided by one score.
- For the first time this season, UVA lost a fumble after losing three fumbles to the Demon Deacons. Miami and UVA were the only two FBS teams to have not lost a fumble entering Saturday's contest. UVA had 10 fumbles entering the game, none of them were recovered by a UVA opponent.
- Despite the loss, Virginia outgained Wake Forest 327-203. Virginia has outgained its opponent in both losses this season (NC State & Wake Forest)
- The 203 yards of total offense by Wake Forest are the fewest allowed by UVA since 2022 against Georgia Tech (56 rush, 146 pass).
- UVA's stop on fourth down at the five-yard line in the second quarter was the second goal-to-go stop of the season. The other came against Florida State on the first of two interceptions by Ja'son Prevard.
- Virginia held the Demon Deacons to only 64 yards passing, the fewest by a UVA opponent since Nov. 17, 2018, against Georgia Tech, when the Yellow Jackets had 37 yards through the air.
- Wake Forest completed only nine passes, the fewest by a UVA opponent since 2021 (Virginia Tech). The Cavaliers' defense surrendered no passing yards in the third quarter.
- Virginia recorded its second blocked punt of the season. It marks the first time UVA has blocked two punts in a season since 2013. Coming into the week, only 17 teams in the country had multiple blocked punts.
- UVA surrendered a punt return for a touchdown for the first time since 2017, when Pitt's Quadre Henderson returned a 75-yarder at Heinz Field.
- The last time Virginia gave up only 16 points or less in a loss was in a 14-12 overtime decision against Miami on Oct. 9, 2022.
- The announced crowd of Saturday's game was 55,568, which marks the first time since 2007 in which UVA has drawn a crowd of at least 50,000 in three consecutive games.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Kam Robinson blocked a punt on Wake Forest's opening drive. It marked the first blocked punt by a UVA player since Caleb Hardy's in UVA's 2025 season opener against Coastal Carolina (8/30).
- In Robinson's last five games, he has two interceptions returned for touchdowns, a tackle for loss that resulted in a game-winning safety and a blocked punt.
- Robinson had a game-high 10 tackles in the contest, the fourth double-digit tackle effort of the season.
- J'Mari Taylor was two yards shy of 100 yards rushing and hauled in a career-high six passes for 30 yards. It marked the fifth time this season with 85 or more rushing yards and his fifth game with 100 or more all-purpose yards.
- Daniel Kaelin's 54-yard rush in the second quarter was the 12th run of 50 or more yards by a Cavalier quarterback in program history. It was the longest since Brennan Armstrong's 64-yard touchdown rush against Richmond in the 2022 season opener.
- In the third quarter, sophomore wideout Kam Courtney had a career-long 34-yard reception.
- Receiver Cam Ross played in his 50th collegiate game on Saturday.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia is 8-1 to start the season for only the second time in program history and first time since 1990. UVA's eight wins are its most since the 2019 season (9-5).
- The Cavaliers have won seven straight games, a first under head coach Tony Elliott and UVA's first seven-game win streak since 2007, when it also won seven in a row.
- For the first time in program history, UVA is 5-0 in ACC play.
- The five-game, in-season win streak in ACC play is a program first. The Cavaliers' five wins in conference play assures them of a winning record in ACC action for the first time since 2019, when the Cavaliers finished 6-2. UVA went on to face Clemson and Elliott, who served as the Tigers' offense coordinator, in the ACC Championship game.
- Saturday was the first-ever meeting between Virginia and Cal. The Cavaliers are now 3-0 against each of its first-time opponents on their 2025 schedule (Stanford, Washington State & Cal) and have won nine of the last 10 against first-time foes dating back to 2018.
- The victory was the program's first-ever in the Pacific Time Zone. UVA entered the contest winless in its previous four attempts.
- The win is the first while ranked as high as No. 15 in the AP top-25 and since Nov. 6, 2004, when the 12th-ranked Cavaliers shut out Maryland, 12-0.
- Virginia has won three consecutive ACC road games for the first time since 2011. It has now also won three road games overall in back-to-back seasons, a first since 1998-99.
- UVA scored on its opening drive touchdown, a first since the Stanford game on Sept. 20. Virginia improved to 3-1 when scoring on its opening drive.
- Virginia forced two turnovers (two INTs) in the contest. The Cavaliers have forced a turnover in six-straight games and are 6-0 in those contests. Corey Costner's interception in the third quarter was the first turnover by Cal in 10 quarters and first since playing Duke on Oct. 4.
- The Cavaliers did not turn the ball over for the fifth time this season and have yet to lose a fumble through nine games. UVA entered the contest as one of three FBS yet to lose a fumble this season.
- UVA finished with 10 third-down conversions on offense. The Cavaliers have now recorded seven games with at least seven third-down conversions, the most of any FBS team this season.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Running back J'Mari Taylor rushed 21 times for 105 yards and two touchdowns. It marked his second, 100-yard rushing performance of the season and sixth of his career. Three Cavaliers (Taylor, Waylee and Vaughn) have rushed for over 100 yards in a game this season.
- Taylor has 11 rushing touchdowns this season and 34 for his career. It marks the third multi-score game of the season for Taylor and eighth of his career (3 at UVA, 5 at NCCU).
- The 11 rushing touchdowns are the most in a single season by a UVA running back since the 11 scored by Wayne Taulapapa in 2019.
- Kam Robinson returned an interception 35 yards for a touchdown with 34 seconds remaining in the game to seal the victory. It was his second pick-six of the season and third of his career. Robinson is the second player in program history with two interception returns for a touchdown in a single season, joining Randy Neal who did so twice in 1992 and 1994.
- True freshman Corey Costner was credited with his first career interception, wrestling for a 50-50 ball out of the hands of Cal wideout Jacob De Jesus at the 13-yard line on the final play of the third quarter.
- Devin Neal finished with five tackles (1 solo) to go over the 200-tackle mark for his career. He has 201 career tackles, 30 of which have come at UVA.
- With seven points, placekicker Will Bettridge (56-69 FG, 106-108 PAT) moved into sole possession of No. 4 on UVA's all-time points list with 274 career points. He passed former UVA placekicker Rafael Garcia (1993-96).
- Eli Wood had a career-high 46 yards receiving on two catches. He was credited with a rushing touchdown on a swing pass in the backfield, his first career rushing touchdown and second score of his career.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia improved to 7-1 overall and 4-0 in ACC play, its best start in either category since the 2007 season.
- UVA won its sixth consecutive game, a first under head coach Tony Elliott, and the program's first six-game win streak since 2007 (when it won seven in a row).
- The Cavaliers played their third overtime game of the season and have won all three. Only eight other teams in college football history have won three overtime games in the same season. Overtime in college football was first instituted in 1996. In 2022, Texas Tech was the last team with three OT wins in the same season.
- Not since 1935 has UVA had more than three tied scores at the end of regulation.
- For the third consecutive year, UVA's ACC win total (4) has improved under Elliott.
- It was also the Cavaliers' fourth consecutive win in ACC play – also its first such streak since 2007. UVA is assured at least a .500 record in ACC play for the first time since 2021.
- With SMU's loss 13-12 loss at Wake Forest, UVA and Georgia Tech (5-0) are the only two remaining unbeaten teams in ACC play.
- Today marked the 130th meeting between North Carolina and Virginia, the "South's Oldest Rivalry." The Cavaliers improved to 60-66-4 all-time in the series that was first contested in 1892.
- The 130 meetings between the two teams are tied for second-most by two FBS rivals all-time. Georgia and Auburn, which already played in 2025, have also gone head-to-head 130 times, while Wisconsin and Minnesota have met 134 times heading into this year's matchup.
- UVA's 60th win of the series is also its most against any other opponent in program history.
- Virginia has won four of the last five games played at Kenan Stadium, including the previous meeting against then-No. 10 Tar Heels in 2023, the first-ever road win over a top-10 opponent in Cavalier football history.
- Saturday's contest marked UVA's first win while ranked as high as No. 16 in the AP top 25 since Nov. 20, 2004, when the 16th-ranked Cavaliers defeated Georgia Tech, 30-10. It's also the first time a ranked UVA team defeated North Carolina since 2005.
- The Cavaliers recorded their second consecutive ACC road win, a first since 2021. UVA defeated Louisville (Oct. 4), 30-27, in overtime at L&N Stadium.
- UVA posted its fourth first-quarter shutout of the season (CCU, W&M, FSU, UNC). The Tar Heels punted twice and lost a fumble at the goal line that bounced out of bounds for a touchback.
- UVA has not allowed a TD in its last three fourth quarters and is outscoring its opponents 38-19 in fourth quarters this season and 62-31 when factoring overtime periods.
- UVA has come up with a turnover in its last five games, all of which UVA has emerged victorious.
- The Cavaliers have only surrendered one touchdown in the last 96:36 of regulation, dating back to last week's 22-20 win over Washington State (Oct. 18).
- The Cavaliers stopped the Tar Heels at the goal line on their two-point conversion attempt to seal the OT victory. UVA's opponents are yet to convert a two-point conversion this season (0-3).
- Virginia forced into six Tar Heel three-and-outs, the most by a UVA FBS opponent 2021 (Miami-6).
- The Cavaliers and UNC combined for 15 punts, the most in a UVA game since the 2022 Georgia Tech game (16).
- For the first time since 2019 (vs. Liberty & Virginia Tech), UVA's defense has recorded two interceptions in back-to-back games. The Cavaliers also had two in last week's win over Wazzu. The Cavaliers have eight interceptions on the season.
- For the first time this year, UVA was held scoreless in the third quarter.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Mitchell Melton recorded his first career interception to halt a UNC red-zone attempt late in the third quarter. He also recorded a pass breakup on the play, after his deflection bounced off a Tar Heel helmet and fell into his hands. He finished the game with two PBUs and two QB hurries.
- Filling in for Cam Ross on punt returns, Jayden Thomas fielded the first four punts of his career. On his second career punt return, Thomas scampered for a 31-yard return, the second-longest by a Cavalier this season.
- Junior Kam Robinson was credited with a career-high 13 tackles, including five solo efforts and a half sack. His solo tackle in overtime was the 100th unassisted tackle of his career. Robinson was the game's only player with double-digit tackles.
- Chandler Morris finished with 200 yards passing, eclipsing the 8,000-yard mark for his career. His lone touchdown pass of the game was the 59th of his career.
- Trell Harris' 30-yard TD reception in the second quarter marked the eighth of his career and fourth of the season. His 30-yard reception is the second-longest receiving TD of the year for the Cavaliers. He also had a 75-yard TD reception against Stanford. His four receiving TDs leads the team.
- Antonio Clary finished with a season-high four tackles and intercepted the final pass of regulation to help force overtime. It was the third interception of his career.
- Daniel Sparks punted eight times for a season-high 391 punting yards. He downed two inside the 20 and had three punts over 50 yards, including a 56-yarder early in the fourth quarter.
- J'Mari Taylor punched in what proved to be the game-winning touchdown on a one-yard rush in overtime. It was his fifth game this season with a rushing touchdown and his ninth overall. His nine rushing TDs are the most by a UVA player in a season since Brennan Armstrong (9) in 2021, and most by a Cavalier running back since Wayne Taulapapa (11) in 2019.
- Taylor's touchdown is his second in overtime this season. He also scored the game-winning TD in UVA's 30-27 overtime win at Louisville (Oct. 4).
- Defensive tackle Jason Hammond tied his career high of five tackles and tied for a game-high two QB hurries.

Virginia Team Notes

- Saturday was the first-ever meeting between UVA and Washington State. With the win, UVA improved to 17-11 and 12-7 at Scott Stadium in first-time matchups dating back to 2000. UVA also faced Stanford for the first time earlier this season, a 48-20 win for the Hoos.
- Saturday was Virginia's first-ever win against a Pac-12 school. The Cavaliers came into the game 0-7 against Pac-12 foes. The last Pac-12 opponent at Scott Stadium was UCLA in 2014.
- The victory made Virginia bowl-eligible for the first time since the 2021 season. The Cavaliers are bowl-eligible after the first seven games of the season for the first time since 2007.
- The Cavaliers went ahead for the first time in the contest with a safety with 2:41 remaining in the game. It was the first UVA safety since 2021 at Miami. It was the first safety to win an FBS game since Iowa recorded back-to-back safeties to South Dakota State, 7-3 on Sept. 4, 2022.
- UVA is 52-46-2 all-time in Homecomings games. Tonight was the 100th Homecomings game in program history. UVA has held a Homecomings game every year since 1923 except for 1942, 1944 and 2020.
- Virginia is 6-1 to start the season, its best start since going 6-1 to begin the 2007 season.
- The Cavaliers have won five straight games, the program's longest win streak since 2007.
- Virginia captured its fifth-straight win at home. UVA had only won five straight home games once in the previous 17 seasons (2019), dating back to 2008.
- UVA improved to 5-0 at home this season, its most wins at home since 2020 and the best start at home since 2019 (7-0).
- Tony Elliott improved to 5-0 coming off a bye week.
- It marked the fourth night game of the season at Scott Stadium, tied for the most in Scott Stadium history). Virginia is now 4-0 in night games this season.
- The Cavaliers improved to 3-1 in non-conference games this season. The last time UVA won three non-conference matchups in a season was in 2019.
- Virginia erased a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit and outscored Washington State 12-0 in the fourth quarter. UVA outgained WSU, 126-8 in the fourth quarter and had the ball for 10:36 in the final stanza.
- It was Virginia's first fourth-quarter comeback of 10 or more points since coming back to knock off Wake Forest on the road last season.
- UVA has outscored its opponents 38-19 in fourth quarters this season and 55-25 when including overtime periods.
- Saturday's attendance was 56,048, the largest crowd of the season and the largest since the home opener against James Madison in 2023 (56,508).
- UVA pulled within three points with a nine play, 97-yard drive over the course of 3:41 in the fourth quarter. The drive matched UVA's longest by distance this season and marked the second scoring drive of at least 90 yards this year. Both 90+ yard scoring drives resulted in rushing TDs by Harrison Waylee, who also had a school-record, 97-yard rushing TD against William & Mary (Sept. 13) earlier this season.
- For the fourth game so far this season, the Cavaliers did not allow a sack. The last time UVA did not allow a sack in four games in a season was in 2014, when it tallied five games without giving up a sack.
- Virginia has yet to lose a fumble in 2025 and came into the contest as one of eight FBS teams without a fumble lost.
- For the first time this season, UVA's opponent scored first. Also, for the first time this year, UVA trailed at the half.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Devin Neal led the team with 10 tackles, including a game-high, six solo efforts. It marked his second double-digit effort of the season.
- Wide receiver Jahmal Edrine had a season-high 102 receiving yards on five catches, seven yards shy of his career-high (109 vs. MSU in 2022 while at FAU). It marked his third career 100-yard game and first as a Cavalier. Three Cavalier receivers have recorded a 100-yard game this season (Cam Ross & Trell Harris).
- Donavan Platt nabbed his first interception as a Cavalier on Wazzou's third drive of the game. Platt's last was on Chandler Morris in the Army-North Texas game in 2024.
- Ja'Son Prevcard came up with his third interception of the season in seven games. The last time a Cavalier had three interceptions in a season was Joey Blount (3) and Anthony Johnson (3) in 2021.
- Wide receiver Cam Ross opened the UVA scoring with his first career rushing touchdown on a 19-yard end around.
- Daniel Sparks punted six times for 318 yards for an average of 53 yards per punt. He downed three balls inside the 20-yard line and his 65-yard punt in the second quarter was season long and the fourth-longest of his career. It was also his 16th career punt of 60 yards or more.
- Noah Josey (LG) made his 35th consecutive start, dating back to 2022, while Chandler Morris (QB) tallied his 20th consecutive start.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia knocked off a top-10 opponent at Scott Stadium for the first time since defeating then-No. 4 Florida State 26-21 in 2005.
- For the first time in school history, No. 24 Virginia recorded back-to-back wins in overtime. The only other time UVA played consecutive games in OT was in 2018 (lost both to Georgia Tech & Virginia Tech).
- With the win, Virginia improved to 6-8 in the all-time series and snapped a three-game losing skid against the Cardinals. The win also marked the Cavaliers' at UoU since their 34-33 win at L&N Stadium in 2021. Virginia is 2-5 in road games against the Cardinals.
- UVA tallied its fourth straight win, its first four-game win streak under head coach Tony Elliott and since 2021.The Cavaliers also earned their third consecutive ACC win, also a first since 2021.
- The last time UVA started 3-0 in conference play was in 2007.
- Virginia is 5-1 through its first six games for the first time since 2017.
- UVA's three ACC wins match that of last year and tie a season high under Elliott. Elliott's ACC win totals have improved in each year of Elliott's tenure.
- The Cavaliers have won back-to-back ACC road openers for the first time since 2016 and 2017.
- Saturday was UVA's first road win as a ranked team since defeating Miami 48-0 on Nov. 10, 2007, the last game ever played at the Orange Bowl.
- UVA has scored at least 30 points in all six games played so far this year.
- For the first time this season, Virginia was outscored in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers still lead their opponents this season in fourth-quarter scoring, 26-19.
- UVA improved to 4-0 this season when forcing a turnover.The Cavaliers returned both a fumble and an interception for touchdowns in today's win.
- UVA recorded two defensive touchdowns in a game for the first time since 2003 against Western Michigan (two interception returns).
- UVA recorded a its first win while ranked in the AP top 25 for the first time since Sept. 21, 2019, when it defeated Old Dominion at Scott Stadium, 28-17.
- The Cavaliers have yet to lose a fumble this season.The last time UVA had not lost a fumble in six consecutive games were in its final six of 2019.
- With Donovan Platt's 61-yard fumble return on fourth down, UVA has scored at least one touchdown in the first quarter in each of its first six games this season.
- For the second consecutive game, Virginia was tied with its opponent at the half and won.
- Former Cavalier running back Perris Jones served as an honorary captain in the contest. He suffered a neck injury playing at Louisville in 2023 that ended his football career and is now pursuing his doctorate at the University of Louisville.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Donovan Platt's 61-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown was his first score and first fumble recovery of his career. It's UVA's longest fumble recovery for a touchdown since Art Thomas' 92-yard return against Penn State in 2001. UVA has won its last five games when recovering a fumble for a touchdown.
- Reigning ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week, Mitchell Melton, had a career-high, two sacks to go along with five total tackles (3 solo) and a pass breakup.
- J'Mari Taylor scored the game-winning touchdown in the first overtime and now has at least one rushing TD in 16 of his last 17 games, dating back to his time at North Carolina Central. He upped his season total to eight in six games this year. Taylor is the first Cavalier running back with eight touchdowns in a season since Wayne Taulapapa in 2019 (11).
- Kam Robinson made a team-high 10 tackles (6 solo), one tackle for loss and one QB hurry. He recorded his second interception return for a touchdown of his career and the first by a Cavalier since his pick-six against Louisville in 2023.
- Will Bettridge made all four of his kicks, including a season-long 46-yard field goal in the third quarter. Bettridge stands at No. 5 on UVA's all-time scoring list with 254 career points (98-100 PAT, 52-64 FG).
- UVA punter Elijah Silbeck had a 71-yard punt, the longest by a UVA punter since Nash Griffin booted a 78-yarder in 2019, also at Louisville. Silbeck is one of only 11 punters in UVA history to record punt of at least 71 yards.
- John Rogers had a career-long 26-yard reception in the second quarter. His previous long was 25 yards against William & Mary (Sept. 13). He had two receptions for a career-high 40 yards.
- Cam Ross' 19-yard TD reception in the second quarter was the 10th of his career.
- Lexington, Kentucky natives Devin Neal and Xavier Brown played only 75 miles from their hometown.
- Nose tackle Jahmeer Carter made his 50th career start. Carter has also started in UVA's last 41 games.
- Receiver Jahmal Edrine tallied his 25th career start.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia knocked off a top-10 opponent at Scott Stadium for the first time since defeating then-No. 4 Florida State 26-21 in 2005.
- The win was the third over a ranked opponent under head coach Tony Elliott (No. 8 FSU-2025, No. 23 Pitt-2024, No. 10 UNC-2023).
- The FSU and UNC wins were also over top-10 foes, making Elliott one of two head coaches in program history with multiple top-10 wins (George Welsh – 4).
- The win also marked the second by an unranked FBS team over a top-10 team this season. The other was then-unranked FSU over then-No. 8 Alabama in week 1.
- UVA's last overtime game was against Miami in 2022. UVA snapped a three-game skid in overtime games, earning its first OT win since defeating Syracuse in triple overtime in 2015. UVA is 5-8 all-time in overtime games.
- Friday was Virginia's first win at home over a ranked opponent since defeating then-No. 15 North Carolina in 2020.
- The 46 points were the most by Virginia against Florida State in 20 all-time meetings. The previous high was 33 in the 1995 upset win over then-No. 2 FSU.
- The Cavaliers' 46 points are more than FSU's first three opponents combined (Alabama-17, East Texas A&M-3, Kent State-10).
- Virginia improves to 4-1 to start the year for the second-straight season. The last time UVA posted back-to-back 4-1 starts was in 2003-04.
- Announced attendance was 50,107, the largest crowd at Scott Stadium this season and the largest since 2023 against James Madison.
- Virginia held Florida State, the nation's top scoring offense, scoreless in the first quarter for the first time this season. It also marked the first time FSU hasn't scored on an opening drive this year.
- UVA is outscoring its opponents in the fourth quarter 26-9. FSU's game-tying touchdown with 36 seconds remaining was the first touchdown scored by a UVA opponent in the fourth quarter this season.
- The Cavaliers forced two turnovers (1 INT, 1 FUM) in the first quarter. The last time UVA forced two opposing turnovers was against Boston College in 2024, when current FSU quarterback Thomas Castellanos threw two interceptions in the fourth quarter while playing for BC.
- Virginia improves to 4-0 at Scott Stadium, matching the most home wins since sine 2021 (4-3).
- Friday's win was the first at home by the Cavaliers on a weekday since 2019 (Virginia Tech).
- UVA improves to 3-0 on the season when forcing a turnover.
- UVA had held its opponents scoreless for 42:26 before Florida State scored its first touchdown in the second quarter.
- Nine different Cavaliers caught a pass in the contest. Nine or more UVA receivers have caught a pass in all five games this season.
- For the first time since 2004, Virginia has rushed for over 200 yards in four consecutive games (Clemson-239, Syracuse-225, Akron-326, North Carolina-299, Temple-286).

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- For the second-straight game QB Chandler Morris matched his career-high of five touchdowns, including a career-high three rushing. Morris is the first UVA signal-caller to rush for three TDs in a game since Bryce Perkins also had three against Duke in 2019.
- Tallahassee native Sage Ennis caught his third touchdown of the season, his fifth reception of the year and 12th of his career to open the Cavalier scoring in the first quarter. Ennis has one TD reception in each of his last three games.
- Kevin Wigenton II started at right guard for UVA, his first start since the 2023 season finale while at Michigan State. Drake Metcalf slid over to center, his first start at center since playing for UCF in 2023.
- J'Mari Taylor scored his seventh rushing TD of the season on a 26-yard scamper with 48 seconds left in the first half. Taylor entered Friday's contest as one of 13 FBS players with at least six rushing TDs.
- Ja'Son Prevard finished with a career-high two interceptions, including one on the final play of the game in double overtime. Prevard is the first Cavalier to record two INTs in a game since Brenton Nelson against Duke in 2020.
- Devin Neel finished with a game-high 12 tackles, also his career high.
- Mitchell Melton and Anthony Britton were credited with forced fumbles in the first half.
- Will Bettridge (1-1 FG, 5-5 PAT) gained sole possession of No. 5 on UVA's all-time scoring list and now has 248 career points. Bettridge entered the game tied for fifth with former UVA running back Thomas Jones.
- Taylor finished with 27 carries for 99 yards and one touchdown. His 27 carries are a career high and he's the first UVA running back to rush for over 25 carries since Jordan Ellis vs. South Carolina in 2018.
- Dakota Twitty finished with a career-high five receptions for 29 yards.
- Anthony Britton recorded his first career forced fumble, which was recovered by Fisher Camac, on FSU's second drive of the game.
- Mitchell Melton finished with a career-high 7 tackles, including one for loss, and one forced fumble
- Kam Robinson finished with 10 tackles, including one sack, which marks his fourth career double-digit tackle performance. The last time Robinson had at least 10 tackles was against Duke in 2023, when he had 11.

Game 4 • Virginia 48, Stanford 20
Saturday, Sept. 20 • Charlottesville, Va./Scott Stadium

Virginia Team Notes

- Saturday's contest was the first-ever meeting between Virginia and Stanford. With the win, UVA improved to 6-1 in its last seven meetings with first-time opponents.
- For the second consecutive year, Virginia has three wins in its first four games.
- For the first time since 2020, UVA has won its ACC opener in back-to-back seasons.
- The Cavaliers also improved to 3-13 all-time when playing ACC opponent for the very first time, dating back to 1954, its first season in the league. UVA has won three of its last four such contests.
- UVA is 43-22-1 all-time in night games under the Scott Stadium lights, and dating back to 2018, and has won 12 of its last 16 games at night in Charlottesville. The last home win over an ACC opponent at night came against Georgia Tech in 2021 (48-40).
- Virginia scored on the opening drive for the third-straight game. UVA went 65 yards on seven plays in 2:26.
- Virginia scored touchdowns on its first four drives. The Cavaliers' first of two punts in the contest was the first in 23-straight drives dating back to their game at NC State (9/6).
- The Cavalier offense produced its second, one-play drive of the season with a 75-yard strike from Chandler Morris to Trell Harris in the first quarter. It marked the 13th one-play drive over 75 yards in program history.
- Saturday's contest marked the third game of the season in which UVA had at least 28 points at halftime (28 vs. Coastal Carolina, 42 vs. William & Mary, 28 vs. Stanford).
- UVA had 401 yards of total offense at the half (279 passing, 122 rushing).
- For the first time since 2004, UVA has rushed for 200 yards in three straight games. The Cavaliers finished with 206 yards against Stanford.
- Virginia's offense finished with 590 yards of total offense, including 384 yards through the air. It marks the second time this season UVA's offense recorded at least 590 yards, having set the program's single-game record of 700 in last week's win over William & Mary.
- Under Tony Elliott (since 2022), the Cavaliers have now recorded at least 500 yards of total offense in six games, including all four in 2025.
- UVA, which entered Saturday's contest as the nation's leader in total touchdowns, finished with six to bring its total on the season to 23.
- Virginia's offense was sacked for the first time this season with 1:14 remaining in the third quarter. The last time UVA did not allow a sack in three consecutive games was in 2011.
- With receptions by Jayden Thomas and Harrison Waylee, sixteen different UVA receivers have caught a pass this year.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Trell Harris finished with career highs in receiving yards (145) and touchdown receptions (3). His 75-yard reception in the first quarter was the longest of his career and the longest pass play by the Cavaliers since 2023 (Colandrea to Pace vs. JMU).
- Harris is the first Virginia wide receiver with three touchdowns in a game since Olamide Zaccheaus hauled in three scores in the 2018 Belk Bowl against South Carolina. Since 1995, only four Cavaliers have had three receiving touchdowns in a game – Harris, Zaccheaus, Cnaan Severin (2015 at Louisville) and Wali Lundy (2003 at NC State).
- On the 75-yard completion to Harris, quarterback Chandler Morris went over 7,000 yards for his career. Entering the week, he was one of 17 active FBS QBs with 6,800+ yards passing.
- Morris tied his career high of five total touchdowns. While at North Texas, Morris also had five TDs against Tulsa and South Alabama in 2024.
- Kicker Will Bettridge converted on two of his three field goal attempts (28, 26) and was a perfect 6-for-6 on extra points. His 12 points moved him into a tie for fifth place with Thomas Jones (240 points) on UVA's all-time scoring list.
- J'Mari Taylor led the Cavaliers with 85 yards rushing on 15 carries. His 14-game streak of scoring a rushing touchdown came to an end.
- Linebacker Kam Robinson, safety Antonio Clary and defensive end Mekhi Buchanan made their season debuts Saturday. All three missed - UVA's first three games of the 2025 season due to injury. Robinson led the team in tackles with seven and recovered a fumble in the fourth quarter.
- Cam Ross led the Cavaliers with seven receptions, his second seven-reception game of the season. In the process, he eclipsed the 2,000-yard receiving mark for his career after catching the first two passes of the game. He entered week four at No. 11 on the NCAA's active career leaders in receiving yards behind former Cavalier and current Notre Dame wideout, Malachi Fields.
- Sophomore Daniel Kaelin threw his first collegiate touchdown pass, a four-yard pass to Eli Wood. The touchdown reception for Wood was also the first of his career.

Game 3 • Virginia 55, William & Mary 16
Saturday, Sept. 13 • Charlottesville, Va./Scott Stadium

Virginia Team Notes

- UVA improved to 33-6-1 in the all-time series with William & Mary, dating back to 1908. Saturday's contest was the 40th all-time meeting of the series.
- The game was UVA Strong Day at Scott Stadium, dedicated to the memories of Lavel Davis Jr., Devin and Chandler and D'Sean Perry, who were killed in an on-Grounds shooting on Nov. 13, 2022, upon returning from a class field trip. Their families along with Mike Hollins and Marlee Morgan served as honorary captains.
- The Cavaliers finished with a program-record 700 yards of total offense (379 rushing, 321 passing).
- Virginia's 55 points are its most in a single game under head coach Tony Elliott and most since 2020, when the Cavaliers also tallied 55 against Abilene Christian. In the game against Abilene Christian both Lavel Davis and D'Sean Perry scored touchdowns.
- UVA has now won the last seven meetings of the series and 13 of the last 14.
- UVA scored 42 points in the first half, which tied for its most in a half since the BYU game in 2021.
- Last time UVA had six rushing touchdowns in a game was vs. Temple in 2005. UVA's six rushing TDs are tied for third all-time in school single-game history.
- Eleven different Cavaliers combined for 379 yards rushing. UVA hit the 200-yard mark on the ground with 12 minutes remaining in the second quarter. It marked the most rushers in a single UVA game in at least 25 seasons.
- It also marked first time UVA had consecutive games with 200 rushing yards since 2023 and first time having 150 or more yards in three-straight games since 2021.
- Through its first three games, UVA has yet to allow a single sack this season. It marks the first time since 2011 that the Cavaliers have not surrendered a sack in three consecutive games.
- The Cavaliers entered the contest as the nation's leader in 3rd down defense and held William & Mary to 2-for-13 on third downs Saturday. Opposing offenses are now 4-for-34 (12%) on third down against UVA's defense.
- UVA did not punt for the first time in a game since the Cavaliers defeated 52-17 William & Mary in 2019.
- Former UVA head coach Mike London – who was also a UVA assistant – is the current head coach of the Tribe. London is now 0-5 all-time against UVA as opposing head coach.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Harrison Waylee's 97-yard rushing touchdown in the third quarter is the longest in UVA history. It eclipsed Mikell Simpson's 96-yarder in the 2008 Gator Bowl against Texas Tech. Coming into week three, the longest rush in FBS was 94 yards (Hahsaun Wilson, UTEP).
- Waylee finished with three rushing TDs, which tied his career high. It was his third multi-TD game of his career and first since he had three against Ball State in 2022 when he played for Northern Illinois.
- Saturday marked the first time since 2004 in which UVA had a player scored three rushing touchdowns in consecutive games (J.Taylor at NC State & Waylee vs. William & Mary). Wali Lundy scored three rushing TDs in three straight games against Akron, North Carolina and Temple in 2004.
- Waylee went over the 100-yard mark for the first time as a Cavalier and the 14th time for his career.
- Waylee (151) and Vaughn (101) are UVA's first running back tandem to rush for 100 yards each in a single game since Daniel Hamm and Kevin Parks did so in 2013 against VMI. It's also the first that two Cavaliers rushed for 100 yards each in the same since the 2022 season opener against Richmond (QB Brennan Armstrong and RB Perris Jones).
- Receiver Kam Courtney scored his first career touchdown on a 23-yard end-around pitch, his first rushing attempt of the season and third of his career.
- J'Mari Taylor scored the game's second touchdown. He now has six rushing TDs on the season. Dating back to his time at NC Central, he has scored a rushing touchdown in 14-consecutive games.
- Noah Vaughn left the game in the second quarter with an injury but compiled a career-high 101 rushing yards on eight carries, including the longest rush of his career (54 yards).
- John Rogers caught his first pass and first touchdown of his collegiate career. He finished the day with three receptions and 30 yards. His three receptions are the first three of his career.
- Placekicker Will Bettridge finished with 13 points (2-2 FG, 7-7 PAT) to move into sole possession of seventh on UVA's all-time scoring list. He now has 228 points in 34 career games.

Virginia Team Notes

- Virginia dropped to 22-38-1 all-time against NC State. The Wolfpack have won four-straight against UVA and six of the last seven. The Cavaliers are 9-18 against NC State in Raleigh, NC Saturday marked the first non-conference game between the two schools since 1948.
- The Cavaliers' 31 points are the most in the series since the 2012 contest in Raleigh, which is also the Hoos' most recent win (33-6) of the series.
- Virginia amassed 514 yards of total offense, the most in a game since compiling 525 at Coastal Carolina last season. Today's performance marks the third time under head coach Tony Elliott in which the UVA offense produced at least 500 yards (at NC State - 2025; at Coastal Carolina - 2024; vs. Richmond - 2022).
- The last time UVA had 500 yards of total offense and lost was at Pittsburgh in 2021, when the Cavaliers recorded 514 yards of total offense and fell 48-38.
- Virginia rushed for 257 yards, the third time under Elliott that UVA has accumulated 250 or more rushing yards (at NC State - 2025; at Coastal Carolina - 2024; vs. Richmond - 2022;). It was the first 250+ yard rushing performance against an ACC school under Elliott and since recording 262 against Boston College in 2020.
- The Virginia offensive line did not allow a sack for the second-straight game. It marks the first time UVA has had two games in the same season without allowing a sack since 2018. The last time UVA did not allow a sack in back-to-back games was in 2014.
- UVA converted 13 of its 19 third down attempts (68%) while NC State was 1-for-7. The only Wolfpack third down conversion came on their penultimate possession of the game.
- UVA committed its first turnover of the season with an interception in the end zone with 1:07 to play.
- Virginia started the game with back-to-back 75-yard touchdown drives. The Cavaliers had the ball for 20:04 in the first half compared to 9:56 by the Wolfpack.
- With a 9-yard TD rush by Taylor and a 3-yard TD reception by Sage Ennis, UVA now has six touchdowns in goal-to-go situations in as many opportunities this season
- NC State has now won 28 of its last 29 non-conference games at home and improved to 32-2 in non-ACC home games in 13 seasons under its current head coach Dave Doren.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- J'Mari Taylor broke for a 39-yard rushing touchdown on the very first drive of the game. It marked his 13th straight game with a rushing touchdown, dating back to his tenure at NC Central. He now has 28 career touchdowns, five of which have been while at UVA.
- Taylor now has seven career multi-rushing TD performances. He had two rushing TDs in his Cavalier debut against Coastal Carolina (8/30). Taylor is the first Cavalier with multiple rushing touchdowns in back-to-back games since Mike Hollins did so in 2023.
- Taylor's five rushing TDs on the season are more than any UVA rusher finished with last season, and the most since Hollins finished with seven in 2023.
- Taylor is also the first Cavalier tailback with three rushing touchdowns in a game since 2023 when Mike Hollins had three against then-No. 10 North Carolina.
- Taylor is the first UVA player with five rushing TDs in the first two games of the season since Kevin Parks (5) in 2011.
- For the second consecutive game, Cam Ross had at least 140 all-purpose yards. Against NC State, he had 40 yards receiving, 19 on kick returns, and 81 on punt returns, including a 48-yard punt return at Carter-Finley Stadium.
- Noah Vaughn's 20-yard rush in the first quarter was the longest of his career.
- Sage Ennis' 3-yard touchdown reception with 17 seconds left in the first half was the first of his career. Prior to the TD, Ennis briefly exited the game due to an apparent injury.

Virginia Team Notes

- With the win, Virginia improved to 2-0 all-time against Coastal Carolina. The first meeting was played in Conway, S.C., in 2024, while Saturday marked the teams' first matchup at Scott Stadium.
- UVA improved to 87-40-9 (.673) all-time in season openers.
- The Cavaliers improved to 3-1 in both season openers and home openers under head coach Tony Elliott. Elliott is also 3-0 when opening the season at Scott Stadium.
- Virginia shut out Coastal Carolina in the first half, which marked the first time UVA held an opponent scoreless before halftime since Oct. 16, 2021 (vs. Duke).
- Virginia's 41-point margin of victory is its largest in a game since defeating Duke 48-0 on Oct. 16, 2021.
- The Cavaliers' 48 points are the most in a game under Elliott, surpassing UVA's previous best of 43 points in last year's win at Coastal Carolina. It's also the most points in a game since 2021 (49 at No. 25 BYU, Oct. 30).
- UVA's 21 points in the second quarter tied for eighth most all-time.
- The Cavaliers scored the first five touchdowns of the game, their longest stretch without surrendering a touchdown since Oct. 16, 2021, against Duke (48-0).
- Coastal Carolina was 1-for-14 on third down in the contest.

Virginia Individual Player Notes

- Chandler Morris started in his fourth consecutive season opener (2 at TCU, 1 at North Texas, 1 at UVA).
- Morris entered Saturday's contest as one of 15 FBS quarterbacks expected to open the season as his team's starting QB for the fourth consecutive year.
- Morris threw for 264 yards and two touchdowns on 17-of-24 passing. It marked the 14th time in his career he's thrown for more than 250 yards in a game.
- In his Cavalier debut, Cam Ross accounted for 224 all-purpose yards (124 receiving, 100 KOR), which included a 100-yard kickoff return for a touchdown.
- Ross' kickoff return TD matched that of the longest in school history and is the first kickoff return for a touchdown by a Cavalier since Joe Reed did so against Duke in 2019. The 100-yard return is one of five in program history with the last by Reed against William & Mary in 2019.
- Ross collected his fourth 100-yard receiving performance of his career. His four career 100-yard receiving performances lead all players on UVA's 2025 roster.
- J'Mari Taylor's rushed for a pair of touchdowns in the contest, his 24th and 25th running scores of his career. Dating back to his time at NC Central, he has now rushed for a touchdown in 12-straight games. He now has six multi-rushing-touchdown games in his career.
- Taylor is the first UVA running back to record multiple rushing TDs in a game since Mike Hollins had two against Miami on Oct. 28, 2023.
- Trell Harris hauled in a career-long 48-yard reception with a one-handed grab late in the second quarter that set up the Hoos' third TD of the period.
- Caleb Hardy blocked a punt in the second quarter; it marked the first time UVA has blocked a punt since 2019 (Noah Taylor, at Pitt).
- With 12 points, placekicker Will Bettridge (2-3 FG, 6-6 PAT) moved to No. 11 on UVA's all-time scoring list. He now has 208 points in 32 career games.
- Linebacker James Jackson nabbed his first career fumble recovery while CCU was in the red zone in the first quarter.
- Drake Metcalf started at right guard for UVA, his first start since the 2023 season while playing at UCF. Metcalf missed the entire 2024 season due to an Achilles injury.
- Harrison Waylee's 1-yard plunge to put UVA up 14-0 early in the second quarter was his 17th of his career and first as a Cavalier.
- Jahmal Edrine hauled in his first TD reception since Nov. 11, 2024 (vs. Northwestern), when he was at Purdue. The TD reception was also the ninth of his career.
- Wide receiver Eli Wood and linebacker Landon Danley made their first career starts. Danley led all UVA tacklers with seven.

Peach Bowl

Dec. 31, 1984—Atlanta, Ga.
Virginia 27, Purdue 24



Using a potent rushing attack and an stifling second-half defense, Virginia stormed back from a 10-point halftime deficit to defeat Purdue 27-24 in the 1984 Peach Bowl. Playing in their first bowl ever, the Cavaliers completed the season at 8-2-2. Virginia was ranked 17th by The Associated Press and 20th by United Press International in the final polls.

The first half was all Purdue as quarterback Jim Everett threw for three touchdown passes to give the Big Ten opponent a 24-14 lead.

UVA's two touchdowns came on an 11-yard run by tailback Howard Petty and a three-yard pass from quarterback Don Majkowski to tight end Geno Zimmerlink. The Boilermakers contained Virginia's running game, holding running backs Petty and Barry Word to a combined 68 yards rushing in the first half.

In the second half Virginia managed to establish its running game and create a pass rush to disrupt Everett with a variety of blitzes. It worked and Purdue did not score in the final two quarters. On a crucial fourth quarter drive—with Purdue driving for a possible go-ahead touchdown—Ray Daly, the game's defensive MVP, preserved the Cavalier lead by intercepting an errant Everett pass.

Virginia's rushing attack was sparked by the blocking of linemen Jim Dombrowski and Bob Olderman, as the Cavalier backfield of Majkowski, Petty, and Word kept the Purdue defense off balance with a combination of sweeps, dives, and options. Churning out nearly 200 yards rushing in the second half, the Cavalier offense was virtually unstoppable, moving the ball consistently up the field. By the end of the game, Petty—the game's offensive MVP—had gained 114 yards on 21 carries while Word added 86 yards on 17 carries.

After a one-yard touchdown run by Majkowski and a 19-yard field goal by UVA kicker Kenny Stadlin, the Cavaliers and the Boilermakers were deadlocked at 24 midway through the fourth quarter. UVA then drove down to the Purdue one-yard line before Stadlin converted a 22-yard field goal with 7:17 remaining in the game to provide the winning margin.

All American Bowl

Dec. 22, 1987—Birmingham, Ala.
Virginia 22, Brigham Young 16

In what was billed as a high scoring, offensive shootout between Virginia quarterback Scott Secules—the ACC’s top-rated passer—and BYU’s Sean Covey, the Cavaliers relied instead on a conservative run-oriented attack and several big defensive stands to defeat pass-happy BYU, 22-16, in the 1987 All American Bowl at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala.



Virginia captured its second bowl victory in as many tries to finish the 1987 season with an 8-4 overall record.

Hoping to keep Covey and a host of talented BYU receivers on the sidelines as long as possible, Virginia successfully controlled the tempo of the game, mixing hard-nosed rushing by running backs Kevin Morgan (82 yards), Marcus Wilson (77 yards) and Durwin Greggs (33 yards) with timely passing by Secules (10 completions for 162 yards and one TD)—the game’s MVP

Trailing 3-0 after BYU’s initial drive in the first quarter, Virginia answered on its next possession with a two-yard TD run by Secules. The Cavaliers added another touchdown—this time on a 25-yard run by Morgan—to go up 14-3 at the half.

BYU opened the scoring in the third quarter with an eight-yard run by Fred Whittingham, but the Cougars’ two-point conversion attempt failed. Virginia then widened its lead in the fourth quarter with a 22-yard touchdown pass from Secules to wide receiver John Ford. Secules’ PAT fake allowed Marcus Wilson to get open in the end zone for a two-point conversion reception, giving the Cavaliers a 22-9 lead.

BYU’s second touchdown—a one-yard pass from Covey to Whittingham—closed the gap to 22-16 before the UVA defense rose to the occasion to pre-serve the victory. In one of the game’s biggest plays, Virginia held on downs with 3:50 left as defensive end Sean Scott tackled Covey just short of a first down on BYU’s own 46-yard line. Earlier in the game—in the Cougars’ first possession of the third quarter—Virginia halted BYU on fourth-and-goal at the Cavalier two-yard line.

“Without those plays, we don’t win,” said head coach George Welsh afterwards.

Florida Citrus Bowl

Jan. 1, 1990—Orlando, Fla.
Illinois 31, Virginia 21



Virginia capped a season of giddy firsts with a New Year’s Day showdown against Big Ten runner-up Illinois in the 1990 Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando, Fla.

Making their first-ever New Year’s Day bowl appearance, the Cavaliers suffered only their third loss of the season with a 31-21 defeat. The setback did little, however, to detract from a success-filled campaign that included the school’s first 10-win season as well as a share of Virginia’s first-ever Atlantic Coast Conference Championship.

Although the Illini had the advantage in total offense (497 yards to 322) and time of possession (34:30 to 25:30), the game remained close most of the way, as the two teams combined for seven turnovers and failed to capitalize on a number of scoring opportunities.

In the end, it was Illinois—behind a solid running game and the passing of quarterback Jeff George—that prevailed.

The NFL’s number-one draft pick in 1990 by the Indianapolis Colts, George was named the game’s Most Valuable Player after completing 26 of 38 passes for 321 yards and three touchdowns. He was intercepted once.

Virginia’s attack was centered around quarterback Shawn Moore, who accounted for 225 yards in total offense for the Cavaliers. He completed 17 of 27 passes for 191 yards while throwing two touchdowns and two interceptions. Moore also rushed 15 times for 34 yards and was named the team’s offensive MVP.

After a first-quarter score by Illinois, Virginia tied the game 7-7 in the second quarter with a 30-yard touchdown pass from Moore to wide receiver Tim Finkelston. Illinois then took the lead for good after scoring on a key fourth-and-goal situation. George faked a handoff to fullback Howard Griffith—who dove into the end zone—and then hit wide-open tight end Dan Donovan for the go-ahead touchdown. Illinois added a 34-yard field goal with no time remaining on the clock to lead 17-7 at intermission.

Illinois led 24-7 in the third quarter before Virginia answered with a two-yard touchdown run by tailback Marcus Wilson. Following another Illinois touchdown in the fourth quarter, Virginia closed out the scoring with a four-yard touchdown pass from Shawn Moore to Herman Moore.

Freshman defensive end Chris Slade was UVA’s defensive MVP. He recorded a game-high 11 tackles, including a 19-yard sack of George.

Tennessee 23, Virginia 22



For 59 minutes and 29 seconds, Virginia didn't trail Tennessee in the 1991 USF&G Sugar Bowl. Unfortunately for the Cavaliers, the game lasts 60 minutes.

After leading the entire contest—including a 16-0 halftime cushion—Virginia allowed 20 points in the final quarter, to fall to Tennessee 23-22 in the 1991 Sugar Bowl. The Volunteers scored the winning touchdown with 31 seconds left in the game. The Cavaliers closed their season 8-4 after a 7-0 start and a number-one national ranking for three consecutive weeks.

Everything seemed to go right for UVA in the first half. Virginia had possession of the ball for nearly 22 minutes. The defense held a strong UT offense to just 125 total yards, eight first downs and no points. Virginia's Nikki Fisher and Terry Kirby combined for over 100 rushing yards and quarterback Shawn Moore completed nine of 14 passes.

The second half was a different story. Tennessee erupted for 339 total yards in the half and scored touchdowns on all three possessions in the fourth quarter. The Cavaliers rushed for 139 second-half yards but did not complete a pass the entire half.

Moore, suffering from a late-season thumb injury, did not complete a pass in eight attempts in the second half.

The lack of an effective passing game also took away from Virginia's other explosive offensive weapon—All-America wide receiver Herman Moore. He caught two passes for 13 yards in the first quarter.

Possibly the turning point of the game came late in the third quarter. UVA led 16-3 and had the ball first-and-10 on the Tennessee 17-yard line. Three plays later, Shawn Moore was intercepted at the Vols' six-yard line with 35 seconds left in the quarter.

Tennessee marched 94 yards for a touchdown, cutting the lead to 16-10. Virginia responded with a field goal to move ahead 19-10. The Vols came right back with an 80-yard scoring drive but UVA again responded with another field goal to make it 22-17 with 2:31 left in the game.

Tennessee then marched 79 yards in two minutes to go ahead 23-22. Virginia took over on its 38-yard line with 31 seconds left and Matt Blundin was inserted at quarterback. He threw an incomplete pass, was sacked and was intercepted to end the game and Virginia's season.

Gator Bowl

Dec. 29, 1991—Jacksonville, Fla.
Oklahoma 48, Virginia 14



Departing from its traditionally conservative run-oriented game plan in favor of a more wide-open offensive attack, Big Eight Conference power Oklahoma rolled to a decisive 48-14 victory over Virginia in the 1991 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Fla.

For UVA, the loss snapped an eight-game unbeaten streak and was a disappointing ending to an otherwise outstanding season. Making its third consecutive bowl appearance and fourth in five years, the Cavaliers finished the 1991 season with an 8-3-1 record.

After punting to end its first possession of the game, Oklahoma opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 10-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Cale Gundy to tight end Joey Mickey. The Sooners then scored touchdowns on each of their next four possessions to run up a 34-0 second-quarter lead.

Virginia managed to get on the scoreboard with 2:24 remaining in the first half when quarterback Matt Blundin completed a 22-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Tyrone Davis. The Cavaliers had an opportunity to score again seconds later when UVA defensive end Mike Frederick recovered an Oklahoma fumble on the Sooners' own 22-yard line, but the OU defense held the Cavaliers on downs.

Oklahoma engineered two more touchdown drives in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. Virginia closed the scoring with a 23-yard fourth-quarter TD pass from Blundin to wide receiver Terrence Tomlin.

The Sooners' offensive strategy was executed to near-perfection by Gundy, who completed 25 of 31 passes for 329 yards and two touchdowns without an interception. He was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

Tailback Mike Gaddis led Oklahoma's rushing attack with 20 carries for 104 yards and three TDs.

Oklahoma controlled possession for nearly 38 minutes, piled up 618 yards in total offense and picked up 36 first downs. Virginia was held to a season-low 243 yards in total offense and managed just 13 first downs.

Blundin—the 1991 ACC Player of the Year—completed 12 of 26 passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns with one interception.

Carquest Bowl

Jan. 1, 1994—Miami/
Boston College 31, Virginia 13



Virginia fell to Boston College 31-13 in the 1994 Carquest Bowl, as a disappointing second-half performance enabled the Eagles to pull away after leading by four points at half-time. UVA, making its third New Year's Day bowl appearance in five years, finished the season with a 7-5 record.

Boston College quarterback Glenn Foley—named the game's Most Valuable Player—overcame a shaky first-half start, finishing with 391 yards and three passing touchdowns to spark the Eagles' victory.

The lead changed hands several times in the first 30 minutes before Boston College gained a 17-13 halftime advantage. Despite committing two first-half turnovers, BC also held the edge in total offensive yards (309 to 238), time of possession (16:01 to 13:59) and first downs (17 to 12). Virginia missed two field goals (37 and 29 yards) and an extra-point attempt.

UVA grabbed the early momentum on the third play of the game when linebacker Jamie Sharper tipped a Foley pass into the hands of Randy Neal. Neal returned the interception 19 yards to the BC 19-yard line. Tailback Jerrod Washington ran 11 yards for a touchdown two plays later, giving Virginia a 7-0 lead just over a minute into the game.

Trailing 10-7 midway through the second quarter, Virginia drove 91 yards in 12 plays to briefly retake the lead on a seven-yard touchdown run by fullback Charles Way. The extra-point attempt failed as UVA was held scoreless the rest of the game.

Boston College took the ensuing kickoff and drove 80 yards in nine plays for a touchdown to complete the first-half scoring. The Eagles reached the end zone on a five-yard pass from Foley to split end Clarence Cannon. Foley and Cannon also teamed up for a 78-yard touchdown pass play earlier in the second quarter.

UVA's best scoring opportunity of the second half came after Boston College failed on fourth-and-one from its own 49-yard line fewer than four minutes into the third quarter. The Cavaliers failed to capitalize, unable to pick up a first down on fourth-and-three from the BC 30-yard line.

The game seemed to quickly unravel for Virginia from that point on as Boston College took over on downs and scored five plays later on Foley's third touchdown pass of the game. The Eagles added a rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter to provide the final margin of victory. UVA managed just 60 yards of total offense and four first downs in the second half.

Not even a cold, driving rain that drenched both teams and transformed a grass football field into a virtual mud bath by halftime could dampen Cavalier spirits following Virginia's convincing 20-10 win over Texas Christian at the Poulan/Weed Eater Independence Bowl.

With the victory, Virginia finished the 1994 campaign with a 9-3 record and ended a four-game bowl losing streak. The victory also helped Virginia gain its highest final season rankings (15th) since the AP began conducting its final poll after the outcome of bowl games in 1965. In addition, the 1994 Cavaliers distinguished themselves by becoming only the third team in UVA history to win nine or more games.

Virginia relied on a dominating defense and a balanced offensive attack to overwhelm the Horned Frogs. The Cavaliers outgained TCU 436 to 191 in total offensive yards and controlled the ball for over 32 minutes.

Leading the Cavaliers' aerial assault was quarterback Mike Groh—named Offensive Player of the Game—who completed 14 of 23 passes for 199 yards and a touchdown with two interceptions. Tailback Kevin Brooks led all rushers with 114 yards on 17 carries while fullback Charles Way rushed for 90 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, Virginia limited TCU's high-powered offense to just 65 yards passing and 126 yards rushing. Defensive end Mike Frederick was named Defensive Player of the Game after finishing with four tackles.

The Cavaliers scored twice in the second quarter to take a 10-3 halftime lead. Rafael Garcia opened the game's scoring with a 20-yard field goal with 10:20 remaining in the first half. Virginia later scored on a six-yard touchdown run by Way. UVA's touchdown drive was set up by a 52-yard run by Brooks. It was the longest non-scoring run in the bowl's history.

UVA opened up a commanding 20-3 lead in the third quarter on a 37-yard touchdown pass from Groh to wide receiver Tyrone Davis and a 32-yard field goal by Garcia.

Following a one-yard touchdown pass play by Texas Christian early in the fourth quarter, Virginia held TCU scoreless the rest of the way to seal the win.

Peach Bowl

Virginia 34, Georgia 27



Over 20,000 deliriously happy Virginia fans rocked Atlanta's Georgia Dome as Demetrius "Pete" Allen returned a kickoff 83 yards for the game-winning touchdown with 57 seconds remaining in UVA's 34-27 victory over Georgia in the 1995 Peach Bowl.

Virginia finished the season with a 9-4 record, clinching its second consecutive nine-win season. The Cavaliers were ranked 16th in the final AP poll and 17th in the final *USA Today/CNN* coaches' poll.

The victory was a fitting finale to one of the most suspenseful seasons in UVA football history. Virginia played seven games during the 1995 regular season that were decided in the final moments, including three which were decided on the last play.

Only seconds before Allen's spectacular return, Georgia defensive tackle Jason Ferguson picked up a Cavalier fumble behind the line of scrimmage and ran 10 yards for the game-tying score. Georgia was penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct following the touchdown, forcing the Bulldogs to kick off from their own 20-yard line.

Although UVA never trailed in the game, the Bulldogs out-gained the Cavaliers 525 yards to 256 yards in total offense. UVA managed to capitalize on big plays from its defense and special teams, however, to take a commanding 14-0 first quarter lead. Linebacker Skeet Jones—named the Defensive Player of the Game—set up UVA's first scoring drive by intercepting a pass and returning it 28 yards to the Bulldog seven-yard line. Barber scored three plays later on a one-yard run.

Virginia began its second scoring drive from the Georgia 14-yard line after James Farrior blocked a punt which was recovered by Josh Nowocin. Kevin Brooks rushed five yards for a score three plays later.

Virginia led 24-14 at halftime following a Georgia touchdown with 19 seconds remaining in the second quarter.

In addition to his late-game heroics, Allen caught an 82-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Mike Groh to give Virginia its biggest lead, 24-6, late in the second quarter. Allen led the Cavaliers in receiving with five catches for 111 yards and a touchdown. Groh completed 10 of 20 passes for 156 yards and a touchdown.

Miami defensive back Tremain Mack stole the show in the Hurricanes' 31-21 victory over Virginia in the 1996 Carquest Bowl. Named the game's MVP, Mack returned a first-quarter Cavalier fumble 79 yards for a touchdown and scored again in the second quarter on a 42-yard interception return. He also blocked a Virginia field goal attempt in the third quarter.

Making its eighth bowl appearance in the last 10 years, Virginia finished the 1996 season with a 7-5 overall record.

The Hurricanes set the tone early, capping their first possession of the game with a 70-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Ryan Clement to wide receiver Yatil Green. Miami bolted to a 14-0 lead on Mack's recovered fumble return before the Cavaliers answered with a 29-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Aaron Brooks to wide receiver Germane Crowell.

Miami led 24-7 at halftime, following a second-quarter field goal and Mack's second touchdown of the game.

Early in the third quarter UVA safety Anthony Poindexter blocked a punt and Virginia recovered the ball on the Miami one-yard line. The Cavaliers scored one play later on a quarterback sneak by Brooks.

Virginia was in good position to score again midway through the third quarter after driving deep into Miami to the six-yard line, but the Cavaliers' 29-yard field goal attempt was blocked by Mack.

UVA got the ball back two plays later after cornerback Ronde Barber intercepted his second pass of the day and returned it to the 50-yard line. Virginia then marched to the Miami 27-yard line only to have another field goal attempt—this time from 44 yards out—blocked. The Hurricanes went on to score to take a 31-14 lead with 10:14 remaining in the game.

Following the ensuing kickoff, Virginia put together a six-play, 51-yard scoring drive that culminated in a three-yard touchdown run by tailback Thomas Jones with 7:57 left to play.

Poindexter led the Cavalier defense with 11 tackles, including six solo stops. He also recovered a fumble in addition to blocking a punt.

The ending to the sequel was not nearly as satisfying for Cavalier fans, however, as 19th-ranked Georgia overcame a 21-0 first-half deficit and withstood a late Virginia rally to defeat 13th-ranked UVA 35-33.

UVA trailed 35-27 in the fourth quarter before quarterback Aaron Brooks scored on a 30-yard run with 1:34 left in the game. Virginia's two-point conversion attempt failed, but the Cavaliers regained possession when defensive back Devon Simmons recovered the ensuing onside kick at UVA's own 47-yard line. Virginia then drove to the Georgia 31, setting up a potential game-winning 48-yard field goal attempt by Todd Braverman with 19 seconds remaining, but his kick drifted wide right.

Georgia quarterback Quincy Carter threw three second-quarter interceptions, all of which led to Virginia touchdowns. Running back Anthony Southern rushed two yards for UVA's first score with 10:30 left in the first half following a 26-yard interception return by linebacker Wali Rainer. On Georgia's next possession, Carter was intercepted by defensive back Adrian Burnin at the Cavaliers' 31. Virginia scored six plays later on a 43-yard pass from Brooks to wide receiver Terrence Wilkins. A 22-yard interception return by defensive back Tim Spruill set up UVA's third touchdown, a 24-yard scoring strike from Brooks to tailback Thomas Jones.

The Bulldogs capitalized on a blocked punt just before the half, taking over on downs at the UVA 49-yard line and scoring six plays later on an 11-yard pass. Georgia added two more touchdowns in the third quarter to tie the score at 21 before Virginia answered with a 67-yard touchdown pass play from Brooks to Wilkins, who broke free from several defenders on his way to the end zone. UVA missed the extra-point and led 27-21 late in the third quarter.

Georgia regained the lead 28-27 early in the fourth quarter on a two-yard scoring run by running back Olandis Gary and later added a one-yard touchdown run by Carter with 7:01 left to play.

Brooks completed 12 of 32 passes for 226 yards and three touchdowns with one interception. He also rushed 14 times for 88 yards and one touchdown. Jones led the Cavaliers with 96 yards rushing on 23 carries.

Sparked by the versatile play of quarterback Kurt Kittner, Illinois handed Virginia its worst postseason loss in school history, defeating the Cavaliers 63-21 in the Micronpc.com Bowl at Pro Player Stadium.

Virginia finished the 1999 season with a 7-5 overall record.

Kittner, who completed 14 of 24 passes for 254 yards and one interception, was named the bowl's Most Valuable Player. He scored the game's first touchdown on a one-yard run with 9:42 remaining in the first quarter. Later, in the second quarter, he caught a 30-yard scoring pass from wide receiver Brandon Lloyd and threw for touchdowns of 61 yards and one yard to halfback Jameel Cook.

Illinois scored 28 unanswered points in the second quarter, capitalizing on two blocked punts, to build a commanding 42-7 halftime lead. Adding to Virginia's woes, starting offensive linemen Noel LaMontagne and Josh Lawson were both injured in the first half and did not return.

Illinois scored touchdowns on nine of 14 possessions and amassed 611 yards in total offense, compared to 380 by the Cavaliers.

Virginia tailback Thomas Jones rushed 23 times for 110 yards and scored on a seven-yard run to tie the game at seven with 7:24 left in the first quarter. Jones also led UVA with five receptions for 31 yards.

Quarterback Dan Ellis completed 15 of 32 passes for 146 yards and one interception to lead the Virginia passing attack. He threw a five-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Kevin Coffey in the third quarter. Ellis was replaced late in the fourth quarter by David Rivers, who completed two of three passes for 62 yards, including a 55-yard touchdown strike to backup quarterback/wide receiver Will Thompson with 1:43 left to play.

Shannon Taylor led UVA with eight tackles. Byron Thweatt recovered a fumble, while Dwayne Stukes intercepted a pass. Donnie Scott averaged 45 yards on four punts, including a long of 53 yards.

Jeep O’ahu Bowl

Georgia 37, Virginia 14



In the final game of the “George Welsh era” Virginia fell to Georgia 37-14 in the Jeep O’ahu Bowl. UVA finished the season with a 6-6 record, snapping its ACC-record streak of 13 consecutive seven-win seasons.

Welsh, the winningest coach in Virginia and ACC football history, announced his retirement at the end of the 2000 regular season. He compiled a 19-year record of 134-86-3 at UVA, including a conference-record 85 ACC wins. Welsh led the Cavaliers to 12 bowl games, including UVA’s first bowl trip ever— the 1984 Peach Bowl.

Georgia scored on three of its first four possessions of the game to take a 17-0 first quarter lead. Splitting time at wide receiver and quarterback for the Bulldogs, Terrence Edwards was named the bowl’s Most Valuable Player after gaining 176 all-purpose yards (79 receiving, 97 rushing). He scored on a 40-yard reverse in the first quarter, after the Bulldogs kept the drive alive with a fake punt play, and later ran 57 yards to set up a touchdown in the second quarter.

Making the most of its opportunities, Georgia recovered a Cavalier fumble in UVA’s end zone for a first quarter touchdown and returned another Virginia fumble four yards for a score in the fourth quarter.

Virginia cut Georgia’s lead to 17-7 early in the second quarter, scoring on a 14-yard lateral from backup quarterback Bryson Spinner to Demetrius Dotson. The Cavaliers drove 97 yards in just five plays, sparked by a 78-yard pass from Spinner to wide receiver Tavon Mason.

Trailing 24-7 at the half, UVA scored again late in the third quarter when linebacker Byron Thweatt picked up a Georgia fumble and raced 58 yards to pay-dirt. The Bulldogs held UVA scoreless after that, however, while tallying their final two touchdowns within a span of 16 seconds (on a pass play and the fumble recovery return) early in the fourth quarter.

Spinner, who went most of the way at quarterback after starter Dan Ellis injured his ankle during Virginia’s opening series, completed 14 of 22 passes for 153 yards with two interceptions. Matt Schaub replaced Spinner late in the fourth quarter, completing six of 10 passes for 47 yards.

Continental Tire Bowl

Virginia 48, West Virginia 22



Virginia made its first bowl appearance under head coach Al Groh a memorable one, dominating No. 15 West Virginia 48-22 in the inaugural Continental Tire Bowl. The game was played in front of a sell-out crowd of 73,535 fans. It marked the second-highest attendance figure for a first-year bowl game in NCAA history.

Finishing with a 9-5 record (6-2 ACC), Virginia clinched its first nine-win season since 1998 and was ranked 22nd in the final Associated Press poll.

Trailing 10-7 at the end of the first quarter, the Cavaliers tallied 31 unanswered points to take a commanding 38-10 lead with 6:48 left in the third quarter.

Among the many Cavaliers who excelled was true freshman tailback Wali Lundy—the game’s Most Valuable Player—who totaled 239 all-purpose yards. In addition to rushing for a game-high 127 yards and two scores, he caught five passes for 76 yards and two touchdowns. He also had a 36-yard kickoff return.

Lundy accounted for UVA’s first score in the first quarter when he caught a 14-yard pass from backup quarterback Marques Hagans. Hagans took a lateral from quarterback Matt Schaub and then threw across the field to Lundy in the end zone. Lundy later capped the game’s scoring with a 31-yard TD run in the fourth quarter. He also scored on a four-yard run and on a 48-yard pass play from Schaub.

In addition to his touchdown pass, Hagans scored on a 69-yard punt return to open up a 21-10 Cavalier lead midway through the second quarter.

Connecting on five of his first six passes of the game, Schaub finished 16 of 22 passing for 182 yards and a touchdown. The ACC Player of the Year also rushed for 39 yards, including a one-yard TD run.

Virginia played most of the game without star wide receiver Billy McMullen, who left the game in the first quarter with an injured elbow. He caught one pass for eight yards, giving him 210 career receptions—the second most in ACC history.

Freshman place-kicker Connor Hughes, who assumed UVA’s kick scoring duties late in the season, connected on field goals of 27 and 30 yards.

Linebacker Angelo Crowell had a team-high 14 tackles, followed by safety Jerton Evans with eight.

Continental Tire Bowl

Dec. 27, 2003 —Charlotte, N.C.**Virginia 23, Pittsburgh 16**

Quarterback Matt Schaub threw for 244 yards and a touchdown to lead the Cavaliers to a 23-16 win over Pittsburgh in UVA's second straight trip to the Continental Tire Bowl. Playing in his final game, Schaub was named the game's MVP.

After stopping Pittsburg on four straight plays from the UVA one-yard line, the Cavaliers needed just four plays to drive the length of the field for the game's first score. Schaub capped the drive by finding tight end Heath Miller for a 52-yard touchdown, the 56th of his career, setting a new school record.

After Pittsburgh responded with a score, Virginia used a 51-yard run by Alvin Pearman on a drive that ended with Wali Lundy's one-yard plunge into the end zone.

Pittsburgh drove 85 yards in 10 plays, however the Panthers missed the extra point and Virginia maintained its lead at 14-13. Connor Hughes' 44-yard field goal as time expired at the end of the half extend the lead to 17-13.

On the opening series of the second half, Pitt was intercepted by Robbie Catterton, who returned the ball 24 yards to the Pitt 18-yard line. That play set up a 30-yard field goal by Hughes that pushed UVA's lead to six points. Pittsburgh responded with a field goal drive of its own to trail 20-16. The Panthers had a chance to further chip away at the lead with 7:51 remaining, but Pittsburgh's missed a 36-yard field goal attempt.

Virginia then mounted its final scoring drive of the day, as Lundy rushed 27 yards on six carries and Schaub connected on three of four pass attempts to set up Hughes' third field goal of the day, a 39-yard score with 2:28 remaining.

Pittsburgh looked for a late scoring drive to tie the game. William Ferguson gave the Panthers excellent field position with a 45-yard kickoff return to the Pitt 48-yard line. On the first play of the drive, the Cavalier defense forced their second turnover of the day to end the threat. A Brennan Schmidt sack caused Rutherford to fumble, and the ball was recovered by Kai Parham. It was the fifth sack of the day by the Virginia defense.

In addition to Schaub's 244 yards through the air, the Cavaliers compiled 196 yards rushing led by Pearman's 104 yards and Lundy's 90 yards. Pearman also made a team-high six catches, while Miller led UVA with 84 receiving yards on four catches.

The Cavalier defense held Panther wideout and Heisman Trophy runner-up Larry Fitzgerald to 77 yards on five catches, snapping his NCAA record 18-game touchdown reception streak. Linebackers Parham and Brooks led Virginia with 13 and 12 tackles, respectively.

Fresno State rallied from a 14-point deficit to hand Virginia a 37-34 loss in overtime at the MPC Computers Bowl in Boise, Idaho. The Bulldogs tied the game in the final seconds of regulation before winning in overtime.

The Cavaliers scored touchdowns on their first three offensive series. Alvin Pearman capped UVA's first drive with a 13-yard touchdown run to give the Cavaliers the early 7-0 lead.

Fresno State's Paul Pinegar connected with Adam Jennings for a 13-yard score to tied the game before Virginia regained the lead less than two minutes later. Michael Johnson's 47-yard kickoff return plus a 17-yard run by Pearman and a 21-yarder by Jason Snelling gave the Cavaliers first-and-goal. Two plays later, Michael McGrew scored on a 7-yard toss from Marques Hagans.

In the second quarter the Cavalier offense put together a 12-play, 66-yard drive to extend the lead to two touchdowns. The drive was capped by an 8-yard Hagans touchdown run. The Bulldogs closed the Cavalier advantage to 21-10 at the half as Brett Visintainer connected on a 49-yard field goal as time expired in the half.

A 22-yard touchdown pass from Pinegar to Jermaine Jamison cut the Cavalier lead to 21-17 in the third quarter. UVA benefited by a pass interference penalty to help set up a 33-yard field goal by Connor Hughes to go up 24-17.

Fresno State tied the game at 24-24 early in the fourth quarter as Pinegar threw a 22-yard touchdown pass to Mark Wood. Virginia then drove 80 yard, capped by a 20-yard touchdown run by Wali Lundy, to lead 31-24.

Fresno State drove the length of the field and on fourth down, Pinegar found Jaron Fairman for the tying score with 11 seconds remaining.

The Cavaliers had the first possession in overtime and took the lead on a field 26-yard field goal by Hughes. On the first play for Fresno State, Pinegar connected on a pass to tight end Stephen Spach who fought his way to the goal line for the winning touchdown.

Hagans led the Cavalier offense with a team high 85 yards rushing while completing 18 of 30 pass attempts for 162 yards. Pinegar led Fresno State by completing 23 of his 36 attempts for 235 yards and five touchdowns.

Virginia 34, Minnesota 31**



Making its fourth consecutive bowl appearance, Virginia used a dramatic fourth-quarter effort to defeat Big Ten opponent Minnesota 34-31. Trailing 31-24 with 12:16 to play, UVA quarterback Marques Hagans connected on three passes for 71 yards to set up Wali Lundy's two-yard scoring run to tie the game.

Later in the fourth quarter Hagans threw an interception that gave Minnesota the ball back at Virginia's 38-yard line. A Gopher punt pinned Virginia at its own three-yard line with just five minutes to play.

Hagans redeemed himself and drove UVA down the field. With 1:08 to play Virginia kicker Connor Hughes booted a 39-yard field goal that proved to be the game winner. UVA cornerback Marcus Hamilton came up with an interception in the endzone to end Minnesota's comeback effort.

Hagans, who had fumbled a punt at the start of the fourth quarter to set up the Gophers final score, was named the game's offensive MVP. He completed 25 of 32 pass attempts for a career best 358 yards, the fifth best passing game by a UVA quarterback and a school bowl record. Tight end Tom Santi, playing in his hometown, had his best day as a Cavalier, piling up 128 yards on five catches.

Ranked as the nation's second-best rushing team (279.9 ypg.), Minnesota relied on it passing game to take a 14-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

UVA finally scored when Hagans directed a 67-yard drive capped by his six-yard touchdown pass to Deyon Williams with 2:46 remaining in the first quarter.

Minnesota responded when Cupito threw his third TD pass, a 57-yarder to Jared Ellerson, but put the Gophers back up by two touchdowns at 21-7. Hughes booted his first field goal at the end of the half to close the gap to 21-10.

Virginia drove 84 yards in 13 plays to open the third quarter with a seven-yard scoring run by Lundy to make the score 21-17. Minnesota went up 24-17 following a field goal but the Cavaliers tied the game with four minutes left in the quarter when Hagans connected with Fontel Mines for a two-yard score.

Lundy's two scores gave him 53 touchdowns during his career, making him the ACC's career leader in touchdowns.

The Virginia defense, led by Kai Parham's 14 tackles, managed to shutdown the Minnesota offense in the second half. The Gophers rushing game was held to 198 yards, 82 below their average, including only 74 rushing yards in the second half.

Alex Trlica kicked a 41-yard field goal with seven seconds left to give Texas Tech a 31-28 come-from-behind victory over No. 21 Virginia in the Gator Bowl.

Tech rallied from a 28-14 fourth quarter deficit behind its aggressive pass offense and quarterback Graham Harrell, who set several Gator Bowl records. He completed 44 of 69 passes for 407 yards, all records, plus three TDs.

With eight minutes to play the Cavaliers seemed to have things sewn up when Texas Tech failed to convert on fourth down from the one-yard line. Getting the ball back with 5:38 to play, Harrell drove the Red Raiders 51 yards in just over two minutes to pull within 28-21 when he connected with All-American wideout Michael Crabtree from the 20-yard line.

Tech tied the score just 21 seconds later after forcing a fumble at the UVA four-yard line. After holding UVA on downs, Tech got the ball back with 2:11 left on the clock and drove 30 yards for the winning field goal.

Virginia jumped out to a 21-7 lead thanks to stellar play on defense and tailback Mikell Simpson, who ran for 170 yards on 20 carries - including a NCAA bowl-record 96-yard TD run - and caught another touchdown.

However, Virginia's offense wasn't the same after losing quarterback Jameel Sewell at the start of the fourth quarter. While he completed just 14 of 23 passes for 78 yards and a TD, Sewell carried nine times for 32 yards as the Cavaliers finished with 249 yards on the ground.

After UVA tight end Johnathan Stupar caught a 2-yard scoring pass in the first quarter, the Cavaliers sandwiched a pair of safeties around Simpson's long run to take an 18-7 lead. Chris Gould's 23-yard field goal at the end of the first half pushing UVA's advantage to 21-7. Texas Tech managed the only score during the third quarter to close the gap to 21-14 before Cavalier back-up quarterback Peter Lalich hooked up with Simpson for an 11-yard touchdown pass that proved to be the team's final points.

Virginia couldn't put a postseason cap on its season of improvement. Hurt by special teams breakdowns, Virginia didn't keep pace with high-scoring Auburn, losing 43-24 in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Virginia, wearing orange helmets for the first time since 1978, led 14-7 in the first half before Auburn charged back behind a balanced running game and big plays on special teams.

The Tigers blocked two punts, including one for a safety, and recovered an onside kick.

Virginia receiver Kris Burd caught two touchdown passes before leaving with an injury in the fourth quarter. Burd had six catches for 103 yards. He said he hurt his collarbone.

Michael Rocco completed 26 of 41 passes for 312 yards with two touchdowns and an interception.

Onterio McCalebb scored for Auburn on a 3-yard run and 25-yard catch. McCalebb had 109 yards rushing. Tre Mason added 64 yards rushing, including a 22-yard scoring run.

Barrett Trotter started the first seven games for Auburn before losing his job to Moseley. He made a triumphant return to prominence against Virginia, completing 11 of 18 passes for 175 yards and a touchdown.

Auburn's Garrett Harper blocked a punt by Virginia's Jimmy Howell to give the Tigers possession at the Cavaliers' 15. Following a 12-yard run by McCalebb, Frazier scored from the 3.

Back-to-back unnecessary roughness penalties against Auburn's defense helped set up Burd's second touchdown catch from 35 yards for a 14-7 lead.

On the first play of Auburn's next possession, McCalebb broke free for a 60-yard run to the Virginia 25. He capped the drive with a 3-yard scoring run.

Chizik then called for an onside try and Cody Parkey recovered his own kick. After Trotter's 50-yard pass to Emory Blake, Frazier scored from the 1.

Auburn's Angelo Blackson blocked Howell's punt through the end zone for a safety in the third quarter. Virginia's only second-half points came on a 1-yard touchdown by Kevin Parks in the third quarter.

Backup quarterback Zach Abey scored five touchdowns, Malcolm Perry ran for 114 yards and two scores and Navy beat Virginia 49-7 in a surprisingly lopsided Military Bowl.

After Virginia's Joe Reed took the opening kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown, the Midshipmen got two TDs apiece from quarterbacks Perry and Abey in taking a 28-7 halftime lead.

Perry left in the third quarter with a foot injury, leaving Abey to score on runs of 5 and 20 yards to make it 42-7 in a game Navy entered as a 1 1/2-point favorite.

Abey added a 1-yard touchdown with 11:11 remaining, then sat for the remainder of the game.

The Midshipmen rolled up a Military Bowl-record 452 yards rushing, including 101 by Chris High and 88 by Abey, who began the season as the starter before losing the job.

Playing in their first bowl since 2011, the Cavaliers could not contain Navy's triple option and had no success moving the ball.

Seeking its first winning season in six years, Virginia instead absorbed its sixth loss in seven games.

Senior Kurt Benkert came in with a school-record 3,062 yards passing, along with 25 touchdown passes. In this one, he went 15 for 34 for 133 yards and an interception.

After Reed went the distance with the opening kickoff, Navy responded with a 69-yard drive that ended with a 1-yard run by Abey. The Midshipmen then forced a three-and-out, and Perry finished an eight-play drive with a 22-yard touchdown run for a 14-7 lead.

Perry scored from 19 yards out and Abey concluded the first-half scoring with a 1-yard TD.

Bryce Perkins threw three touchdown passes to Olamide Zaccheaus, Virginia's defense dominated and the Cavaliers beat South Carolina 28-0 in the Belk Bowl.

Perkins completed 22-of-31 passes for 208 yards and ran for 81 yards as the Cavaliers won their first bowl game since 2005. Zaccheaus, named the game's Most Outstanding Player, had 12 catches for 100 yards. Jordan Ellis ran for 106 yards and a touchdown, helping Virginia hold the ball for more than 42 minutes.

The Gamecocks were shut out for the first time since 2006, when they lost 18-0 to Georgia.

The Cavaliers' 14th-ranked pass defense put the clamps on a hot South Carolina offense that had averaged 38.2 points per game over the previous five games. Jake Bentley had thrown for 16 touchdowns during that span, including a 510-yard, five-TD performance against then-No. 2 Clemson, but struggled without wide receiver Deebo Samuel, who elected to bypass the bowl game to begin preparing for the NFL draft.

Bentley was limited to 218 yards on 17-of-39 passing and was intercepted twice. South Carolina was 2-of-13 on third down conversions and 2-of-5 on fourth downs.

The Cavaliers controlled the ball for more than 20 minutes of the first half and built a 14-0 lead at halftime. Perkins found Zaccheaus on a fourth-and-2 in the back of the end zone for a 6-yard score, and Jordan Ellis added a 9-yard touchdown run to make it 14-0.

Perkins found Zaccheaus twice in the second half for touchdowns of 10 and 12 yards, while Juan Thornhill and Tim Harris notched interceptions deep in Cavalier territory to thwart South Carolina drives.

The shutout by the Cavaliers was the first time an SEC team was shutout in a bowl game since the 1975 Gator Bowl when Maryland defeated Florida, 13-0.

Virginia trailed 36-21 with 2:39 remaining in the game. The Cavaliers drove the field in 1:54 to cut it to a one-score game, but didn't convert the onside kick.

Quarterback Bryce Perkins threw for 323 yards and a UVA bowl record four touchdowns. Wide receiver Hasise Dubois had two touchdown receptions and 83 yards. Wide receiver Terrell Jana had seven receptions for 126 yards.

The Cavaliers finished with 375 total yards, 323 of those passing yards. Florida had 549 yards of total offense. The Gators led in time of possession and were 4-for-4 in the red zone. Both teams had a turnover and had five tackles for loss.

Florida struck first with a touchdown just 40 seconds into the contest. Virginia got the ball after a Nick Grant interception and one play later Jana found the end zone on a 34-yard touchdown reception. Virginia would tie it up once again with a touchdown pass from Perkins to Dubois in the back of the end zone to make it 14-14 in the second quarter. Florida scored a field goal and touchdown to take a 24-14 lead into the half.

The Gators added another field goal at the end of the third quarter. Virginia responded with a touchdown from Perkins to wide receiver Joe Reed. Florida scored 10 consecutive points to put UVA down 36-21. UVA drove 75 yards for a touchdown to cut it to 36-28 but was unable to recover the ensuing onside kick.

Virginia won the 2018 Belk Bowl over South Carolina, 28-0. It gives UVA its third Belk Bowl win, which is the most by any school in Belk Bowl history. UVA won the first two Continental Tire Bowls in 2002 and 2003. Since 2011, the Charlotte bowl has been known as the Belk Bowl. The shutout of South Carolina was the first time an SEC team was shutout in a bowl game since Florida in the 1975 Gator Bowl.



Wali Lundy set the UVA bowl-scoring record with four touchdowns against West Virginia in the inaugural 2002 Continental Tire Bowl, which is currently the Belk Bowl. Lundy's 24 points scored is still a Belk Bowl record.
