MATCH NOTES

FOR STARTERS

• Virginia is in the NCAA Quarterfinal round for the 20th time in program history and is seeking its 13th College Cup appearance.
• Virginia comes into the match winners of its last eight matches, the second eight-match win streak of the season. It marks the third time in program history (1993 & 1995) the Cavaliers have put together win streaks of eight or more games in the same year.
• No. 5 SMU will be the fifth-straight, ranked opponent for Virginia. The Cavaliers are 10-0 against teams from the United Soccer Coaches Top-25 in 2019 and 4-0 against teams in the top-5.
• Virginia has been part of each of the last 39 NCAA Tournaments, the longest streak in the history of college soccer.
• The Cavaliers are the NCAA Tournament's No. 1 overall seed for the second time (1995) in school history and first time under head coach George Gelnovatch.

TOP SCORING OFFENSIVE OPPONENTS

• SMU comes into Friday's match averaging 3.05 goals per game, the second most in the nation.
• After Friday, Virginia will have faced the current No. 1, 2 & 3 offenses in the country in a four-week span. The Cavaliers outscored Clemson (No. 1) and Campbell (No. 2) by a combined score of 5-1.

HOW WE GOT HERE

• In two NCAA matches, Virginia has outscored its opponents, 5-0 and held both Campbell and St. John's to a combined five shots (2 on goal).
• Junior Spencer Patton was credited with the game-winning goal against Campbell in the 38th minute. Nathaniel Crofts had the assist and later made the score 2-0 with his sixth goal of the season.
• Virginia scored three first half goals in a 3-0 shutout of St. John's. Two of the three tallies came off the head of Andreas Ueland, his second and third career goals.

TRENDING

• The Cavaliers have collected shutouts in three of their last four matches and have not been scored on in more than 250 minutes.
• Virginia has trailed three times this season for a total of 177:59 of 1,923 minutes played this season.
• The Cavaliers are 10-0 against non-ACC foes this season and have outscored the 10 other programs, 18-0.
• Including its two NCAA Tournament wins, Virginia is 14-0 when leading at halftime and 17-0-1 when scoring first.
• Virginia has held opponents to five or less shots eight times this season, including both games of the NCAA Tournament.

THE KLÖCKNER ADVANTAGE

• Klöckner Stadium has hosted an NCAA Tournament match in all 28 years of its existence. The Cavaliers have hosted an NCAA games in each of the last 39 years.
• The Cavaliers are 39-12-2 (.755) at Klöckner in the NCAA postseason.
• Virginia is 14-1 at Klöckner Stadium this season, the most home wins of any team in the country. Quarterfinal participants Clemson (13), Georgetown (11) Wake Forest (11) and SMU (10) are five of eight teams in the country with double-digit wins in 2019.
• Virginia has won 81 percent (298-59-27) of its matches at Klöckner Stadium since its opening in 1992.
• Against NC State on Sept. 20, 2019 Virginia drew 3,858 fans, the largest crowd since Sept. 22, 2017 when 4,205 turned out for a match against North Carolina.

NATIONAL RANKINGS

• The Cavaliers come into Friday with the lowest goals against average (0.33), the highest save percentage (.881) and the most shutouts (15) in the country.
• Virginia's 19 wins and .929 win percentage are tops in college soccer.
• Virginia is one of three programs (Missouri State & SMU) with one loss this season.
• The Cavaliers have conceded just seven goals this season, the fewest of any team in the nation. No other program has conceded less than 10 goals in 2019.

NOTES CONTINUED

PLAYER NOTES

- Andreas Ueland became the 18th Cavalier to score multiple goals in the NCAA Tournament and first since Nathaniel Crofts buried a pair of goals against Furman in the 2018 Second Round.
- Kessler and Andreas Ueland are the only two Cavaliers that have played every minute of every game this season. The duo was named to the TopDrawerSoccer.com Team of the Week. It marked the third-straight week that Kessler took home the weekly honor.
- Crofts has scored in four of his last seven games played and is the Cavaliers active leader in NCAA Tournament goals with three. Five of his nine career goals have come in either the ACC or NCAA Tournament.
- Striker Daryl Dike drew his second penalty in the box in the last four games when he was taken down against St. John's in the NCAA Third Round. He has drawn fouls that have led to five Cavalier goals in 2019. His 21 points (7g, 7a) are the most by a Cavalier since Will Bates totaled 25 in 2012.
- Sophomore Daniel Steedman was responsible for two assists, both off corner kicks, in Virginia's third round match against St. John's. It was the second multi-assist performance of the season by a Cavalier and the first in the NCAA Tournament since Scott Thomsen was credited with two against UNCW in 2014.
- After the game-winner against Campbell in the NCAA Second Round, Spencer Patton has scored three of his four goals this season against ranked foes.
- Cavalier captain Robin Afamefuna has started 44-straight games, the longest active streak on the team. Two of his four career goals have come in the ACC Tournament including a PK tally in this year's ACC title game against Clemson.
- Sophomore Cabrel Happi Kamseu made his first start of the season in the ACC Semifinals against Wake Forest. Working through an injury-riddled year, Happi Kamseu's two goals this year have both been game-winners, including his 82nd minute tally in the ACC Championship game. UVA only has four game-winning goals after the 75th minute, Happi Kamseu has two of them.

MAC HERMANN TROPHY SEMIFINALISTS

- Juniors Joe Bell and Henry Kessler were both listed as two of 15 semifinalists for the MAC Hermann Trophy, annually given to the country's top college soccer player.
- Virginia and Clemson were the only programs with multiple semifinalists and a total of five of the 15 were from the ACC.
- The last Cavalier semifinalist was Tony Tchiani in 2009.
- A Cavalier has won the MAC Hermann trophy on five different occasions – Tony Meola (1989), Claudio Reyna (1993), Mike Fisher (1995 & 1996) and Alecko Eskandarian (2002).
- Current associate head coach, Matt Chulis was a finalist for the MAC Hermann Trophy in 1998.

ACC TOURNAMENT RECAP

- Virginia captured its 16 ACC Championship and 11th ACC Tournament title with a 3-1 come-from-behind victory over top-seeded Clemson. The Cavaliers scored three unanswered goals in the second half including two in the final 8:52 of the match.
- Head Coach George Gelnovatch has won his fifth ACC Tournament Championship in his tenure – 1997, 2003, 2004, 2009 & 2019. His teams have now been to the ACC Final 13 times in 24 seasons
- Clemson was Virginia's third first-time opponent in the ACC Tournament. The Cavaliers did not face Syracuse (quarterfinal) or Wake Forest (semifinal) during the 2019 regular season.

REGULAR SEASON TO REMEMBER

- Virginia won six ACC games for the fifth time in program history (1984, 1986, 2001, 2005 & 2019) and third under head coach George Gelnovatch.
- Gelnovatch was a player on the 1984 and 1986 teams that won six ACC games and later as head coach led the Cavaliers to six league victories in 2001, 2005 and 2019.

- Virginia won its first Coastal Division Championship under the current two-division format (2014-present). The regular season crown is the first since 2001 and the third under Gelnovatch (1996, 2001, 2019).
- Virginia won 14 regular season games for the first time since winning 15 matches in 2006.
- The Cavaliers won all eight of its non-conference matches and did not concede a goal in their non-conference slate for the first time in school history. The non-conference schedule included a 2-0 win over then-No. 1 and defending National Champion Maryland at Audi Field on Sept. 2.
- Virginia allowed only five goals in 16 regular season games, matching a school record set in 1969 (10 games) and 1988 (18 games).
- Virginia spent three weeks as the nation's No. 1 team in the United Coaches Top 25 poll. The Cavaliers were ranked No. 12 in the preseason, jumped five spots in week one and have not been outside the top seven since.

CLEAN SHEETS

- Virginia has produced a shutout in 15 of its 21 matches this season, the most in the country.
- Under George Gelnovatch, the Cavaliers have reached 10+ shutouts, eight times including the National Championship seasons of 2009 and 2014.
- The program record for fewest goals allowed in a season stands at eight, set in 2009. Only one other time (9 in 1988) has Virginia allowed less than 10 goals in a season.
- The 12 clean sheets in the regular season were the most in Gelnovatch's tenure and tied for fourth most in UVA history.

HOW THEY SCORE IT

- A total of 13 different goal scorers are responsible for the 38 Virginia goals scored this season.
- Sophomore Daryl Dike leads the team in points (7g, 7a) with 21. Not included in Dike's stats are the fouls he drew to setup the game-winning goals against George Washington and Notre Dame. He also drew a foul in the box against Syracuse in the ACC Quarterfinals to setup a first-half PK goal, an Afamefuna goal in the ACC Championship match and the third goal of the NCAA Third Round match against St. John's.
- Dike's seven assists are tied for the seventh-most in the ACC.
- Nathaniel Crofts has five game-winning goals, tied for the second-most in the ACC. Four of the five game-winners came against ACC Schools.
- Joe Bell had four assists in league play this season, tied for the third most of any ACC player. The Cavaliers are 12-2-1 in his three seasons when he registers a point.

FRIDAY OF FIRSTS

- Virginia suffered its only loss of the season on Oct. 18 against Pittsburgh. The Panthers scored on two of their four shots on goal in a 2-0 victory.
- The two goals were the first two scored by an opponent at Klöckner Stadium in nine games and the loss snapped a nine-game home regular season win streak.
- The Cavaliers trailed for the first time going into the halftime break. Prior to the match, Virginia had only trailed for 23 minutes through its first 12 games.

DISSECTING THE DEFENSE

- Virginia has surrendered seven goals in 21 games, the fewest in the country.
- Against Boston College (Oct. 11) was the second time this season (Western Michigan – Sept. 23) an opponent has failed to register a shot on target.
- Virginia has held opponents to five or less total shots eight times and single-digit shots 13 times.
- The defensive trio comprised of Robin Afamefuna, Henry Kessler, Andreas Ueland have started all 21 games and have missed a total of four minutes of game action as a unit.
- Virginia allowed one goal through its first 10 games, the fewest in the 76-year history of the program. Last season the Cavaliers went seven games before conceding the season's second goal, which had happened only one other time (1985).

COACHING WINS

- Virginia head coach George Gelnovatch (336 wins) is the most wins among active ACC head coaches.
- Gelnovatch's surpassed Sasho Cirovski (321 wins) back on Sept. 20. for sole possession of third place on the all-time ACC coaching wins list.
- Gelnovatch is in his 24th season at the helm and owns the 7th-highest winning percentage (.697) among active NCAA coaches and the highest among ACC Coaches (minimum 10 years coaching).
- Gelnovatch has won 10 or more games in all 24 seasons as head coach and the program has won 10 or more games in 39-straight seasons. Only Maryland's Sasho Cirovski has more consecutive 10+ win seasons (25) among active NCAA head coaches.

FAST START

Virginia won its first 10 games of the season six times in its 76-year history. The 10-0 start for the Cavaliers was the first since 1993 and the best in George Gelnovatch's 24-year tenure.

SCORELESS STREAK

- Virginia held opponents scoreless for 692 consecutive minutes, a span of eight games from Sept. 13 through Oct. 11.
- The Cavalier defense recorded six-consecutive shutouts, the most since 2009.

DEFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- Virginia faced the top-two scoring offenses in the country in back-to-back games in Clemson (11/17) and Campbell (11/24). The Cavaliers held Clemson to one goal for only the second time this season and shutout Campbell for only the third time in 2019.
- In the ACC semifinals against Wake Forest, UVA held the Demon Deacons to just one shot on target and five shots total. Wake Forest came into the contest ranked 19th in the country in scoring offense (2.11 gpg)
- Virginia dominated the match against Boston College on Oct. 11 in all facets, with a 21-3 shot advantage and took 14 of the 15 corner kick attempts on the night. The Eagles did not take a single shot on goal.
- The Cavaliers have twice held opponents to no shots on target this season (W. Michigan - Sept. 23 & BC - Oct. 11).
- Virginia did not allow a NC State shot attempt for the first 80 minutes on Sept. 20. The four Wolfpack shots in the contest all came in the final 10 minutes including its lone shot on goal.
- Virginia has held 13 of its 21 opponents this season to single-digit shots, including five against No. 1 Maryland, the fewest shots by the Terps since Nov. 17, 2013, also against the Cavaliers.

SCHEDULE GAUNTLET

- Including matches against ranked foes, Duke and Maryland, the Cavaliers played five 2018 NCAA Tournament teams through their first six games of the season.
- Virginia and Georgetown were the only two programs to face 2018 postseason qualifiers in five of the first six games.

FACING NO. 1 AND NO. 2

- Virginia has faced the No. 1 and the No. 2 nationally ranked team in the country in the same season eight times.

PRESEASON NOTES

- Virginia comes into the 2019 season ranked 12th in the country by the United Soccer Coaches, the highest preseason ranking since 2015 when it ranked 2nd after winning the program's seventh National Championship in the fall prior.
- For the third-straight season, Virginia was picked to finish second in the Coastal Division in a poll of the league's 12 head coaches.
- The Cavaliers were one of four teams (UNC, Duke & Wake Forest) to receive a first place vote for the league's overall champion.

HOOS BACK

- The Cavaliers return 15 letterwinners including eight of 11 starters from last season.
- Headed by junior Nathaniel Crofts (4g, 6a), six of the top seven point scorers from 2018 are on this year's roster. Virginia returns 83 percent of its scoring (20 of 24 goals) along with goalkeepers Colin Shutler and Marcel DaSilva.

DECORATED SECOND YEARS

- Virginia set an ACC record with four honorees on the ACC All-Freshman team in 2018.
- Second years Daryl Dike, Cabrel Happi Kamseu and Daniel Steedman are all back for their sophomore campaigns. Dike and Happi Kamseu led the Cavaliers with five goals each. Steedman added a pair of goals both in conference play.

HEAD COACH GEORGE GELNOVATCH



George Gelnovatch is in the midst of his 24th season as the head coach of the Virginia men's soccer program. The longest tenured head coach in program history, Gelnovatch has led the Cavaliers to a pair of national championships in 2009 and 2014 as well as five NCAA College Cup appearances and 24-consecutive berths in the NCAA tournament.

Gelnovatch became the program's all-time leader in wins on August 25, 2017 with a 3-2 double-overtime victory over Villanova, surpassing his UVA mentor Bruce Arena for the program record in wins with 296. He reached the 300-win plateau on Sept. 15, 2017 with a 2-1 triumph at Virginia Tech, becoming just the fourth coach in Atlantic Coast Conference history to win 300 career matches.

A former Cavalier soccer All-American and assistant coach, Gelnovatch has guided Virginia to five ACC tournament titles, three regular-season ACC championships and a record of 336-130-58 (.697) in his 24 seasons as UVA head coach. Over the course of his 30 years as an assistant and head coach at Virginia, he has been a part of all seven of the Cavaliers' national championships.

Gelnovatch is the first coach in NCAA Division I men's soccer history to lead 20-straight teams to the NCAA tournament. He is one of just eight coaches in the Division I men's soccer annals to take 20 teams to the tournament and one of only four active coaches to do so.

Gelnovatch ranks as the seventh-winningest active head coach in Division I college soccer, with a .697 career winning percentage. Going into the 2019 season he stood 15th in career wins among current head coaches. Among Division I coaches all-time, he ranked 38th in career winning percentage and 41st in wins going into 2019. These figures are even more striking when considering Gelnovatch's teams play one of the nation's toughest schedules on a yearly basis.

Virginia has won at least 15 games in a season 10 times under Gelnovatch, including 2009 when the team recorded 19 victories en route to the conference and national championships.

Gelnovatch has developed a number of Major League Soccer players during his UVA tenure, with 27 players going in MLS drafts and nine in the MLS Supplemental Draft, while six signed Project-40/Generation Adidas contracts and Jordan Allen (2014), Derrick Etienne (2015), Scott Thomsen (2015) and Aboubacar Keita (2018) each signed MLS Homegrown contracts. Jason Moore (1999) and Alecko Eskandarian (2003) were selected No. 1 in the MLS Draft, as 11 Cavaliers have been picked in the first round of the various MLS drafts.

Gelnovatch was named the 10th coach of the Virginia program on Jan. 3, 1996, after Bruce Arena announced he would end his 18-year career at the helm of UVA soccer to become head coach and assistant general manager of Major League Soccer's D.C. United.

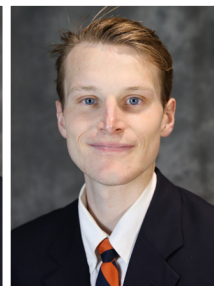
